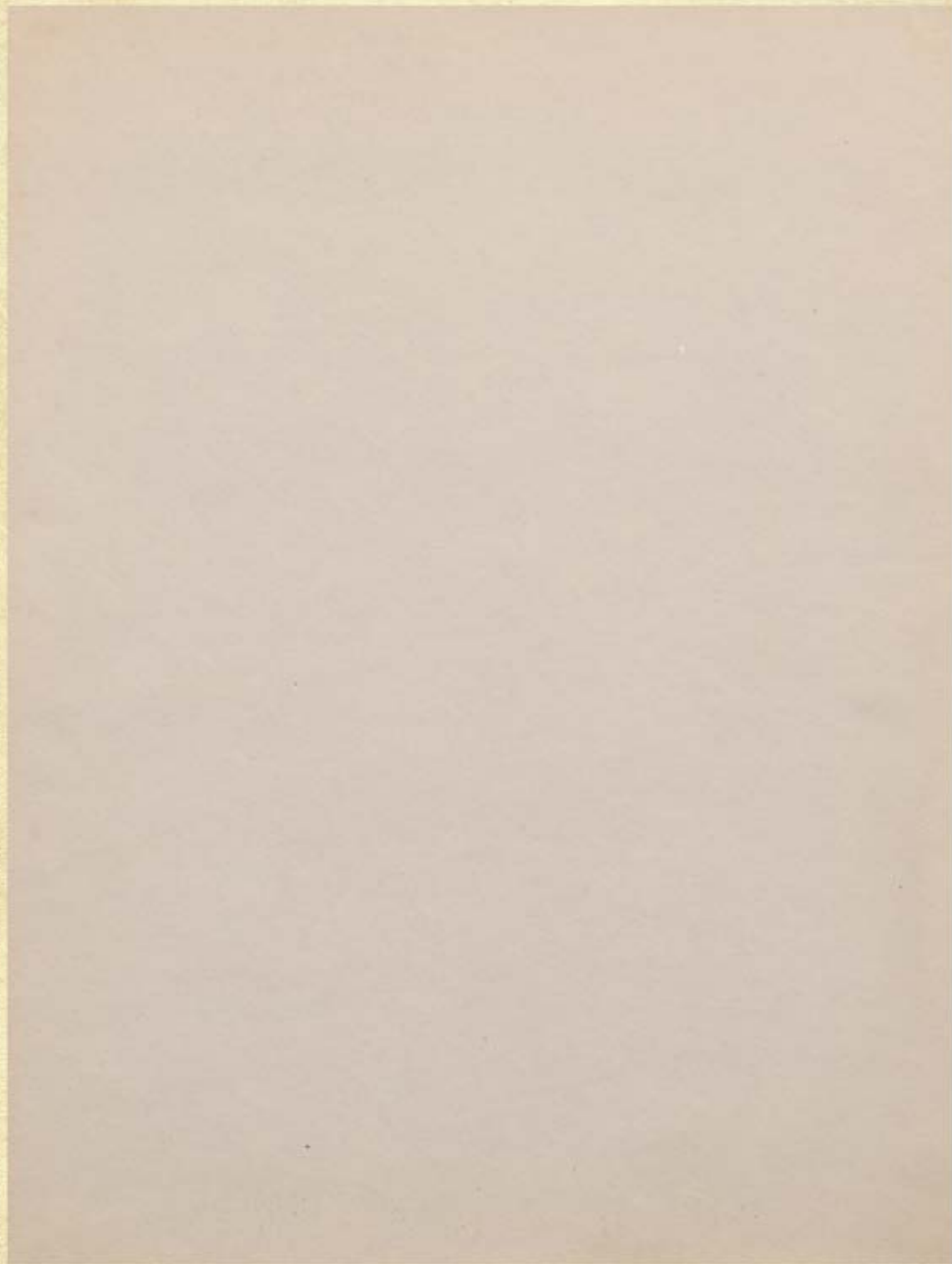
