Our third year on the trail had seen our numbers becoming even smaller. At last we could see our goal shining in the not too far distance. With some what lighter hearts we elected: Bill Haines, President; Jim Werbe, Vice President; Ed Orrill, Secretary; Maxine Bever, Treasurer, Betty Jo Ackerman and Dick Demaree were elected to the Student Council.

Early in the school year we had a Junior Play Party. Then we got busy on our job of earning money for the Junior-Senior Prom by selling schedule pencils and magazines. The Prom, fashioned around a Chinese theme, proved to be a great success and a goal for coming years to aim at.

In the field of sports, Dee Monroe, Ed Orrill, and Jim Werbe led the basketball team. Bill Johann was a regular starter on the second team, Dick Demarce and Donna Bersch were chosen as yell leaders.

We realized now that we were on the last lap of our journey. Due to the many perils that beset our ways, our number had been reduced to 53.
