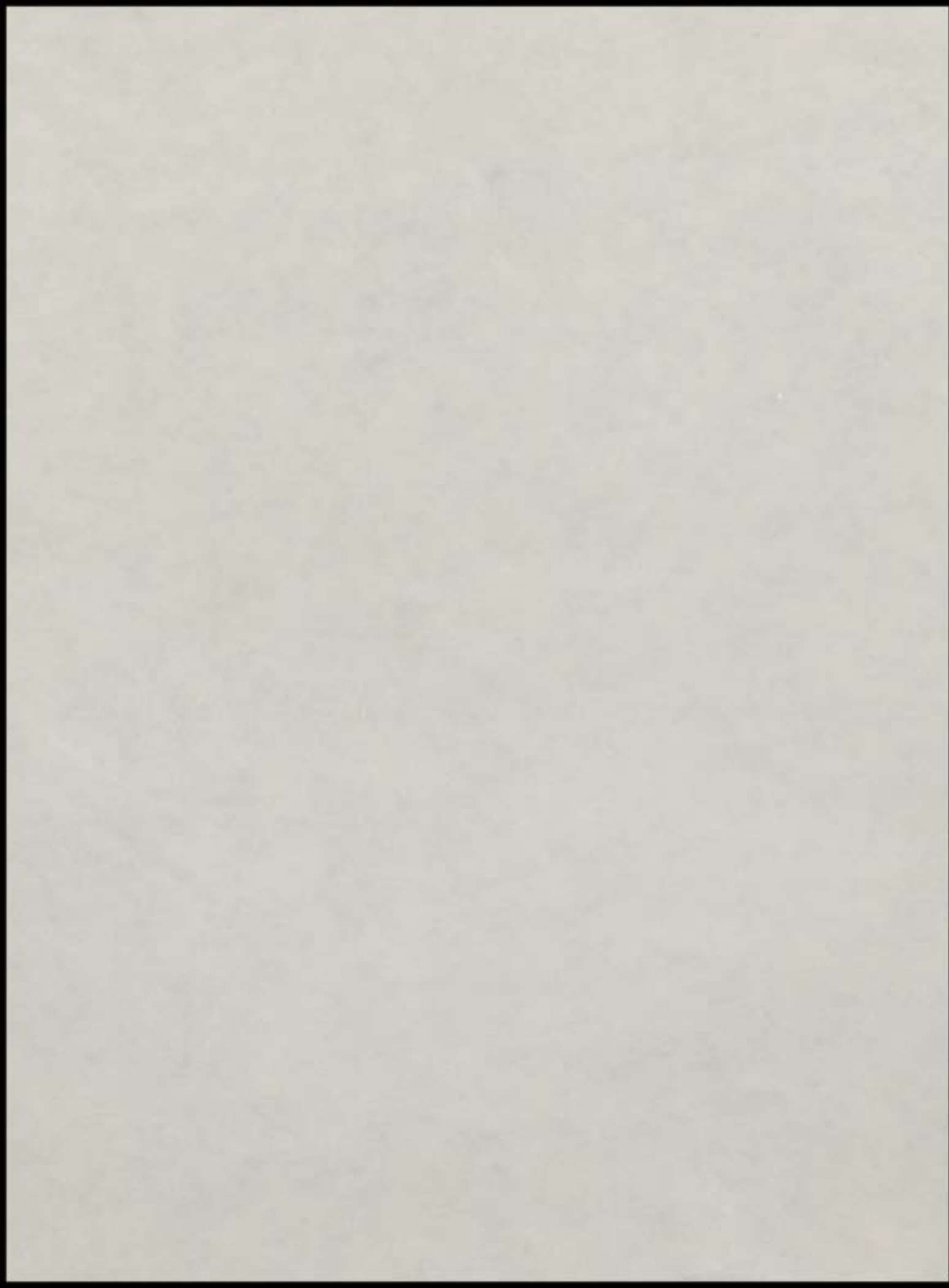
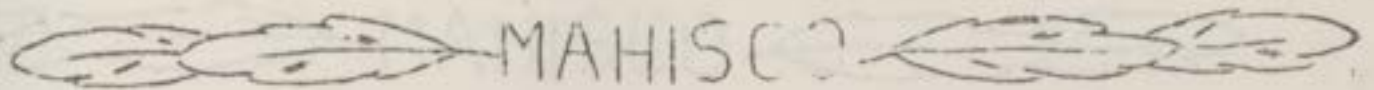

