Changes



The students at Madison Consolidated are confronted with many changes this school year, changes that break with traditions that were set many years ago and firmly embedded in the Madison School System. While the school administration had a choice in selecting either a waiver or the directives, they felt that the Madison system, especially the high school, was close enough to following the standards so that little difference would be felt in accepting and implementing them. However, as the school got under way, the cries of "What are we doing?" and "Whose idea was this?" were heard throughout the school community. Athletic contests had to be cancelled and the requirement that athletes be in class all day. In addition the student activity period took on a new look in that it was allocated twenty minutes instead of forty five minutes in the past. These rather long days with little opportunity for the much-cherished school activities were to be held twelve times during the year.

While students have expressed a willingness to try the new changes and have remained patient, the school community is evaluating the effects of those alterations. The students are feeling the immediate effects as the school alters the traditions they have become accustomed to.









New to Madison this year, Dr. Peigh stated that there are both pros and cons to the new changes. "Right now the school system is working on possibly raising the graduation requirements beyond the state's graduation requirements. If this happens, then going to a 7 period day would not only be beneficial, but necessary."



The changes don't affect every sport, but they do cause alterations in scheduling in the sports that have to be played during daylight hours which is about half of our program," stated athletic director Mr. Lee. "If we are going in this direction in the future, there's going to be a need for some flexibility."



"The changes have taken away senior privileges and freedoms that every high school student looks forward to," stated senior Wayne Detmer. "If educators would emphasize quality rather than quantity, the results would be more prolific. The new restrictions on traditional in school activities have decreased student involvement and overall, lowered school spirit."



"I don't mind the 60 minute periods, because there is more time to cover more material," stated language arts teacher Mrs. Means. "I'm not happy with the way they're handling the activities. There is too much change too fast. There needs to be a compromise."



Junior Michelle Posz commented, "This year the changes haven't affected me that much, but for some students, they have caused a lot of adjustments to be made. I had looked forward to the traditional senior privileges, but now I feel like I don't have very much to look forward to in my senior year."



"The day is too long now that we have six 60 minute periods per day," stated Mr. Caudill, head of the social studies department. "I'm glad that we're going to a seven period day next year, because I think that the student's attention span will be longer and class sizes will be smaller.



"I'd like to have a seven period day, because there would be time to take all the classes that I want and a study hall also," stated sophomore Shannon Thomas. "I would like to see some more emphasis on activities and a more regular schedule for them too."

Susanne was crowned 1984 Homecoming queen by 1983's queen, Nancy Buxton, whose escort was Brian Vance.







One of the highlights of the winter sports scene took place when Edie Schnaitter was crowned the new 1985 Miss Cub.







The class of 86 makes things happen!














Girls Make Waves!






tournament due to an injury that he received in the sectional.














