






LIONS TAMED BY HOMECOMING CROWD

Statistically, he led the Cubs during the 1982-83 season with a 21.0 scoring average, a 10.9 rebounding average and 54.6 percent of his field goals. He was named Most Valuable Player of the Cubs and was the top player in the Hoosier Hills Conference.

Mr. Lee, High School Athletic Director, made these comments; "He's a fine young man. Its unfortunate that his birthdate fell a little early to keep him from playing here. But I'm happy everything worked out for him."

Louden finished up at MCI on April 13th and graduated with this year's Madison Consolidated High School senior class.











46 on paper but 100 in heart are the words which sum up the high school boys football season. These words were placed upon head coach Jim Kaczmaneks placque given to him by the team.



Even though the team didn't have a winning season, most definitely each player will carry something from the year to help him in later life.












A Rebuilding Year






