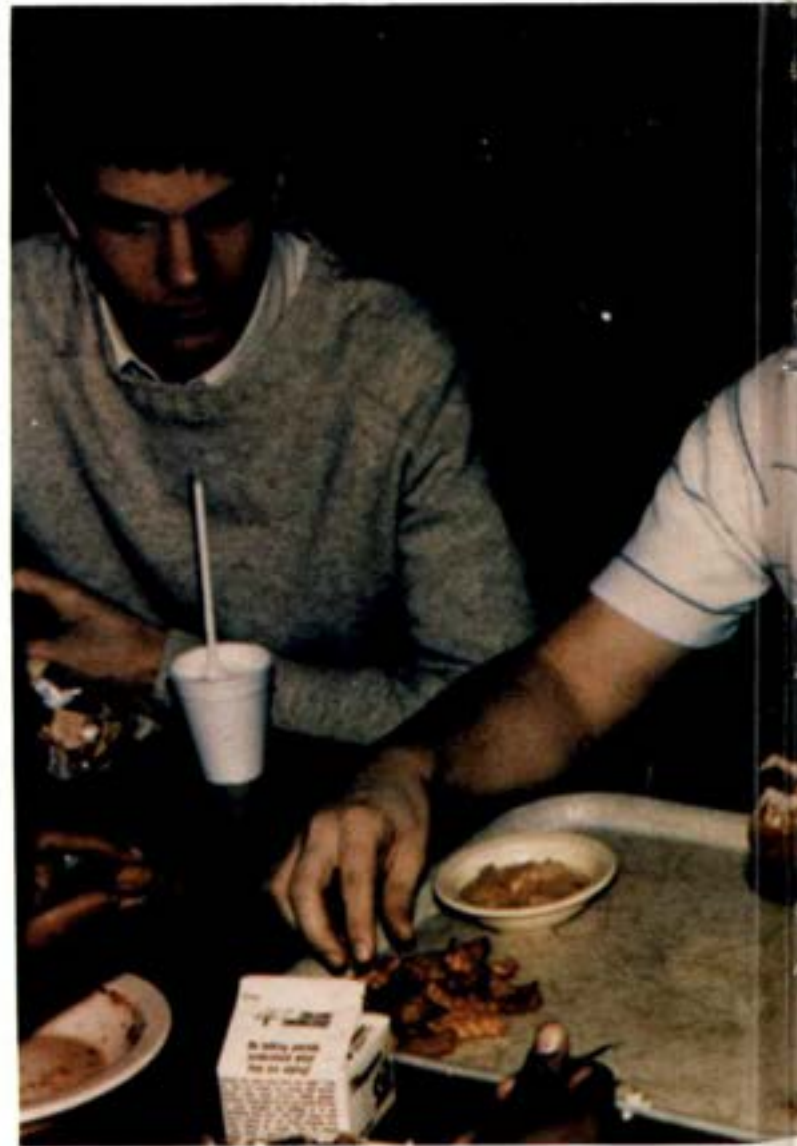

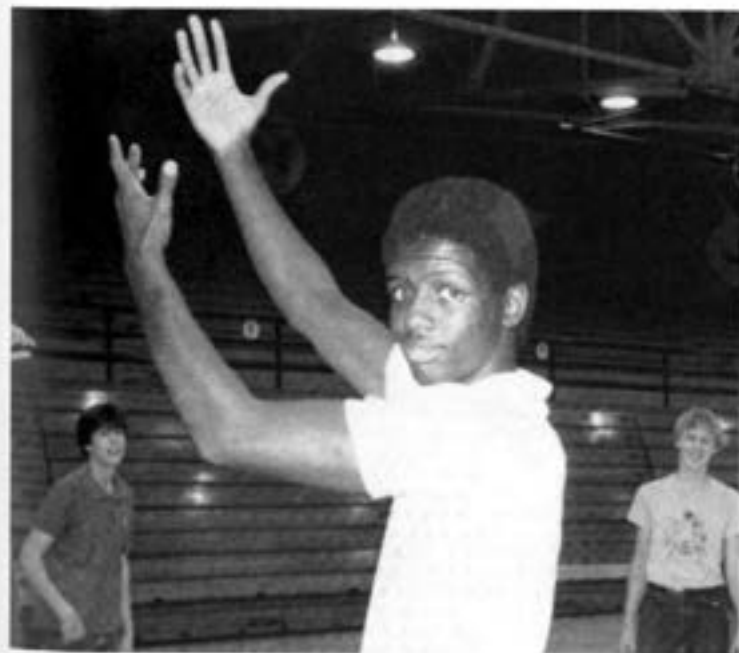

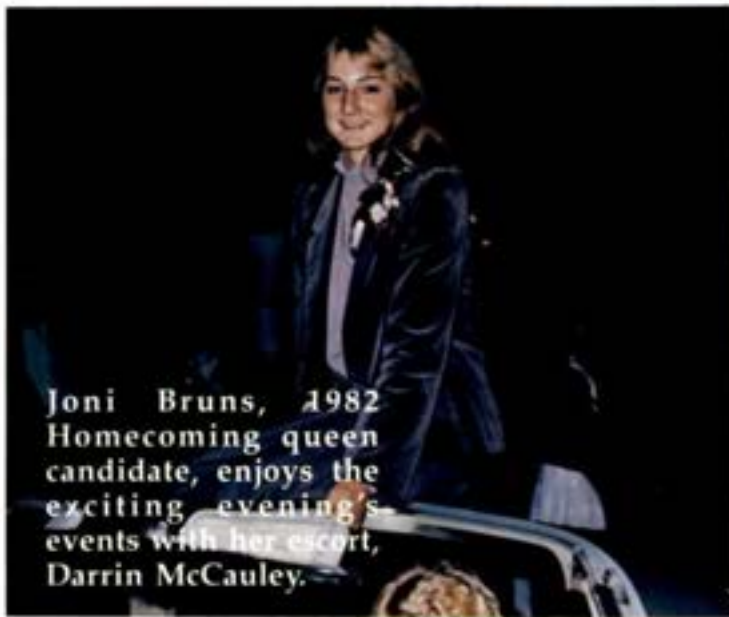

and thrill of operating a computer to be highly motivating. The computer center is a constant source of activity. Most often heard remark is, "There just isn't enough time."