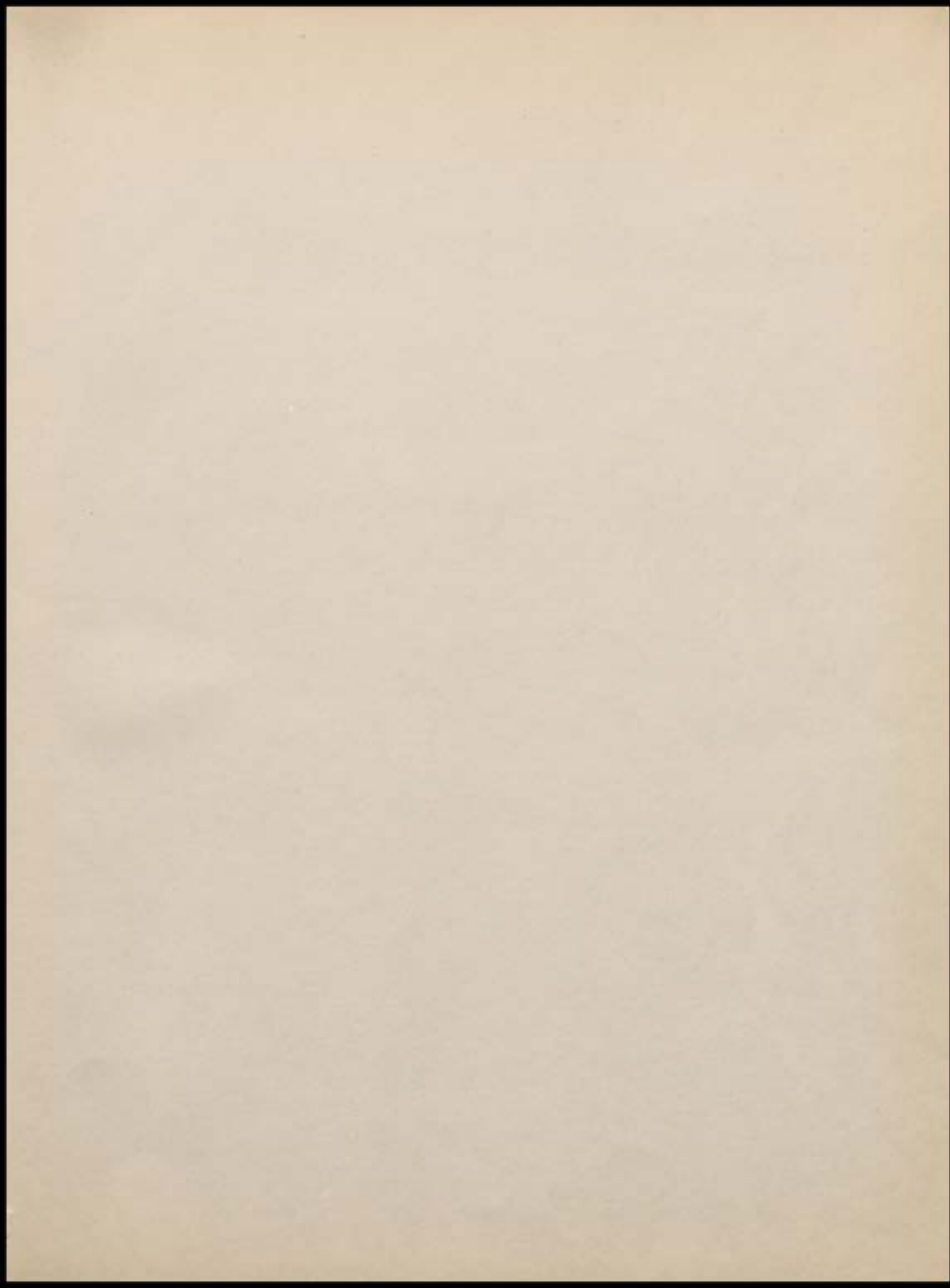


