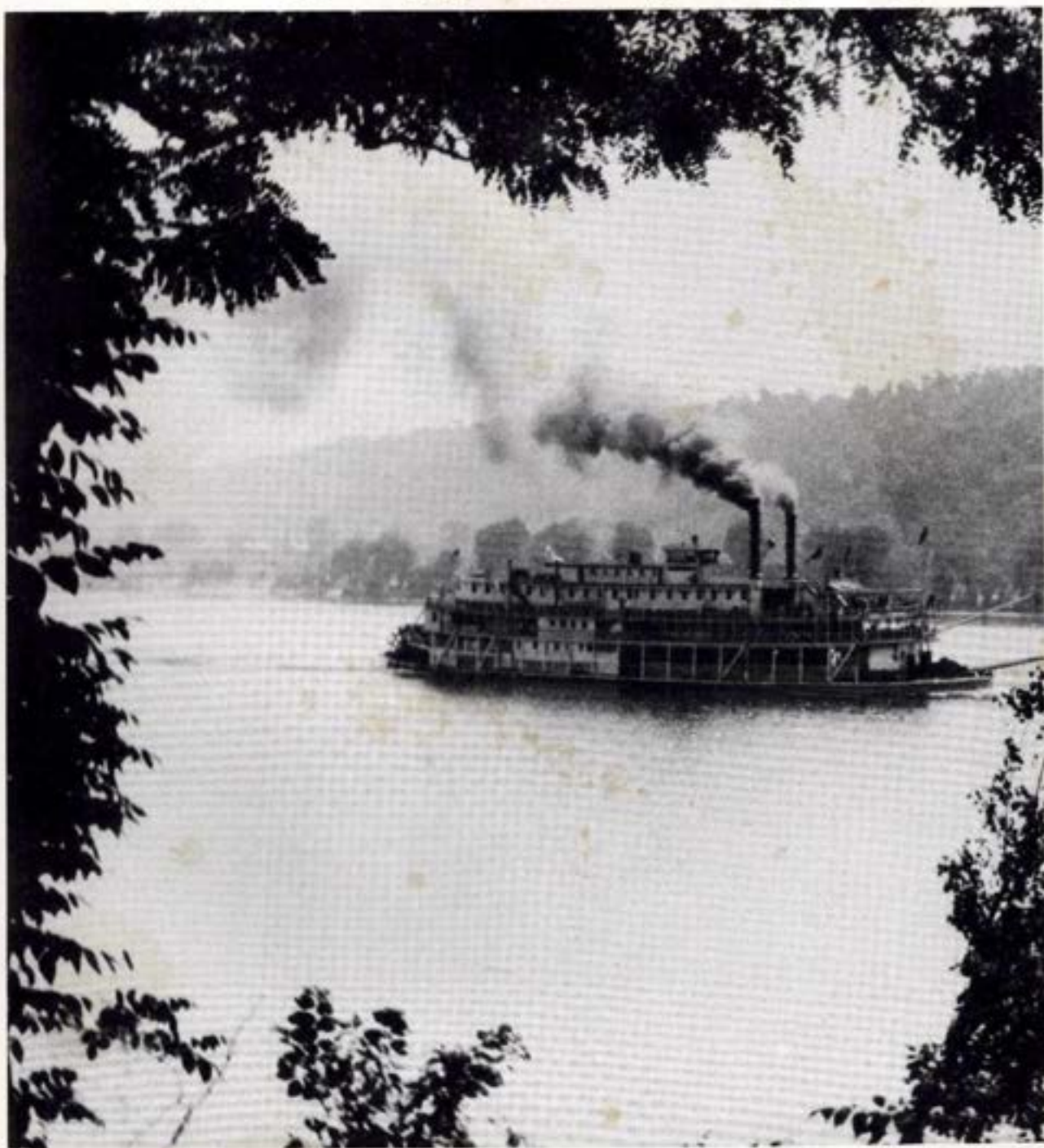

"Deken" Klopp, 6-1 forward looks ahead to a lot of points next season. This was the second year on the Cubs for Deken. He is a junior and weighs 168.

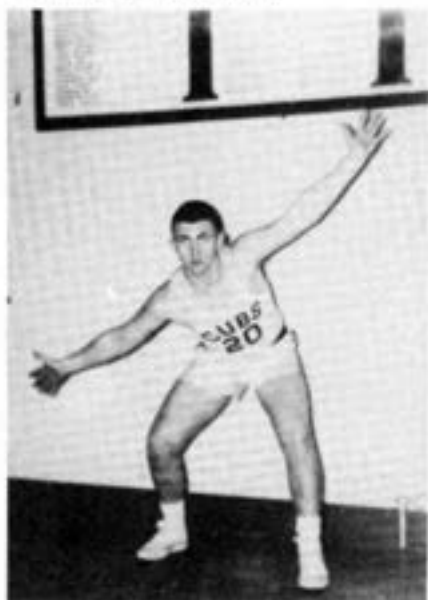


Bill Shuck, another senior of the Cubs squad this season, gets ready to shoot his "patent" shot. Bill is 6-2 in height and weighs 170.