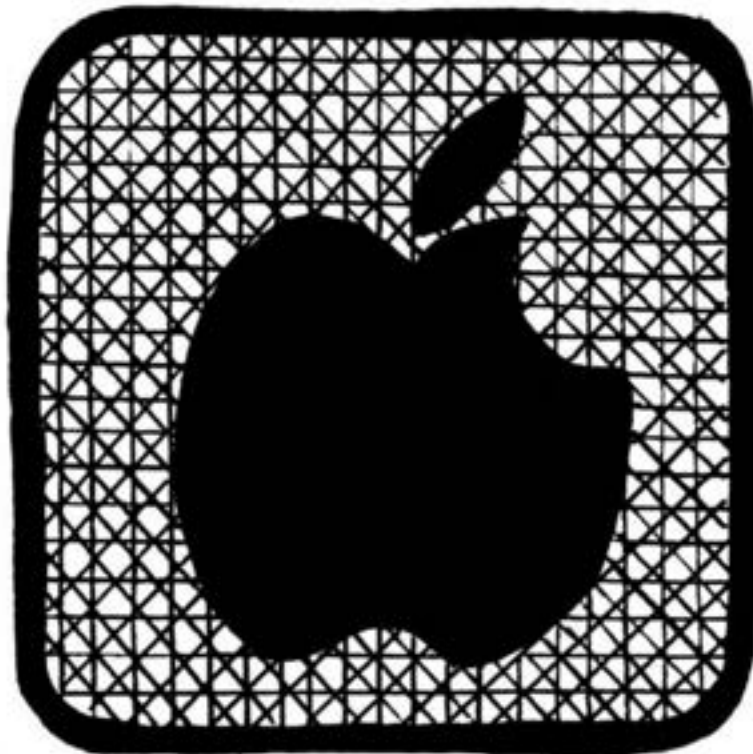
MCHS is in the beginning stages of offering a full line of computer courses. This year Basic Data Processing is being offered to students interested in the computer field.