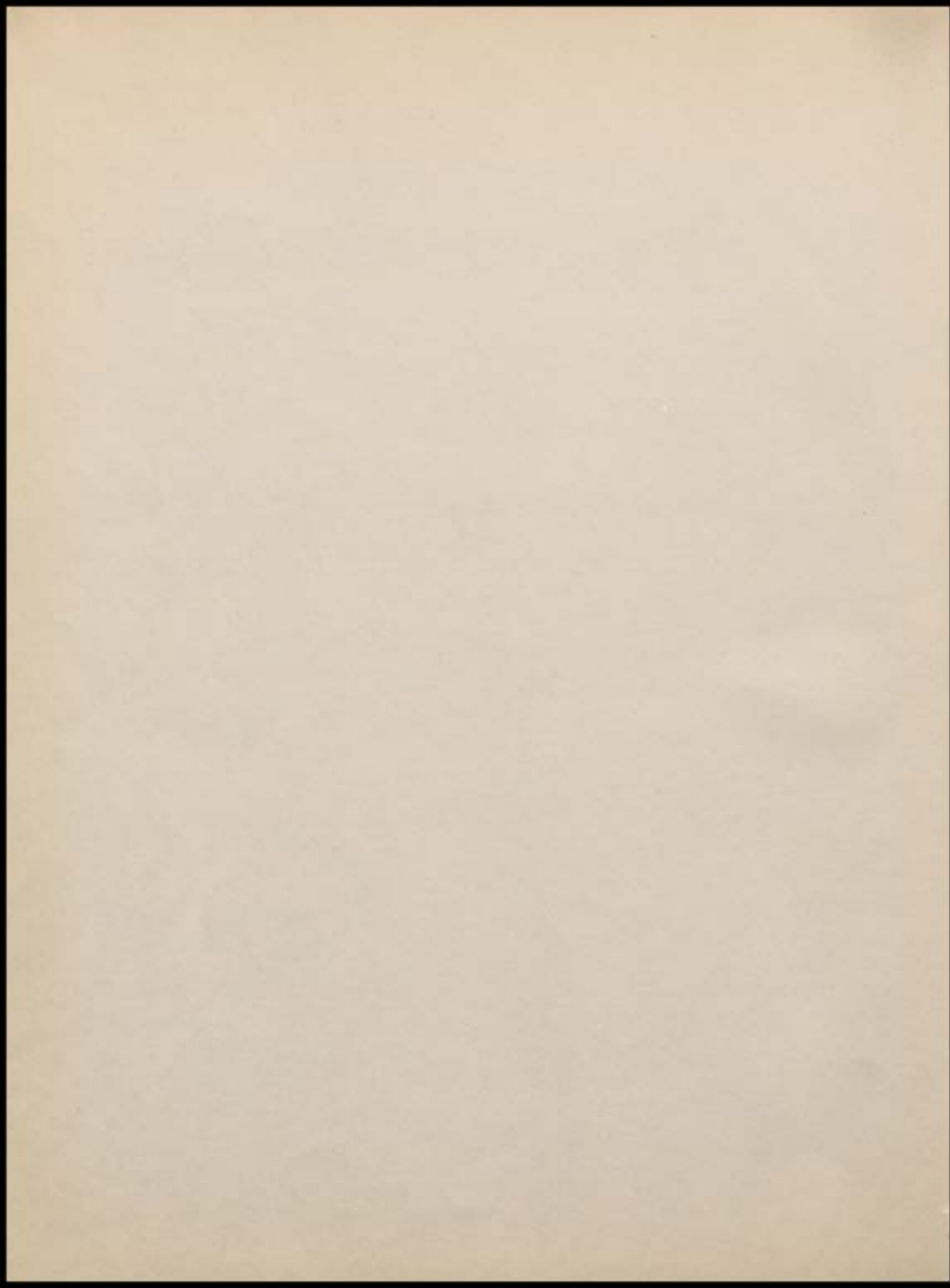

April 3

April 5  
Tonight the Greensburg Band with their director, Don Wilson, joined our caravan to present a concert at our gym. The M.H.S. Choral Club also presented a concert.

April 8  
Another check of the progress of the journey was taken. Everyone is now realizing that our long journey is nearly over.

April 15, 18  
A short vacation began today, so that our pioneers might attend church on Good Friday. Then on Easter Sunday all dressed up in their best finery and joined the Easter Parade.

April 23

April 4

May 19, 20  
The last lap before the "Big Divide" was crossed with flying colors by the senior class as they took the last exam of their careers in Madison High.

May 20  
Sunshine girls entertained their dates with a super-elegant "shindig" in the J. Graham Brown Mansion tonight. This is the last M.H.S. dance to be attended by the departing seniors.

May 22  
Baccalaureate was attended by the Forty-Niners tonight at the Brown Gym when Rev. John Sparks told them "What It Is All About."