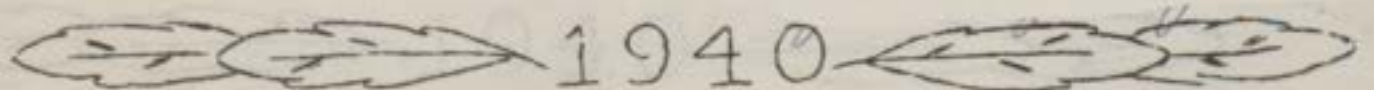
DEDICATION

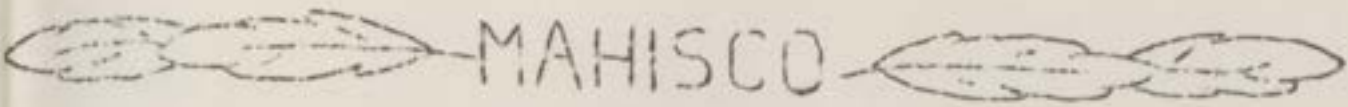

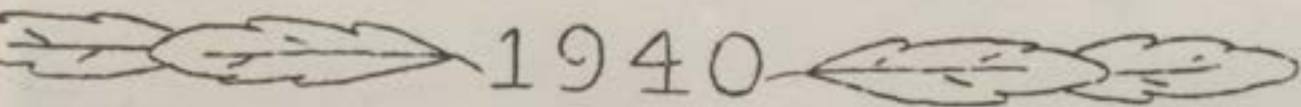

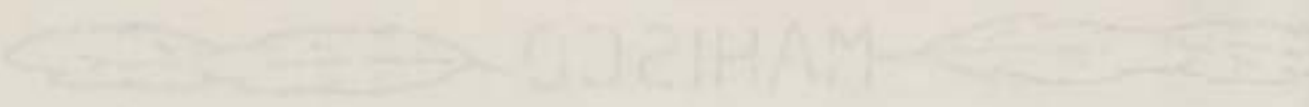
FOREWORD


A WORD TO THE READER

SUNSHINE SOCIETY

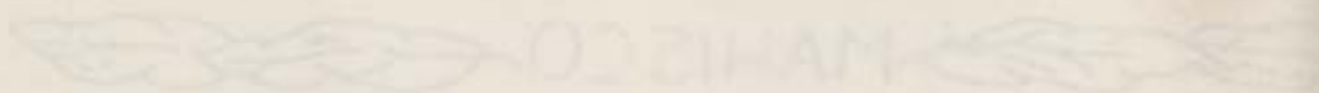
The Sunshine Society is the largest and most active organization in our school.

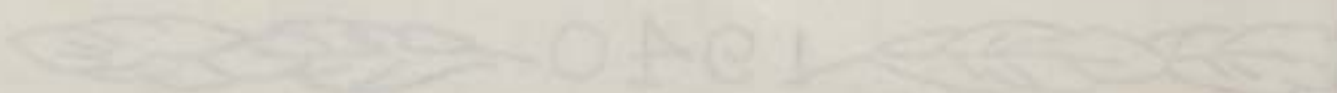

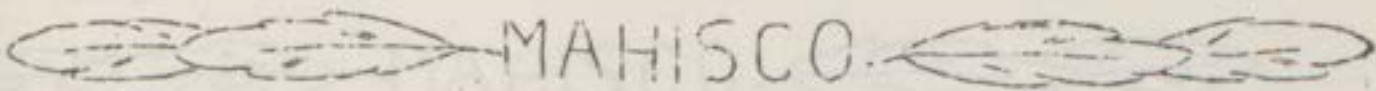

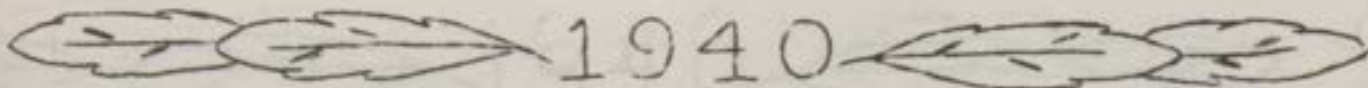
The Hi-Y Club stands for clean mind, clean speech, and clean thought. Only boys of high character may belong. Its purpose is to render service to school and community.