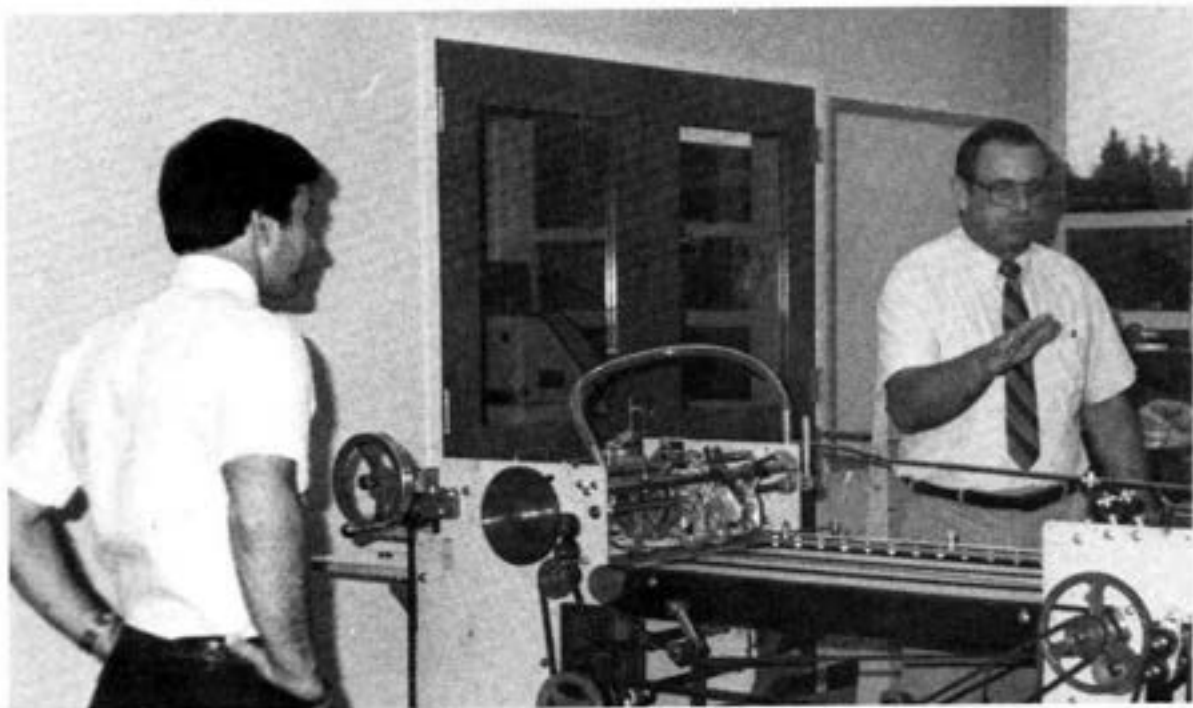

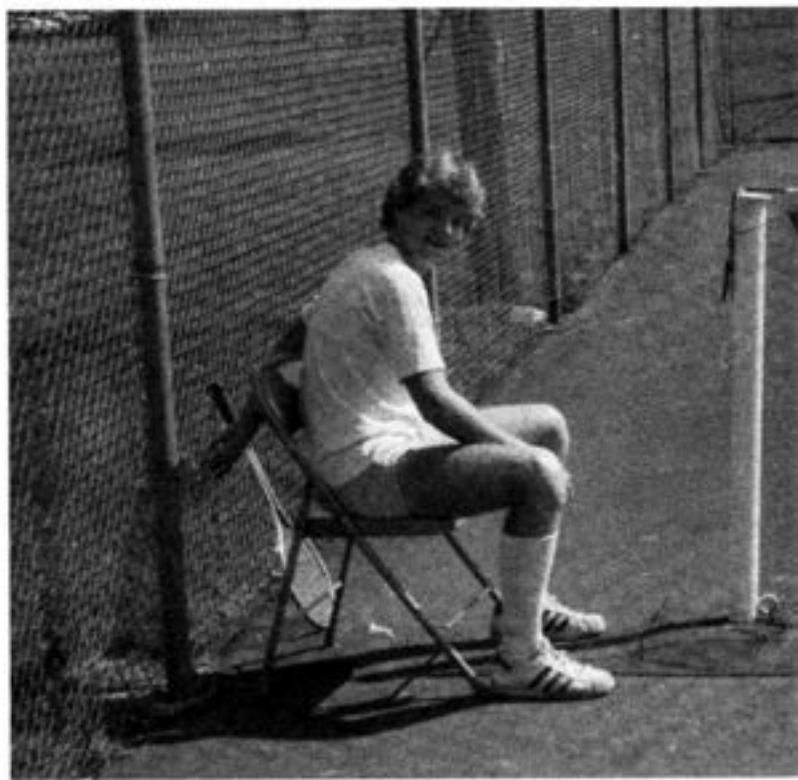

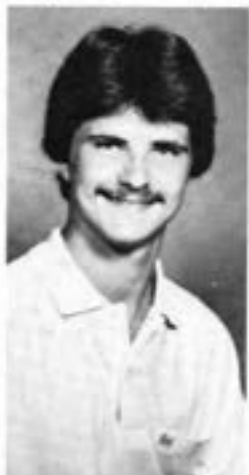

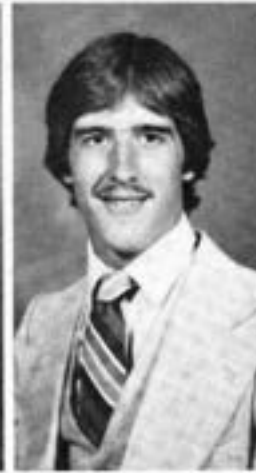

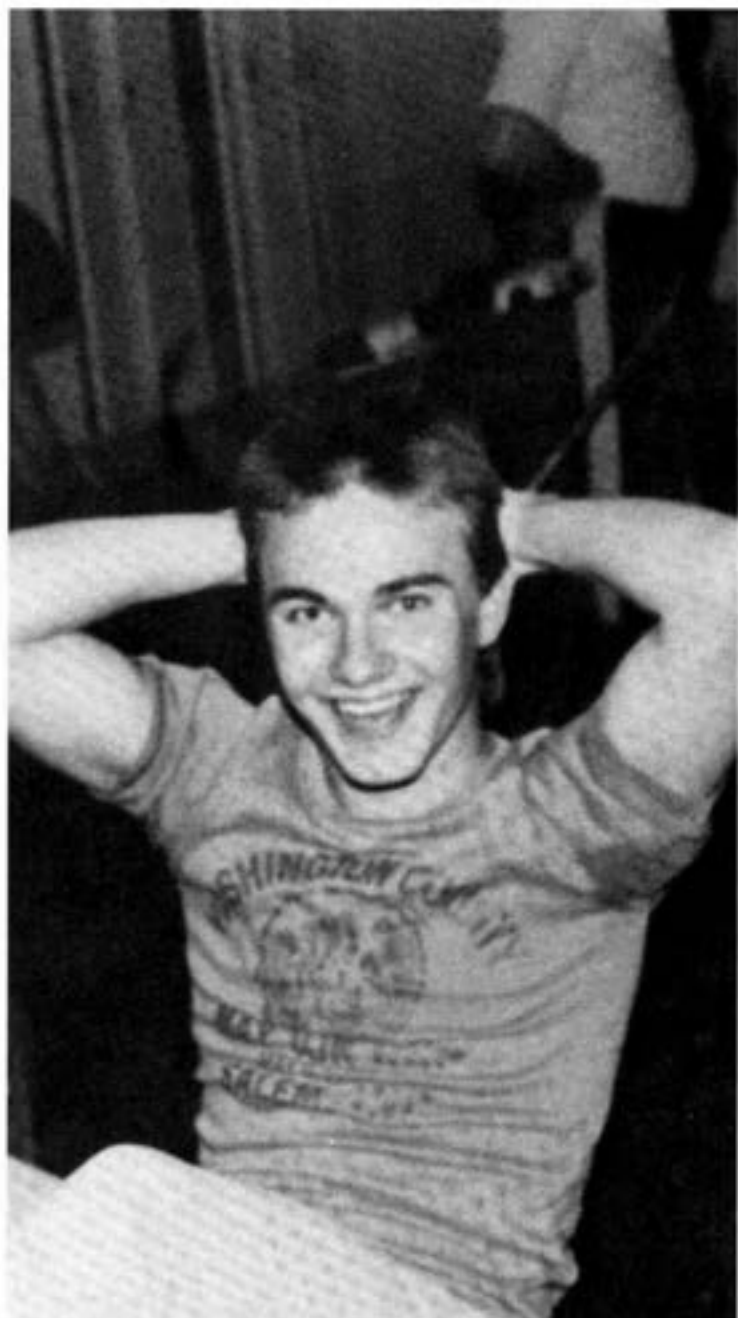

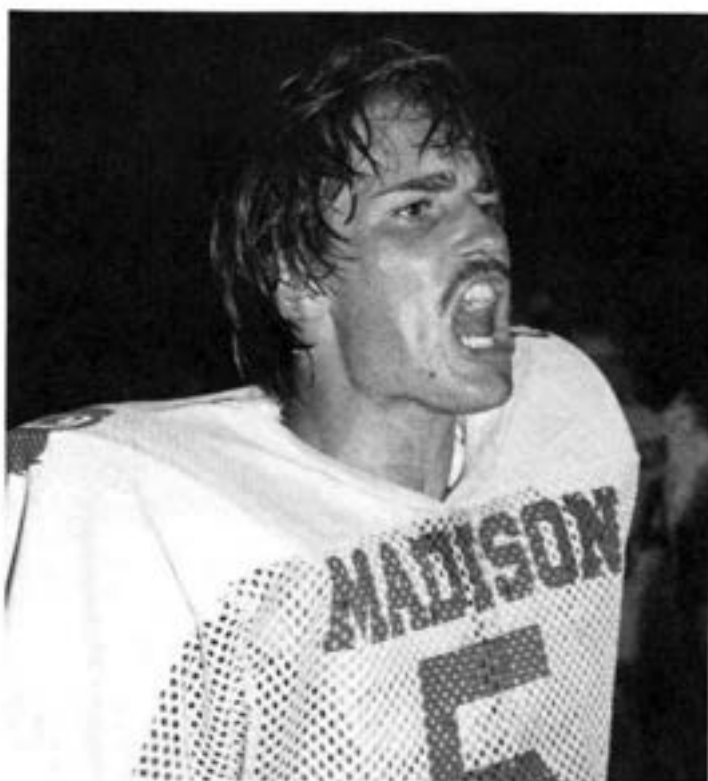

"There will be bigger victories for the Madison Cubs. There will be bigger tournament trails, but there are none that will have played under the pressure that you did," coach Gary Merrell said to the 1982-83 Madison Boys Basketball team at their awards banquet.

"There has not been a team that had as much pressure on it as you did. You had a crucial situation, and you came through with Madison's first sectional championship since 1972," commented the Cubs coach.

The season was one of frustration, but the best was kept till last. The Cubs were able to beat formidable foes as Silver Creek, Hammond Noll, and Jennings County

and then lose to teams from Providence and Charlestown. The season record of 12-8 gave little indication of the type of finish the Cubs were to have.

The Cubs had to take the hard route to the sectional championship, playing three games against the tougher teams in the tournament, Southwestern, Charlestown and Silver Creek. Southwestern was bent on revenge after being beaten twice by the Cubs during the regular season. The game was closer than anticipated, Silver Creek next had lost to Cubs during the regular season and the Cubs had an uphill fight mentally. The Cubs were victorious 49-47 in a real

thriller. Merrell cited his team's desire as being the key factor. "We lost to Silver Creek last year when their guard made a fantastic shot from half court at the buzzer; these kids were determined they wouldn't let that happen this time." In the final game against Charlestown the Cubs hit 22 of 46 for 48 percent from the field while the Pirates shot 46 percent.

Each team pulled off 20 rebounds, Loudon leading the Cubs with eight. The Cubs emerged victorious to a tear-filled crowd after only taking three shots from the field in the fourth quarter. Free throws made the difference as Charlestown was forced to foul in order to get