May 23

After Commencement, the Senior Ball, sponsored each year by the Phi Beta Psi Sorority, was held in the Madison Armory. Over the ball Carolyn Scott and Ed Orrill reigned as Queen and King.

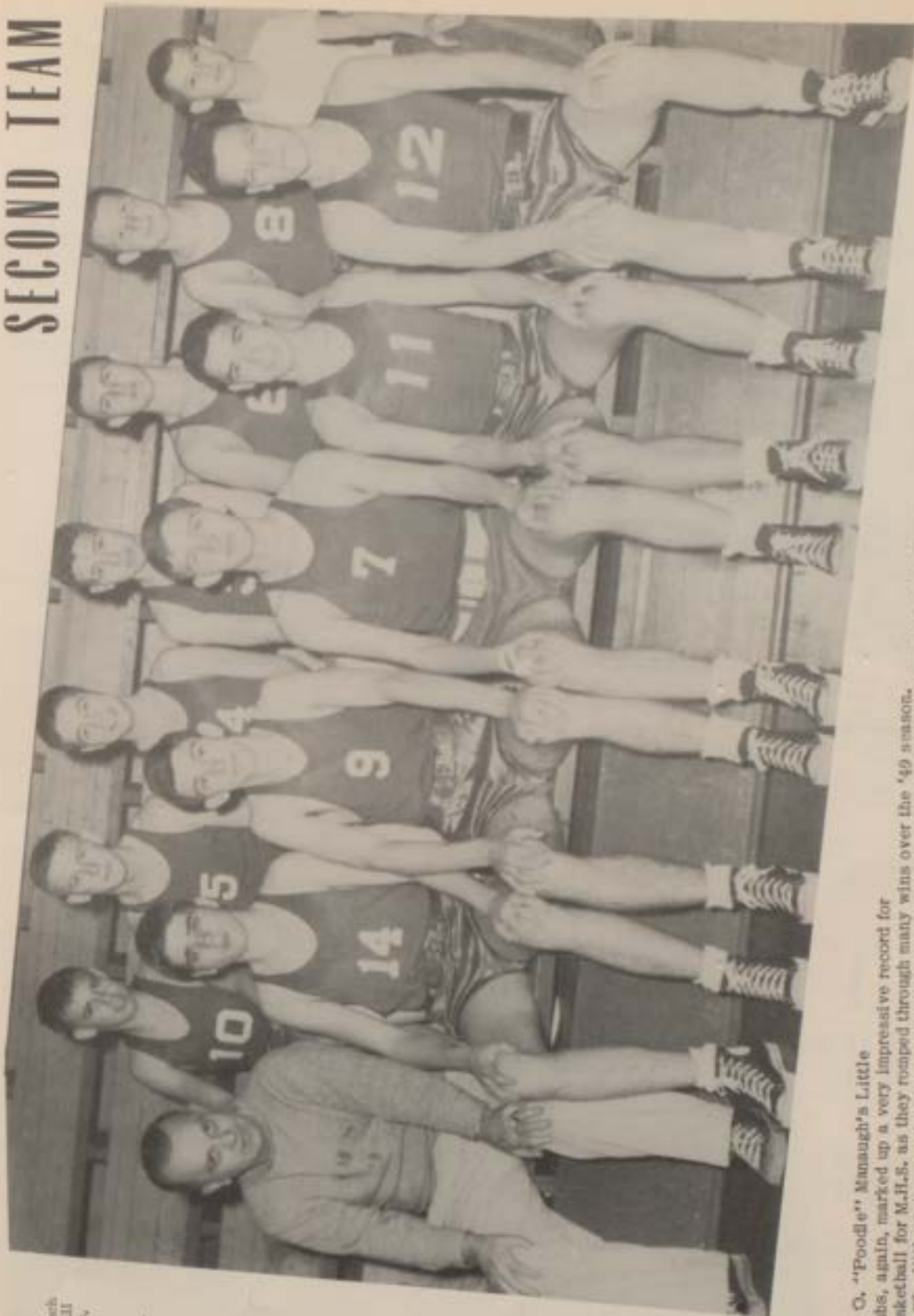
So, with this brief summary of the season, and the final statistics, we name this year's Cub team the greatest ever to don the red and white.

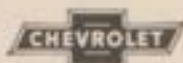