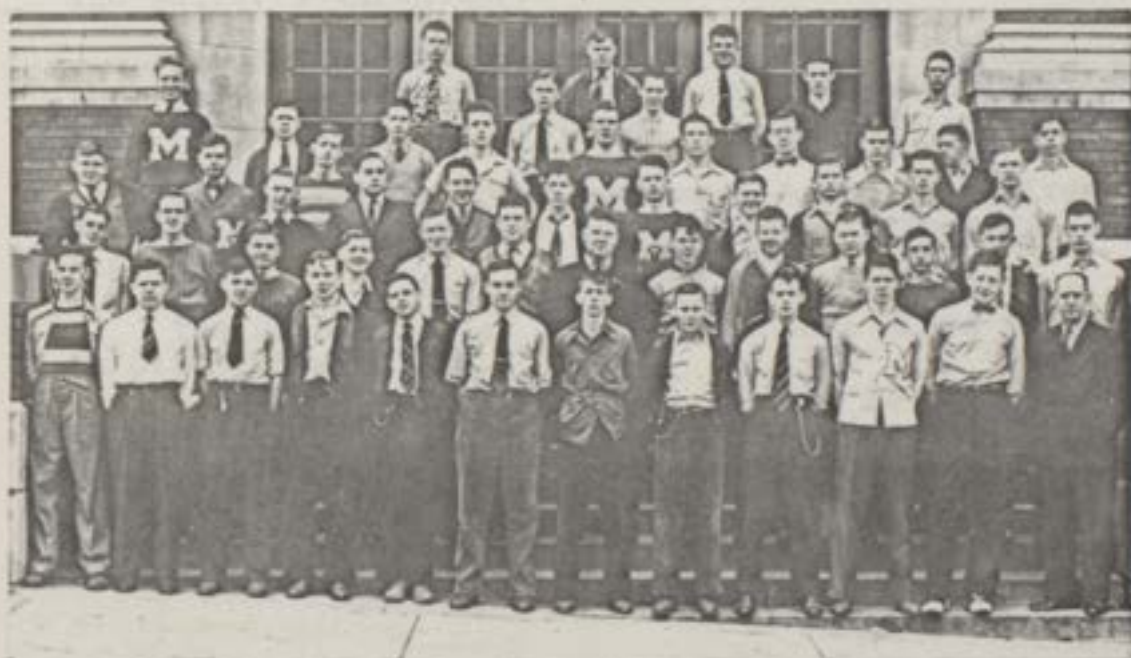

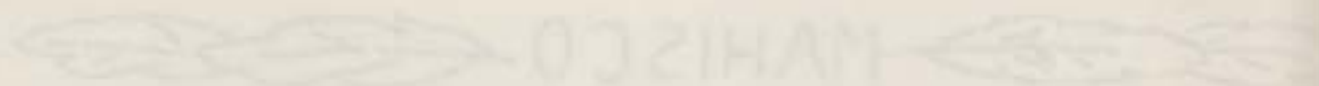

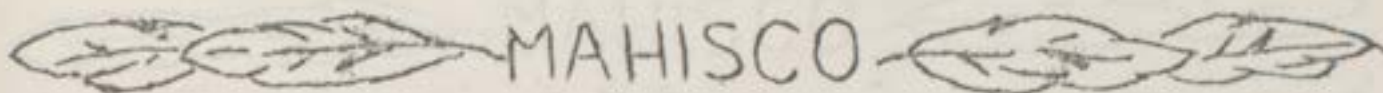

The Science Club was organized in 1936 by our science instructor, Mr. Evans Cottman.

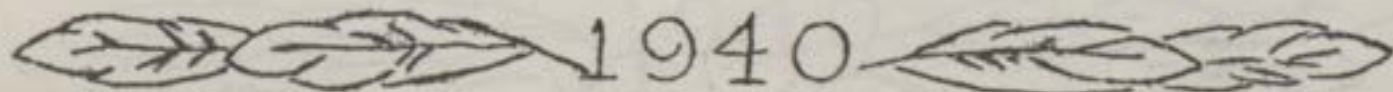

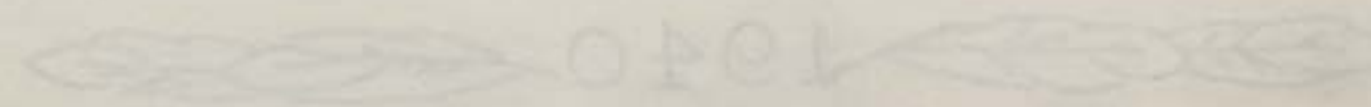



The purpose of this Student Council is to give the pupils a representation in an organization striving to promote the welfare of the school through the combined efforts of students and faculty.



