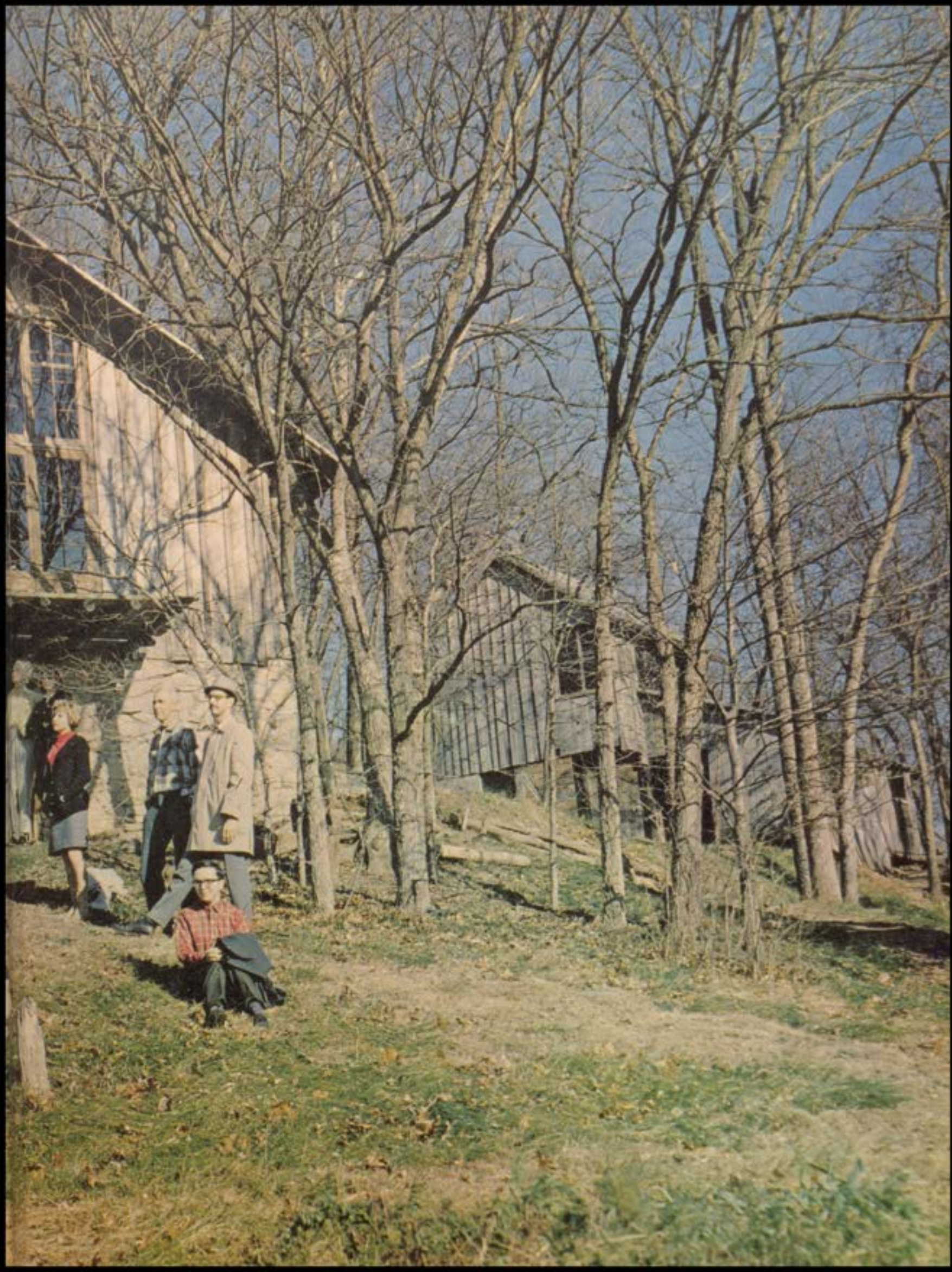


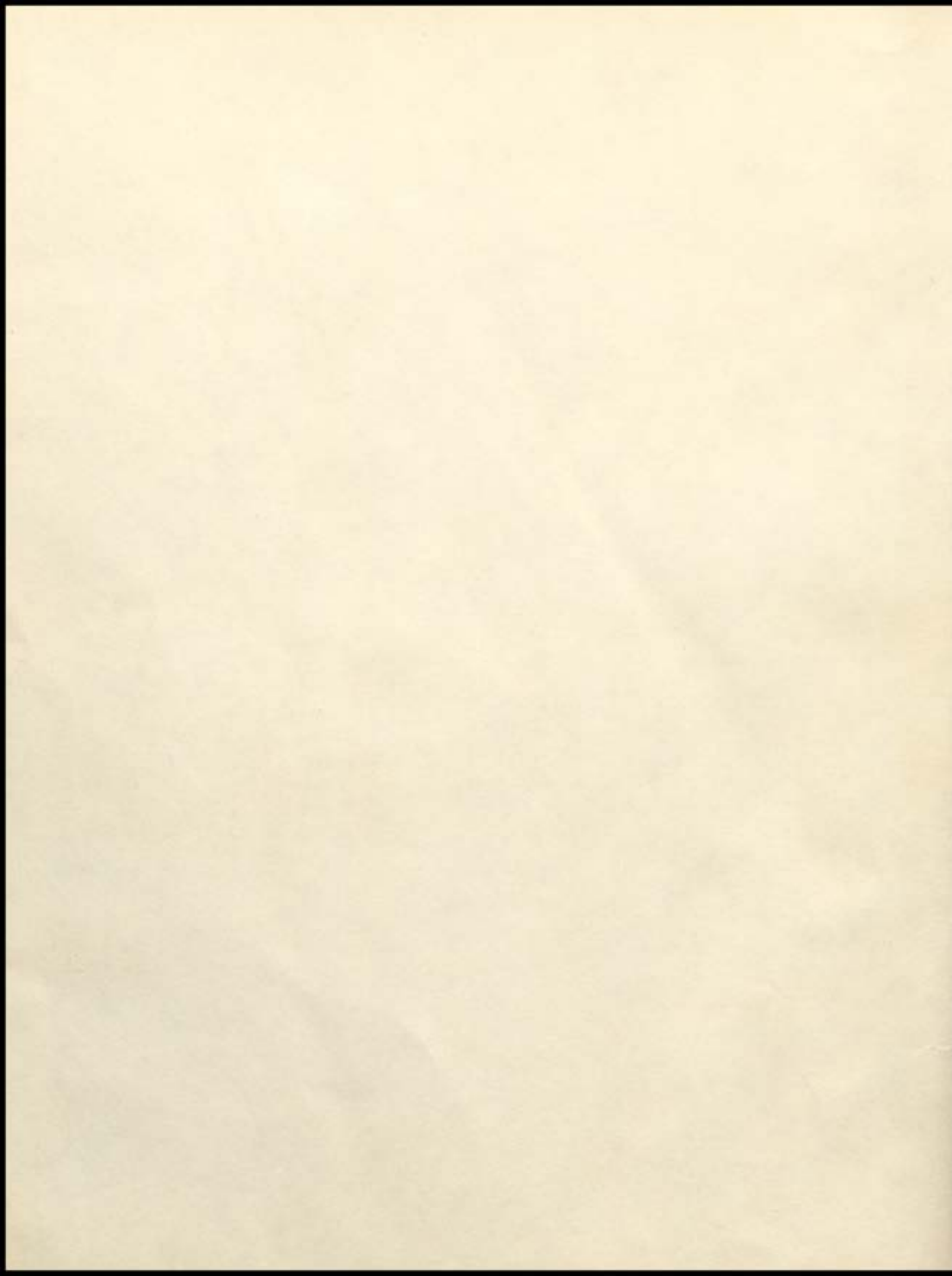

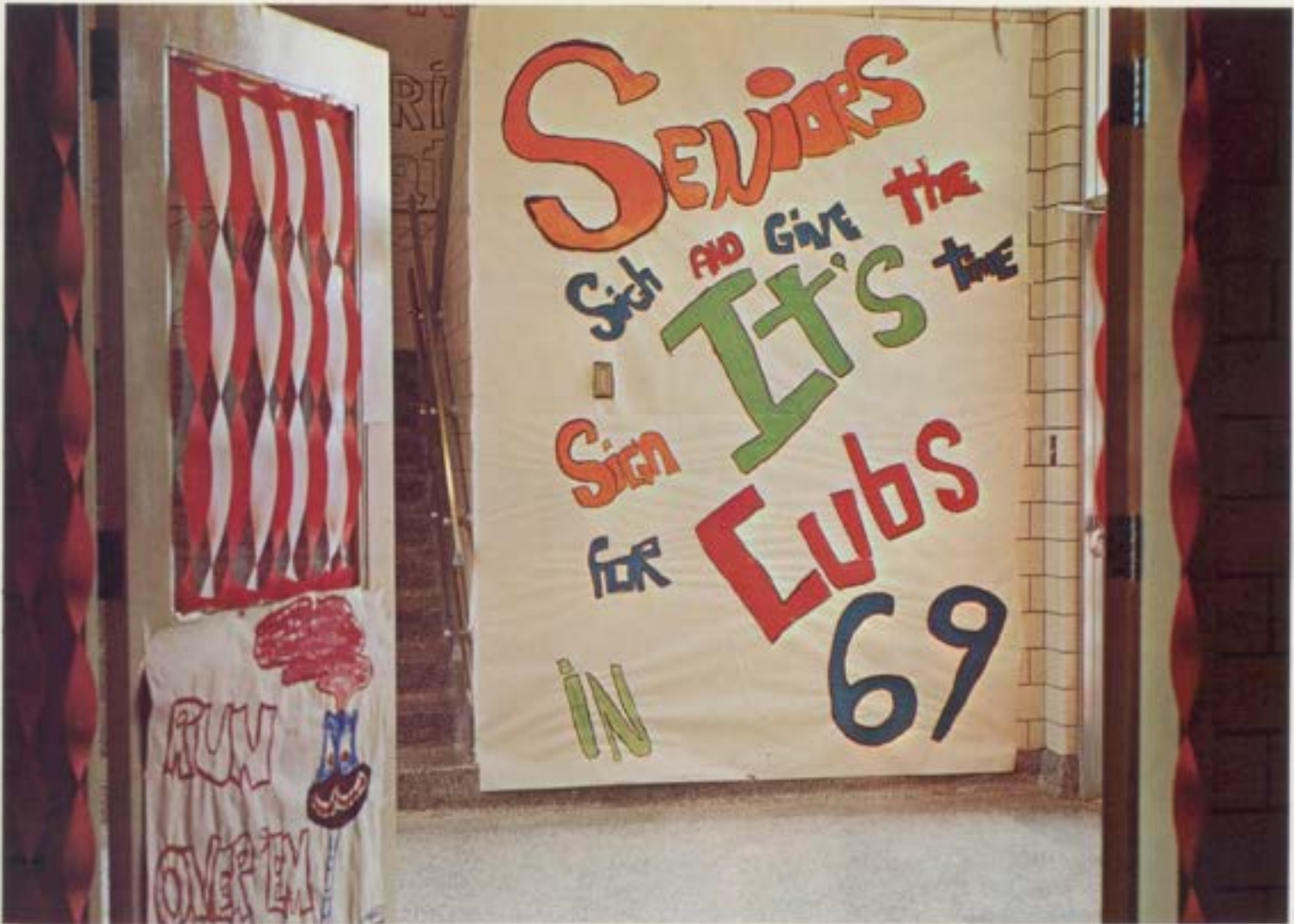

Language Arts Incorporates Special Skills

Specialization was the key word for the English department. Subjects ranged from reading development to composition. These courses are designed to assist all students, whether or not they are college-bound.