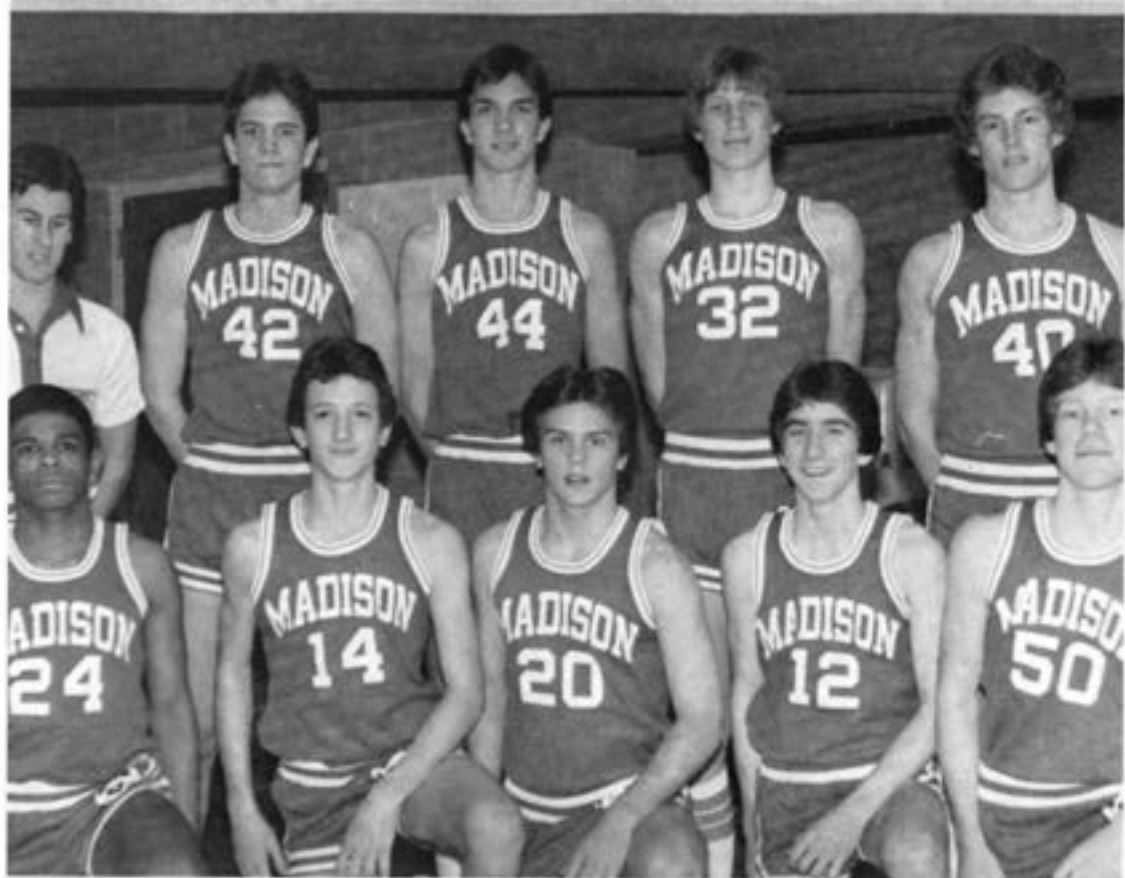

"It was an excellent year. The boys maintained Madison's reputation for being a tough wrestling team. We set a school record for the most wins in a season (13-2-1) with five sectional champions returning among the twenty letterman, next year should be another good season for the Wrestling Cubs," remarked Coach Carl Schaum.

The wrestlers winning sectional championships included: junior George Stephen—119 lbs; sophomore Jeff Jenkins—128 lbs; junior Jeff Searcy—155 lbs; junior Mike Flint—167 lbs; senior captain Jimmy Nichols—177 lbs; and junior Marvin Shaddy—heavyweight. "He had an excellent season. He worked hard. He was probably one of the best wrestlers on his feet," noted coach Schaum.

