The space shuttle Challenger was scheduled to lift off at 938 a m. January 28, 1986 but was delayed 2 hours due to problems with ice on the shuttle's support structure and a falled fire protection device

At $11: 38$ when Challenger begen to rise from the haunching pad which looked to be a normal lift off Engines cut back
slightly and the shuttle approached maximum dynamic pres sure when it broke through the sound barrier.

At approximately $11.39 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Mission Contrel gave the orders "Challenger go with throttle up" Who knww the pilot Mike Smith would answer the soon to be famous final words "Roger, go with throttle up." 74 seconds after lift off Challeng er exploded. The explosion killed all 7 membars, one was a civilian. Those killed were: Christa McAuliffe, a teacher, Fran cis R. Scobee, shuttle commander. Michad J. Smith. pilot commander, Judy Resnick, Roaald McNair, Ellison S. Onizuka, L.t commander and Gregory B. Jarvis.

Although no onv is sure what caused this fatal explosion there are seweral theories. NASA and President Reagan have appointed people to a committee to find out why thee explo sion happened

On danuary 31, 1986 President Reagan anmounced that day as a mational mourning day for the seven brawe and heroic people