One course, offered to seniors having a B composite average in English, is advanced composition. This class is designed to develop creativity through writing. Both sophomores and seniors used the reading lab to strive for increased speed and efficiency. Another special class is speech where students learn to express themselves verbally. Journalism was also offered primarily to juniors and seniors having an interest in publications.

The reading lab provides time for Gilberta Eden, Allen Watson, Lisa Pickett, and Jerry Jackson to work individually for increased speed.

Basic Fundamentals of English Prove Essential

The basic fundamentals of English were taught to all students at MCHS. Students of every class were again required to enroll in an English course. These courses varied, but all combined the study of basic grammar fundamentals with the study of general but essential literature techniques.

Freshmen studied grammar, vocabulary, and undertook a survey of literature. The sophomore students found it necessary to write their first term paper. By doing this, they became acquainted with the mechanics involved in preparing a research paper. Junior class members started a study of more specific grammar along with their study of American literature. They read and discussed many required books from their book list. Seniors who did not sign up for a composition class were required to complete a fourth year of grammar. This course was an intensive study of more detailed grammar as well as a study of historical world literature.

Mathematics Courses Stress "Modern" Approach

The mathematics department at Madison High School took great strides forward during the 1968-1969 school year. The math department was involved in programs such as Open House in order to better acquaint parents with the curriculum of our math department. Also, more advanced courses, new faculty members, and enlarged enrollment helped to widen the scope of the math curriculum.

Many senior scholars were exposed to courses similar to what they can expect in college. Sophomores were concentrating on geometry while freshmen and juniors were involved with beginning and advanced algebra.

To cope with the enlarged enrollment two new faculty members were added to the math department. Mr. Neff, teaching algebra and general math, and Mr. Nelson, teaching geometry, were at Madison for their first year.

Scarcity of time often causes difficulties in solving math problems. Mr. Harrell takes a minute with Dennis DeBurger between classes to explain the solution to an especially difficult problem.



Business Curriculum Expands to Meet Modern Day Demands

The commercial or business department at Madison High concentrated on preparing students for careers in office and clerical work. Students of all classes could enroll in a business course if they had an interest in the field.

Beginning courses ranged from first year typing to the study of shorthand.

More advanced students enrolled in second year typing and second year shorthand. Other courses such as bookkeeping, business machines, and clerical practice were offered to provide students with the basic backgrounds needed before entering a business school or a business profession.

A basic knowledge of shorthand is essential for a competent secretary. These students are studying first year shorthand in order that they may continue and acquire even greater skills.

Stress Experimentation for Full Understanding

Science at MCHS took many new forms this year. Courses ranged from health and earth science to the study of physics and chemistry. Students of all abilities and interests were able to find a science course to fill their requirements.

New teaching techniques were used by a number of the teachers within the department. The health classes participated in numerous field trips and also received a great number of pamphlets and other publications that pertained to the course. The laboratory science teachers found students eager to experiment

and learn for themselves. Because of this, the labs were put to extensive use for subjects such as chemistry and physics.

One of the major changes in the department occurred in advanced biology classes. Under the auspices of Mr. Turpin, advanced biology students were able to travel to the area's grade schools and teach science to the elementary students. This cadet teaching program helped high school students to understand the basic fundamentals involved in teaching.

Civics classes, especially, concentrated on the platforms, candidates, voting polls, and primaries. By giving their attention to current events the civics students supplemented their study of the structure of American government on the national, state, and local levels. The study of economics, which involves analyzing social and economic problems, received wide participation from the seniors this year.

The Governments II classes for accelerated students, compared the governmental structures of different countries.

United States history, graduation requirement, reviewed the history of the United States from its birth as a nation to the present time. World history, an elective, offered insight into the world's development from known history to current times.

