


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

But much of the Cubs' success was due to our magnificent yell leaders Betty Turner, Bill Cranford, Pat Sieferman, and little Nancy Slider. Therefore we wish to express our gratitude to them—for their untiring efforts and the exceptionally good sportsmanship which they displayed throughout the football and basketball campaigns.

General Review

Madison's Cub basketeers maintained their high position on the hardwood again this year by coming through another successful year of net work. The Eddymen whipped three strong non-conference foes against two defeats, and six out of seven conference opponents to lay claim to a second place in the Southeastern Indiana conference. Captain Andy Taff, Dick Miller, and Horace Black, were the only seasoned performers around whom Eddy could center his attack this year. These boys were the dominating netmen in almost every Cub hardwood battle.

In their first appearance, the Cubs downed Vevay 20-15, but suffered a set back in their second start, when they lost to Huntingburg 23-43. The Madison boys then overcame North Vernon, Scottsburg, and Lawrenceburg, before they were handed their first defeat on their home floor, by the Salem Lions: 28-34.

The Cubs then outpointed Jeffersonville, 28-24, in a hotly contested battle. Although the Eddymen then swept on through a four game winning streak smothering Scottsburg, Vevay, North Vernon, and Aurora, they were again stopped by the Salem Lions, 16-27.

Our boys dropped the next two games to Shelbyville and a highly-rated team from Columbus, but avenged themselves on Greensburg, Franklin, Batesville, and ended the schedule season by thumping Lawrenceburg 46-26.

Madison advanced one step forward in their conquest for the State championship when they won the sectional tournament by defeating North Madison 44-22.

The Cubs opened the tournament by romping over Deputy, 56-25, and then overcame the Austin Eagles and the Scottsburg Warriors, in order to earn the right to advance to the sectional finals with North Madison.

The Eddymen added another regional tournament to their credit when they defeated Morristown 48-28, and went on to swamp Greensburg in the night tilt 51-41. The Cubs' attack was led by Andy Taff.

In the first game of the semi-finals, the Batesville Bulldogs out-pointed Madison 26-20, while Greenfield romped over Clinton 53-38 in the second afternoon encounter.

Batesville surprised the sports writers in the night game by upsetting Greenfield 27-20, and thus advancing to the State tournament finals.

The Cubs will lose Captain Andy Taff, Dick Miller, Horace Black, Tommy McKay, Bill Klein, Richard Neal, and Bill Standerford through graduation.

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Saturday, February 27, at the sectional tournament held at the Brown Memorial Gym, a large crowd witnessed three interesting games. In the afternoon encounter, North Madison outpointed Hanover 26-23, while Madison upset Scottsburg 47-30. In the finals the Cubs romped over the North Madison Tigers 44-22.

The Cubs overwhelmed Deputy 56-25, and Austin downed a strong team from Saluda 23-19, in the opening games of the sectional tournament on Thursday night; while Hanover, the county champions, defeated Dupont 31-18, and North Madison easily overcame the Paris Crossing Pirates 30-22, in the next scheduled round of play. In the first game Friday night, Scottsburg thumped Central 33-24, and Madison swamped Austin 56-16.

In the semi-finals North Madison eliminated the Hanover Bulldogs 26-23, and Madison trounced the weak but always dangerous Scottsburg Warriors 47-30.

Blazing forth with great accuracy the Cubs enjoyed almost the same easy success in the finals as they had encountered in the rest of the tournament when they ran over the North Madison Tigers 44-22. The Tigers put up a good fight but couldn't seem to get started.

For the four games of the sectional Captain Andy Taff scored 56 points, Bob Wallace 34, "Turk" Klein 37, Dick Miller 22, Horace Black 19, Herman Kasper 9, Tommy McKay 5, "Buddy" Scott 15, Charles Maddox 6, and last but not least Charles Grooms, who made no points, but played a brilliant defensive game. The Cubs made a total of 203 points in the sectional. The officials were Alvin Heller and Norman Miller.

Regional Tournament

Breaking loose with a barrage of baskets, the Cubs added the Regional tournament to their list of victories, when they romped over Morristown 48-29 in the afternoon game, and slipped past Greensburg 51-41 in the night tilt.

In the afternoon games, Greensburg came from behind to out point Center Grove 25-23.
