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BOOSTER CLUB

The Booster Club of Madison High School was formed in the school year 1926-27 by Mr. Salm and is sponsored by him. Two members from each class are chosen to make up the club, which consists of sixteen members, eight boys and eight girls. The members elect their own officers--president, vice president, secretary and treasurer.

The purpose of the Booster Club is to back all school activities and create better school spirit among the student body.

The first year the Boosters sold old papers, gave a supper and picture show in Junior and Senior High Schools in order to raise money to buy awards for the football men.

In 1928-29 they sponsored the boys' interclass tourney to raise the sweater money. The high school debating team was organized and is backed by the club, while the orchestra is also sponsored by the Boosters.

They sell the sectional tickets, put on assembly programs throughout the year, help other organizations which are in financial trouble, and pay for all equipment of the yell leaders.

This year most of the money was raised by again sponsoring the boys' interclass tourney and selling candy at the gym during basket-ball games throughout the season.