Psychology reviewed the problems of individual behavior, both mental and emotional.

The social studies department was very active throughout the term. Preceding the national and local elections, both of the ninth district representative contenders were guest speakers. Also, fifty seniors were privileged to visit the State Legislature in Indianapolis.

German progressed this year with the addition of a new teacher, Mr. Seifert. The study of this language began by learning to count and presenting daily conversations. The advanced pupils developed writing skills and studied literature.

Latin classes also gained a new teacher. Through the efforts of Mr. Moore, Latin students gained knowledge of the basics of the language.

French included the study of phonetics and cultivation of reading and writing.

Intermediate and advanced students studied sculpture, oil painting, and art history.

Students also participated in special activities. The art classes took a field trip to the Hubbard home along the Ohio River where the students observed the artist's environment and works. Also, in January, 73 art pupils took part in the annual L. S. Ayer's Art Contest.

The band class studied instrumental music, while the chorus expressed themselves through vocal music.

Both the band and chorus performed for local and area groups. The band played at all home football and basketball games. The chorus gave its annual Christmas program with a colorful skit and some carols. The department enabled students to go deeper into their musical interests by offering music appreciation. The course aroused student interests in music and taught them to respond to the great works which constitute our musical heritage.

Farm Related Courses Teach Practical Uses of Agriculture

Vocational agriculture was offered to students with farm background and interest in making farming or agri-business an occupation. Vo-Ag I, the basic course, dealt with the types of soil and its problems. Crop productions and farm management was also incorporated. Woodworking and machinery maintenance helped provide students with practical

and necessary skills.

Advanced students were acquainted with meats, feeding, breeding, and veterinary care of livestock. To further enlighten the students with the meat-packing process, a field trip to Fischer Packing in Louisville was taken. Juniors and seniors were eligible to work in agricultural businesses in the area.

Shop Classes Promote Study of Useful Arts

Woodworking, general shop, auto mechanics, general metals, and mechanical drawing were the courses offered by the Industrial Arts Department.

In the woodworking class, the major areas stressed were design, hand tools, furniture construction, power tools, and finishing. The general shop class emphasized subjects that would be useful in the home.

Practical experience on the maintenance and repair of an automobile was the main objective of the auto mechanics class.

General metals stressed the basic methods and theory of metal cutting. Machine milling work and welding were also taught.

Mechanical drawing students learned the fundamentals of making industrial drawings. Problem analysis and geometric application were also stressed.

Gym Classes Involve Active Participation

Physical fitness, co-ordination, development, and teamwork were the main objectives of the physical education classes. Through various sports and daily calisthenics the boys' and girls' gym classes strived to reach their goals.

The scheduled activities for the girls were archery, tennis, modern dance, tumbling, volleyball, basketball, dodgeball, and badminton. Matches between the girls helped to create interest in these activities.

For the boys' gym classes, team sports such as basketball, volleyball, tennis, softball, and football were offered. These sports helped to develop team spirit and cooperation among the boys.

The freshmen studied foods and the daily food requirements that were needed. Also, they learned how to plan, prepare, and serve simple meals. Consumer education, human development, home furnishings, and clothing and textiles were also studied.

The second year home economic students were taught family health and home care of sick and aging, nutrition and foods, and home furnishings. The main stress, however, was placed on clothing and textiles. The girls increased their skill in sewing techniques and learned the principles of making simple alterations in ready-to-wear garments.

Third year students studied family relations and child development which helped them understand the interrelationships within the family. They also studied housing, management, and consumer education.

Local Factories Offer ICT Students Training

Expanding in size, the industrial cooperative training class worked while they attended school three periods a day. The majority of the ICT students had trade or industry jobs, but some held jobs dealing with health occupations. The students worked a minimum of fifteen hours a week to a maximum of forty hours a week and were paid the local wage.

One of the three classes that the students attended was the ICT class. At that time the students studied generally related topics such as taxes, private insurance, savings, and investing. Speakers that were experts in these fields came to discuss these topics. Also, during the class period the students studied specific related topics dealing with the type of work in which they participated.