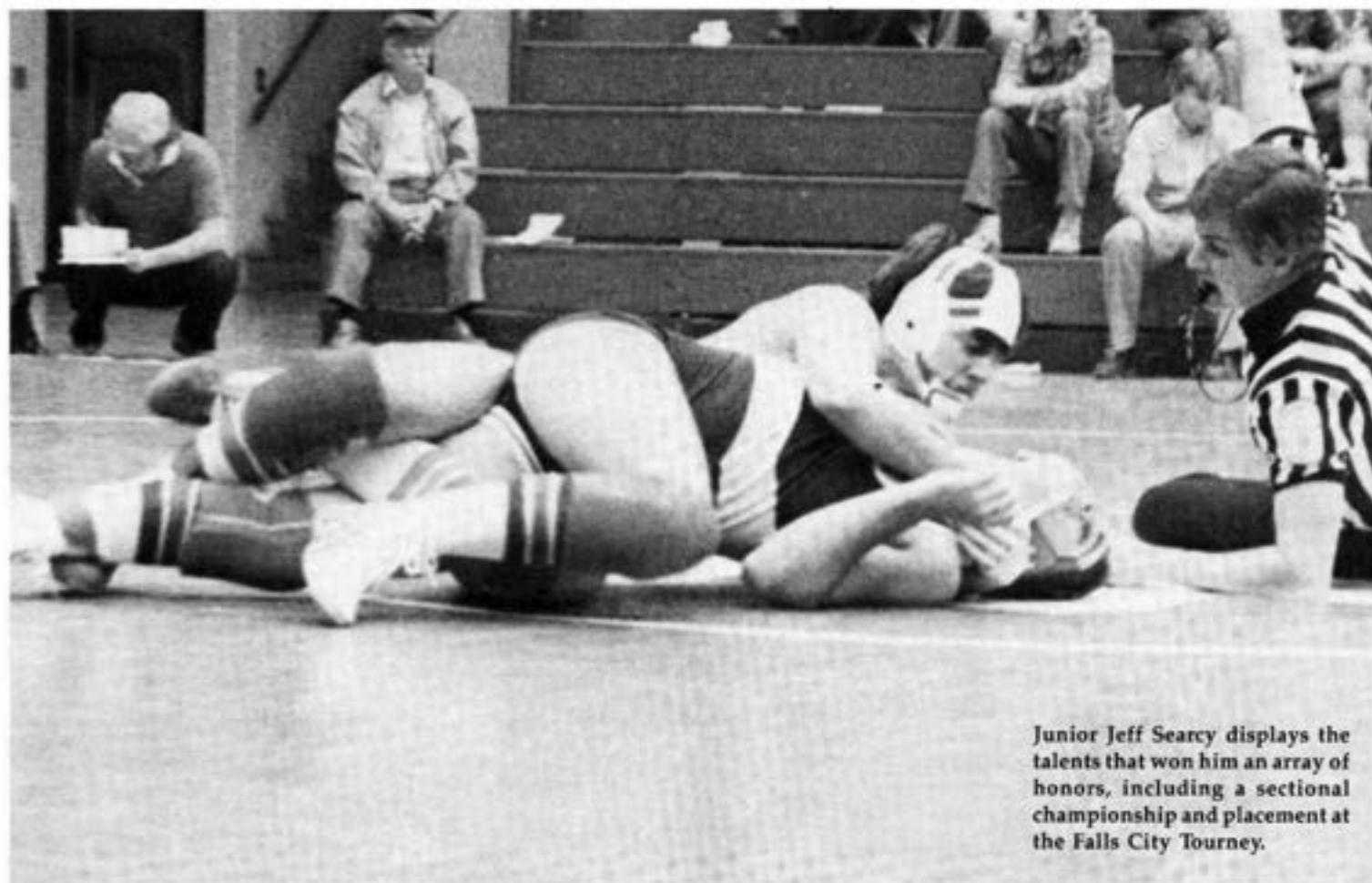
Mike Flint, who advanced

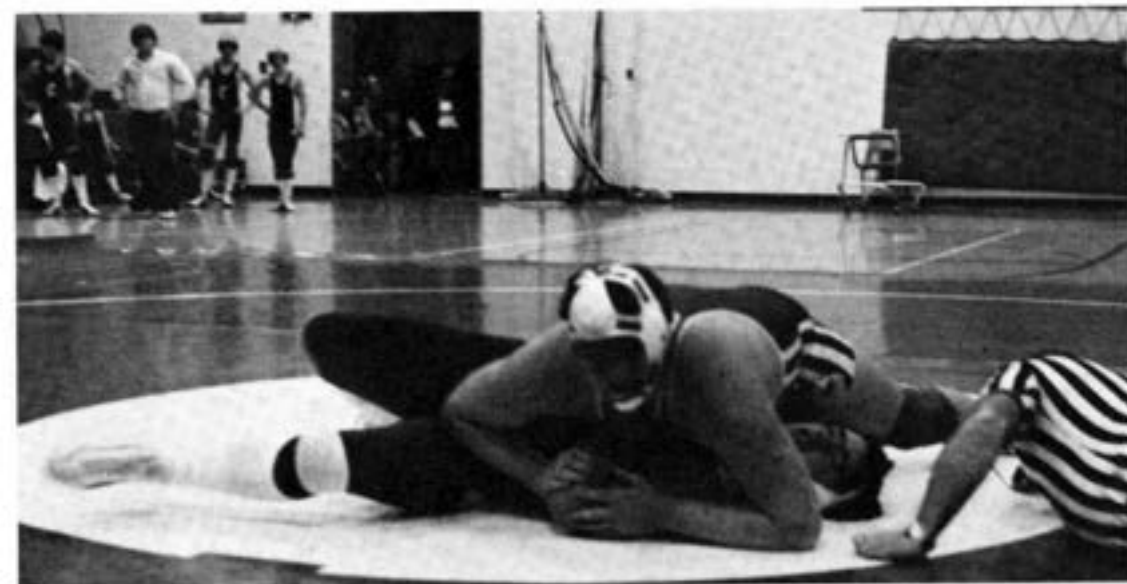

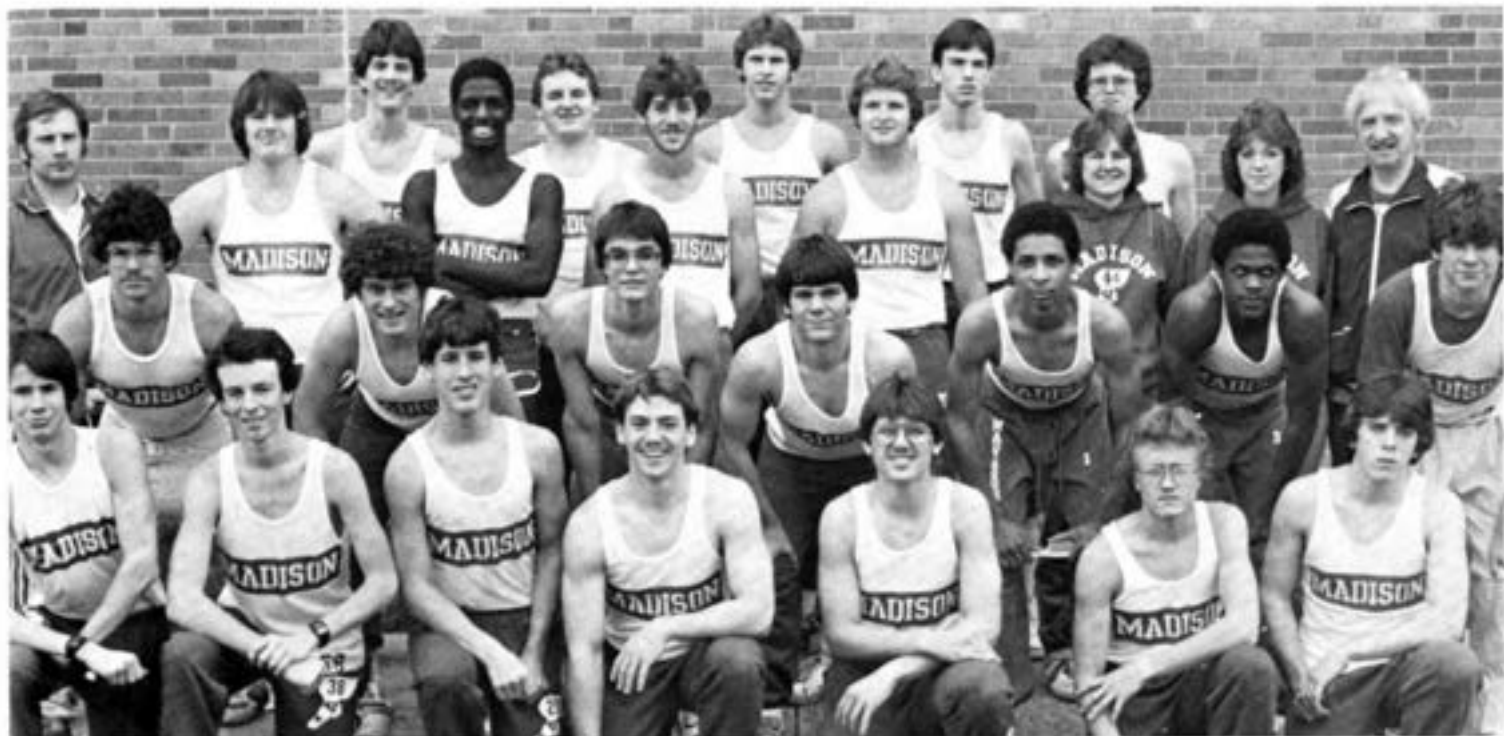

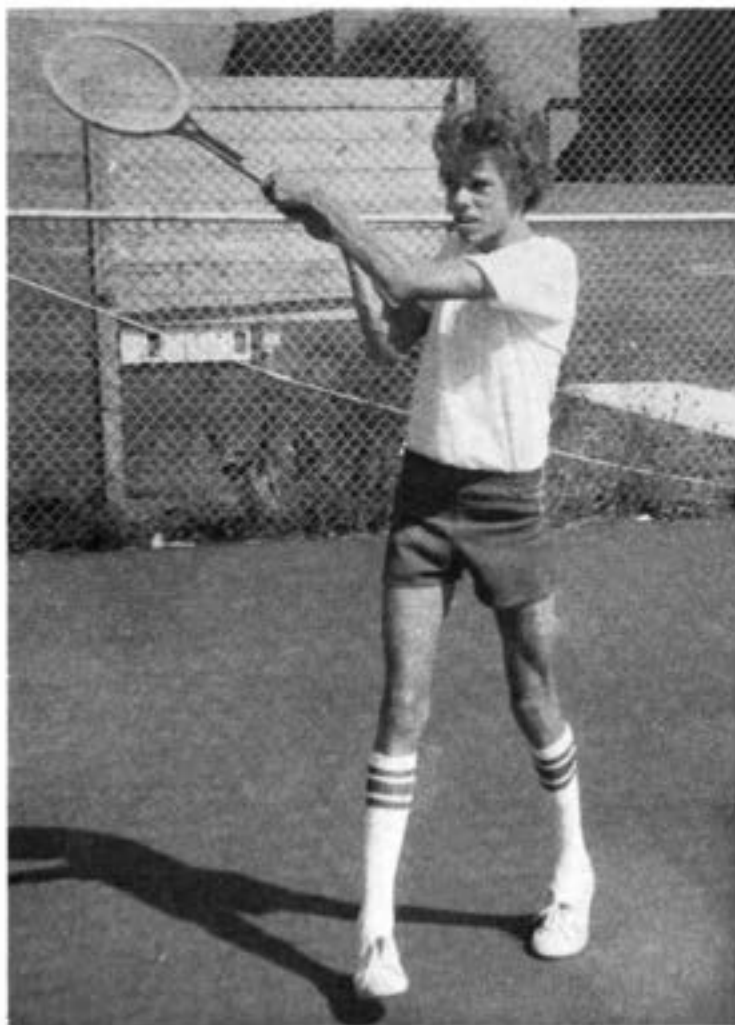
It was a good year for the softball team in its first year. The girls, under coach Jones' direction, compiled an 8-5 record, not bad at all for a new program.