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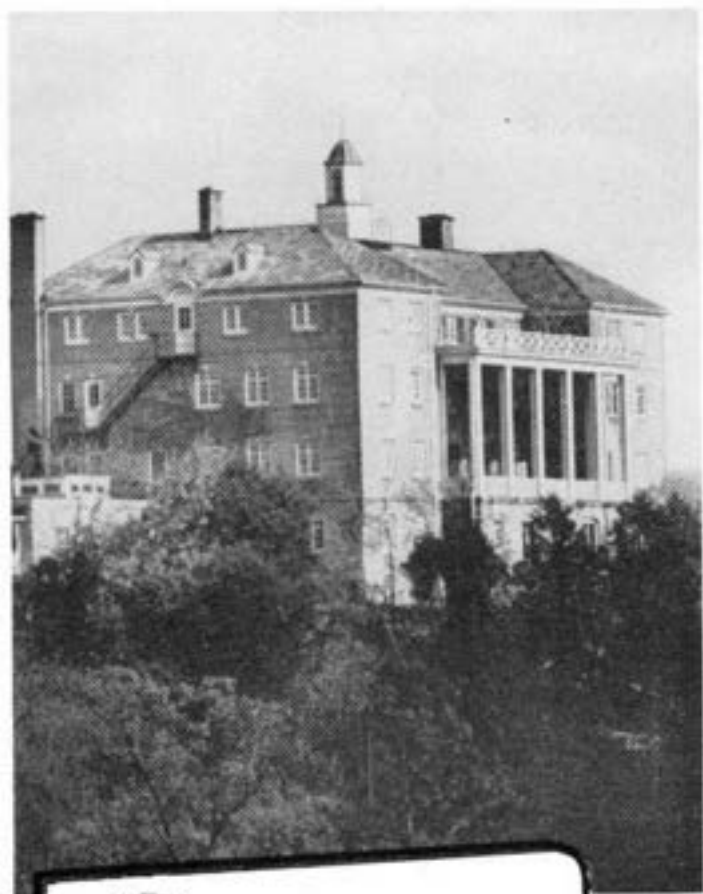

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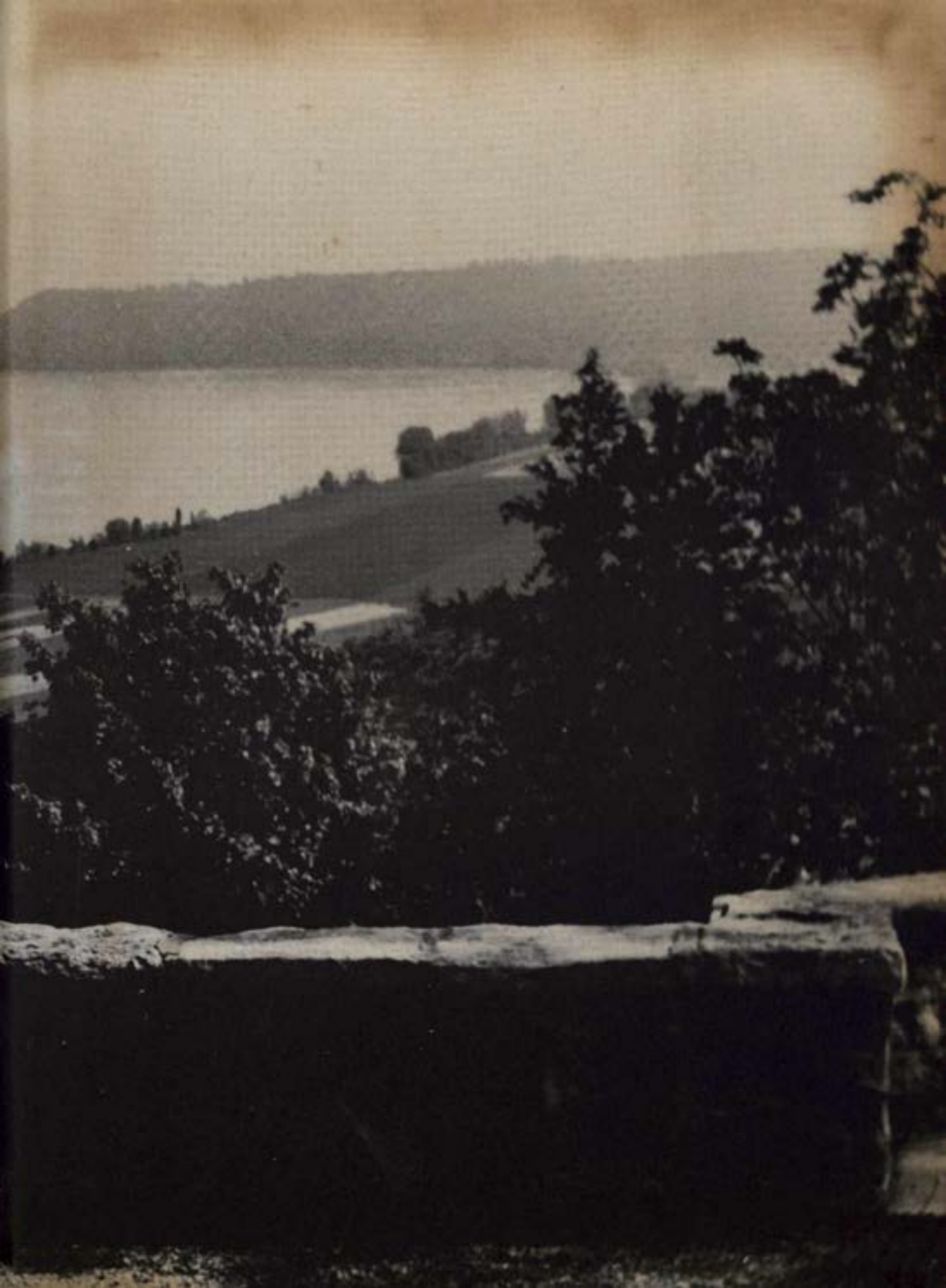
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
