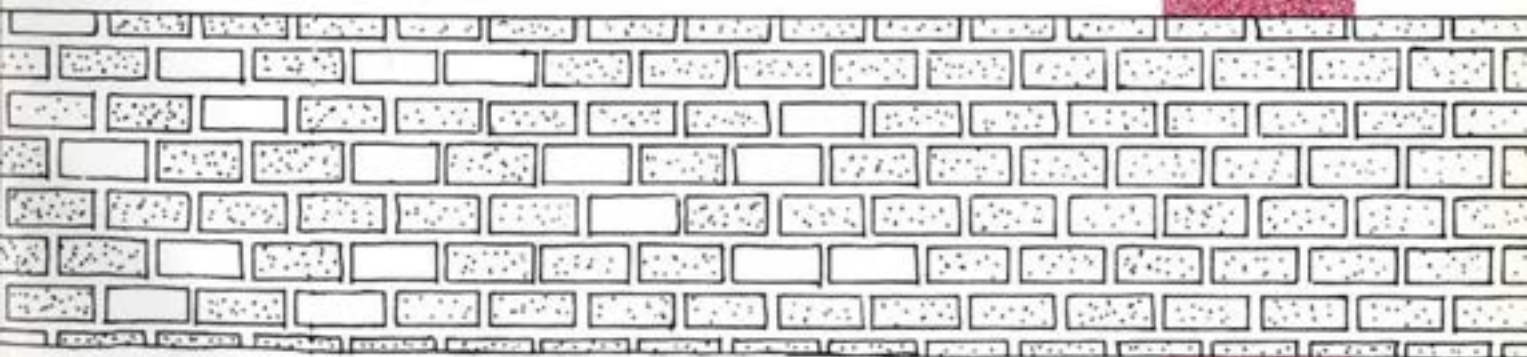

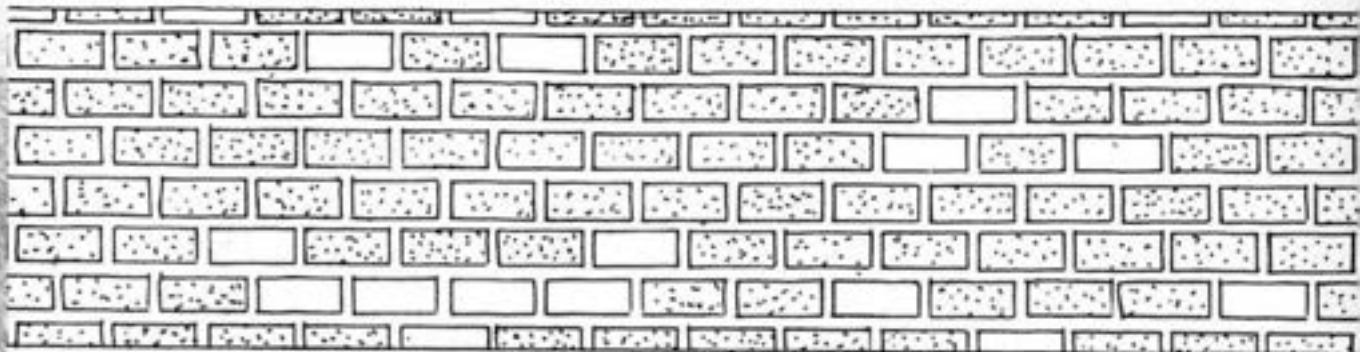
BUILDING on a SOLID FOUNDATION

The students built on to their own foundations through physical, social, and academic growth. Each student improved in some way, and each student became a bigger asset to themselves, the school, and the community.



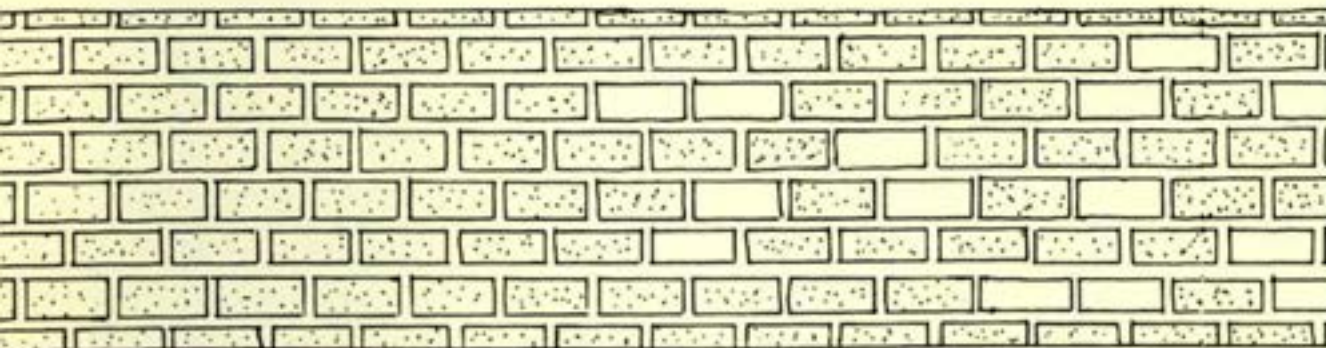
BUILDING UP STANDARDS

Madison was a place of high standards. The classes were difficult, the sports were competitive, and the teachers were demanding. The standards were raised though, and even more was expected of us.