DE Students Participate in Multiple Jobs

Both juniors and seniors were eligible to participate in the distributive education program. The main objective of the program was to train students for useful and efficient employment in distributive occupations.

The students enrolled in this course studied in organized classes in school for the first half of the school day. At twelve o'clock they were dismissed from school and went to their respective jobs. The students not only learned the basic fundamentals of business administration, but experienced on-the-job training which will help them after graduation. An average of fifteen working hours was required for each student and they were paid the local area wage.

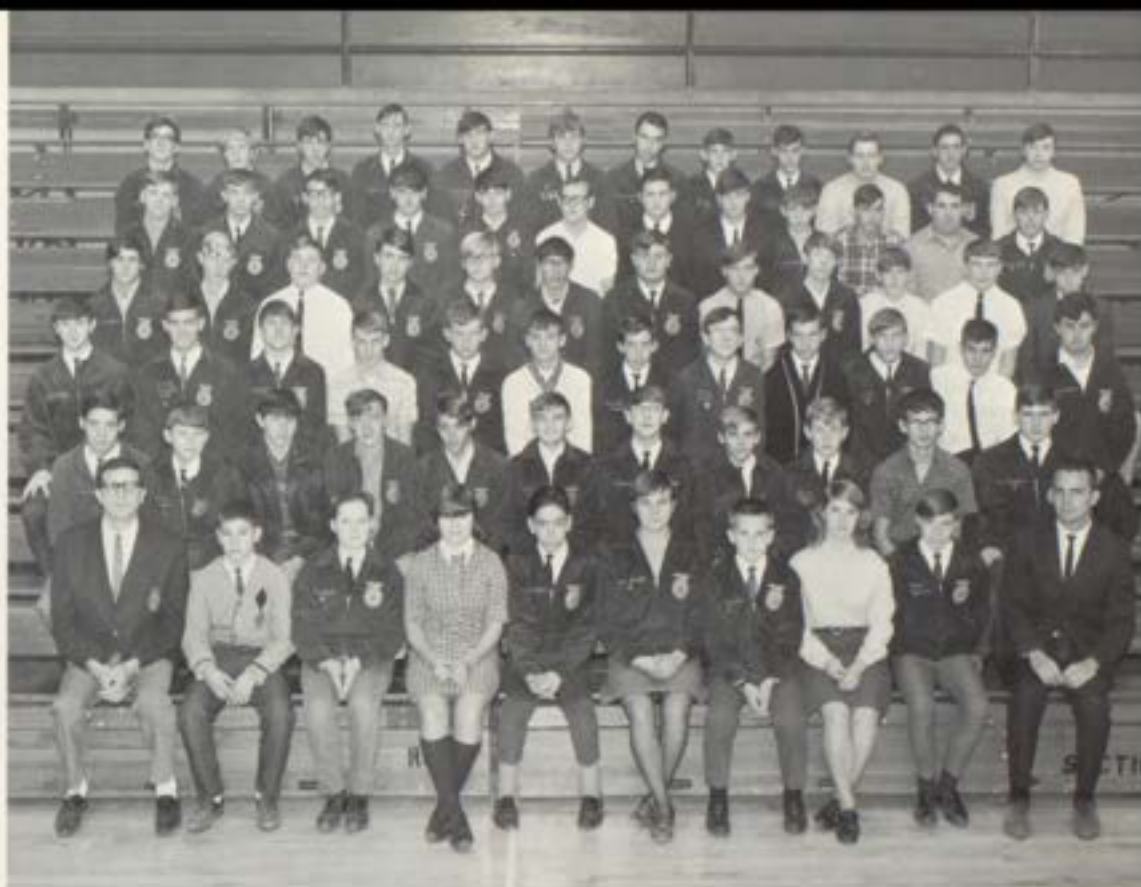

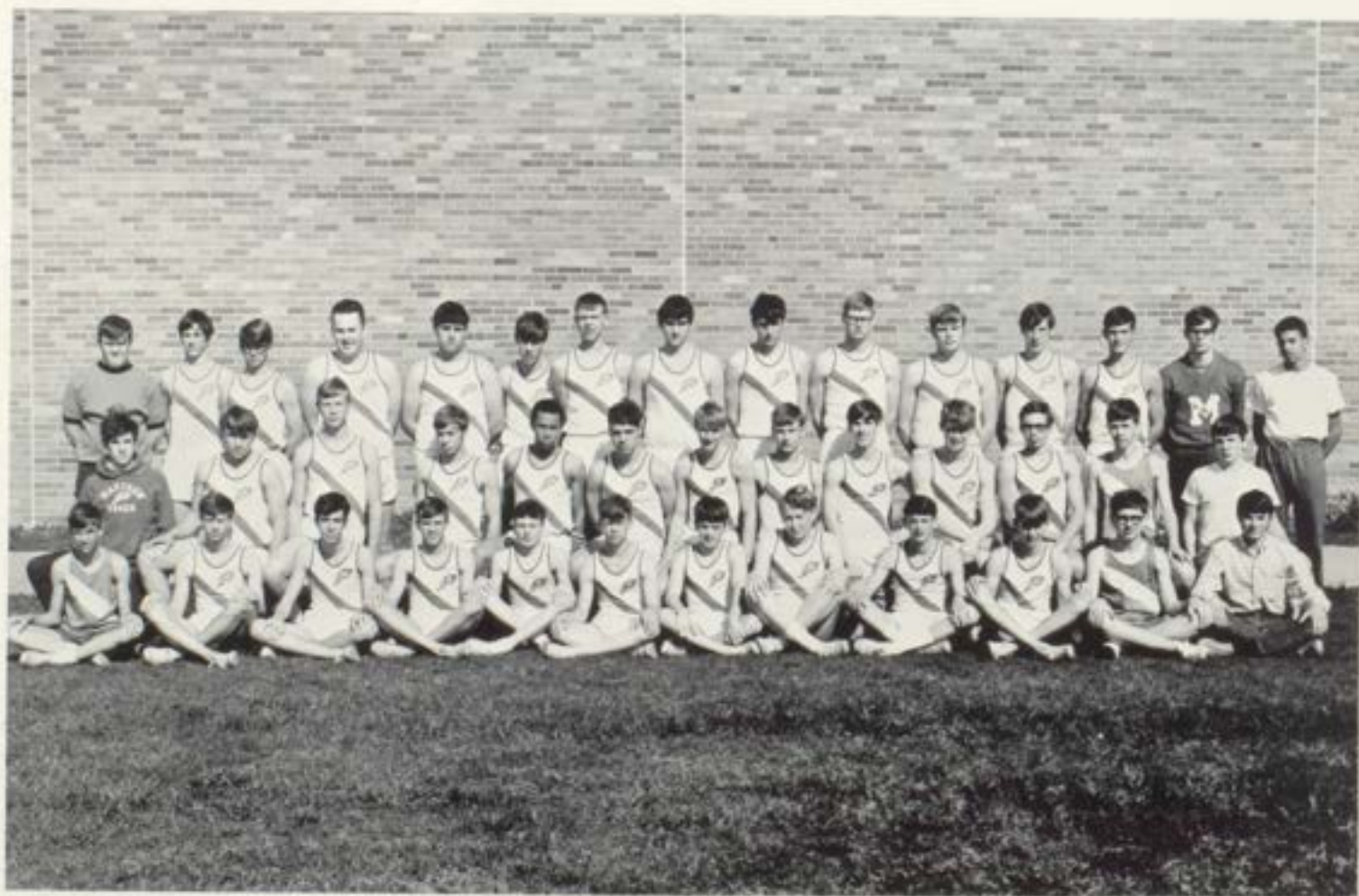
