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



# BUILDING SOLID FOUNDATION

The students built on to their own foundations through physical, social, and academic growth. Each student improved in some way, and each student became a bigger asset to themselves, the school, and the community.




# BUILDING STANDARDS




### **MEMORIES**

landing.



#### MUSICAL AND PLAY ARE SOLID HITS


There were two performances given by the student body.

A sizeable cast, led by Dawn ceeded in bringing back memories of the '50's for the many people who attended.









also. Not many of the students kept their smoking in that one designated area. Any time between classes, many students could be found smoking in the bathrooms, which proved to be a problem for many others.












and the thrill of completing a successful performance for an audience.

1989 was the first year that mornings to practice learning the spellings and meanings of words used in competition. The team placed first in area competition and third in state competition.












The underclassmen, bound together by lasting friendships, made it through the year. Even though the school year ended, their friendships continued to grow as they all kept building on a solid foundation.






he senior year of high school was a time that aroused many emotions. Among many others, feelings of excitement, confusion, and fear surfaced during this period of our lives.