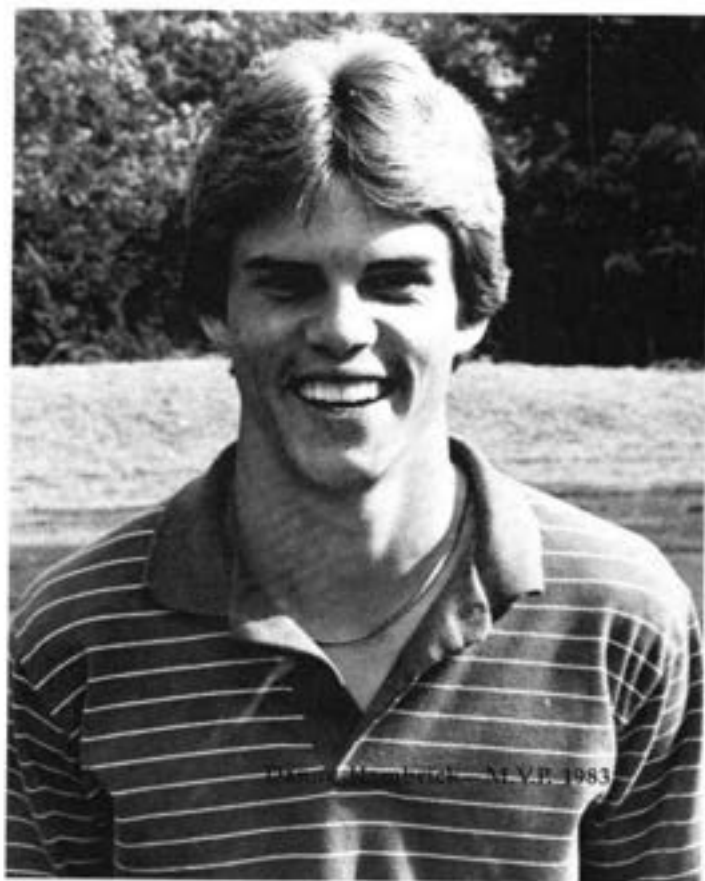

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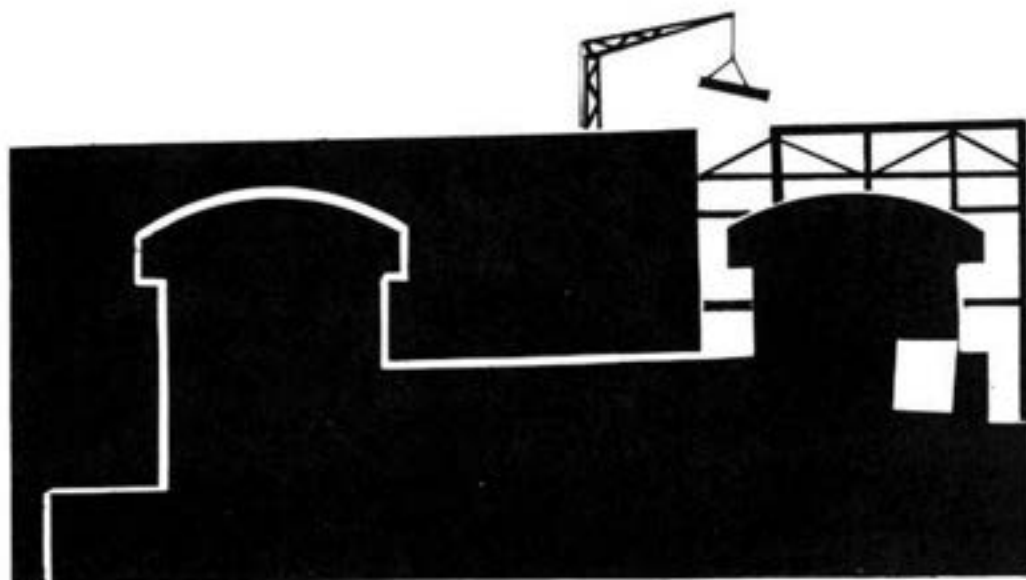
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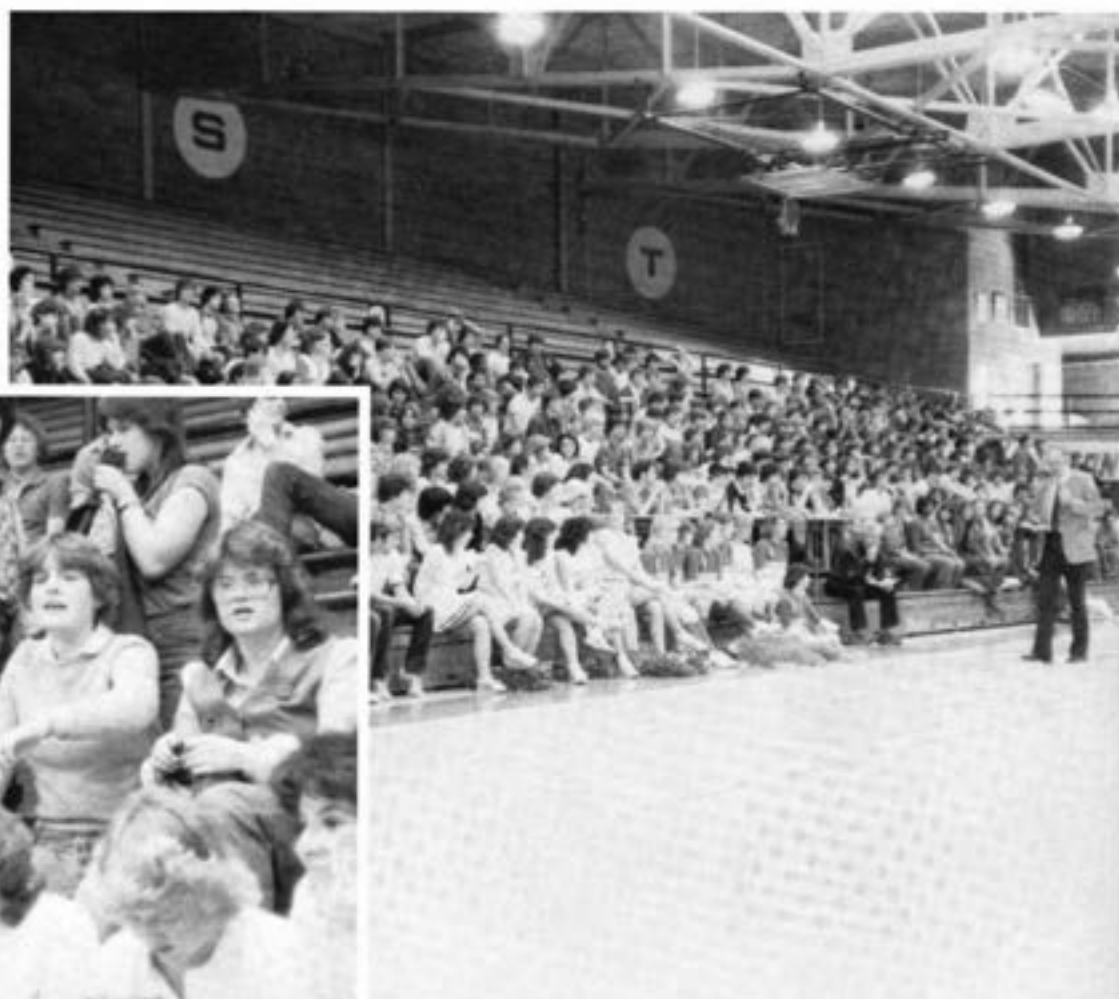