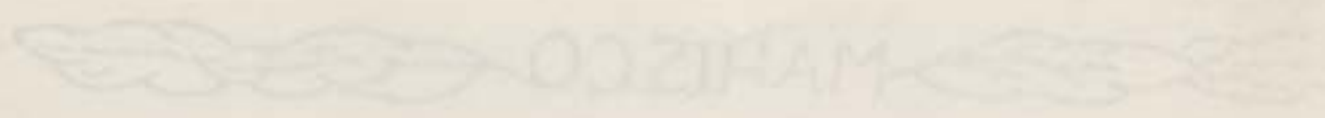


MADISONIAN

Plans are being formulated for the fourth annual Valley Choral Festival, to be held next year. The date and place are, as yet, undetermined.

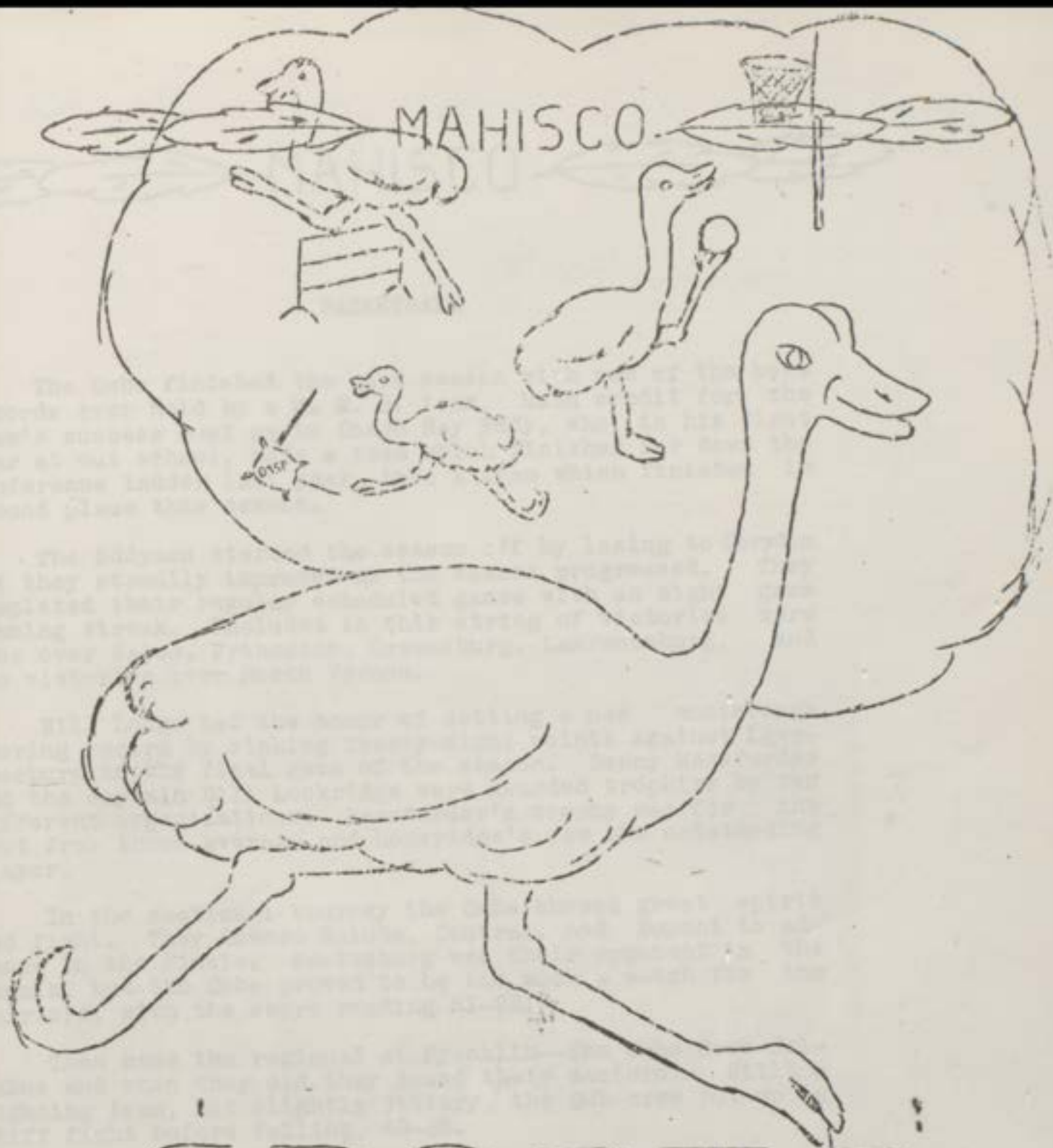