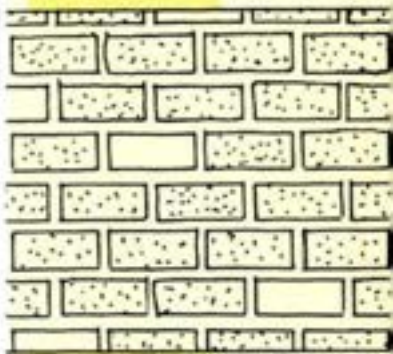

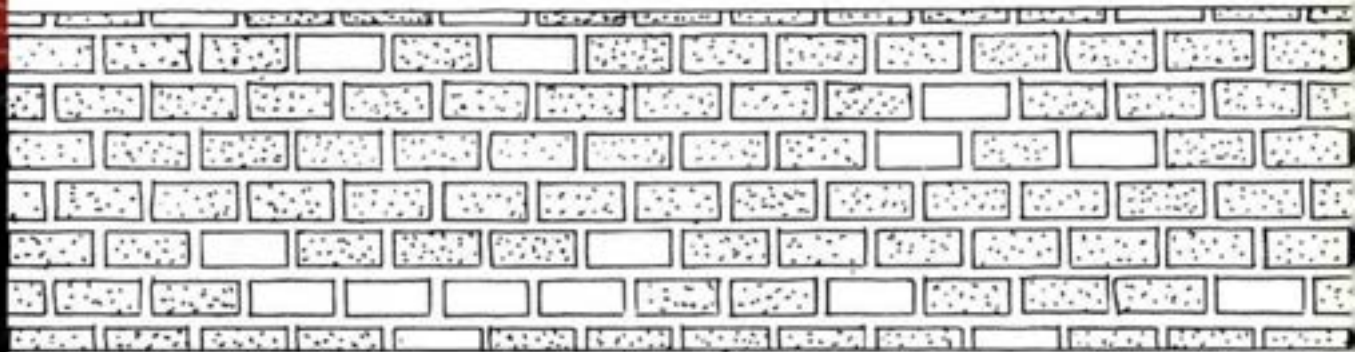

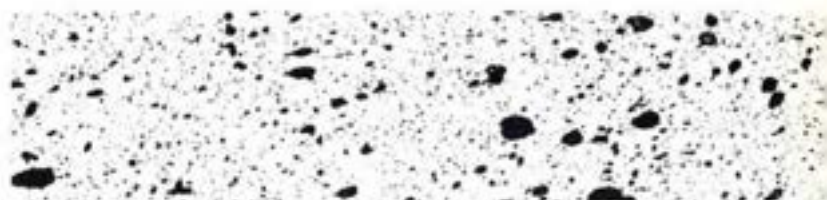

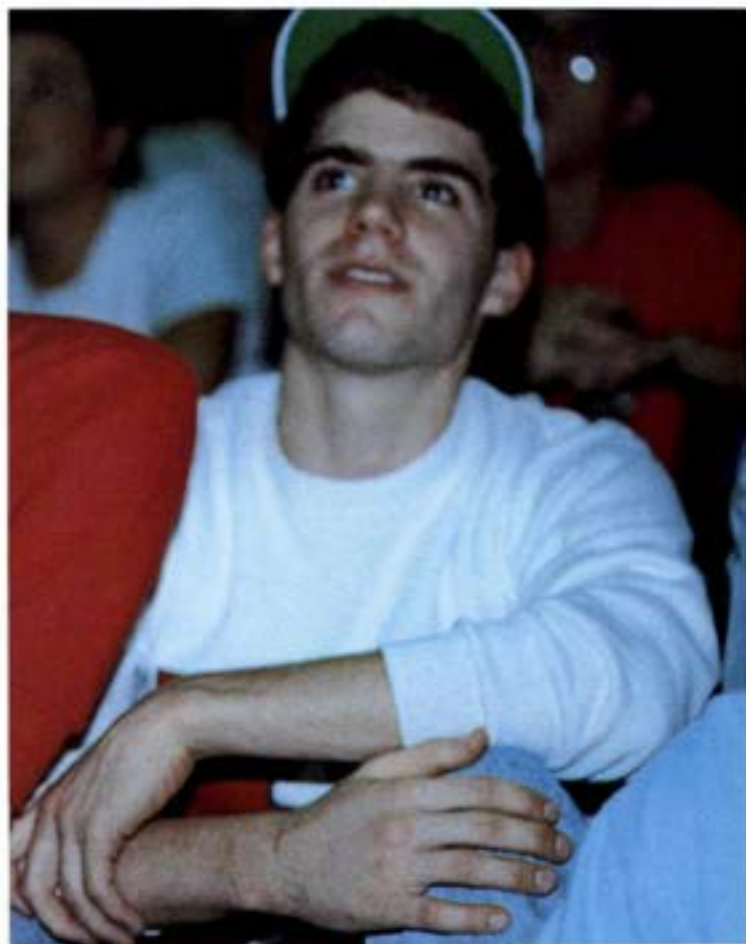
WEEKEND ACTIVITIES

The hallways were always filled with friends having good times.

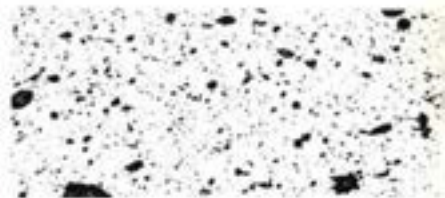
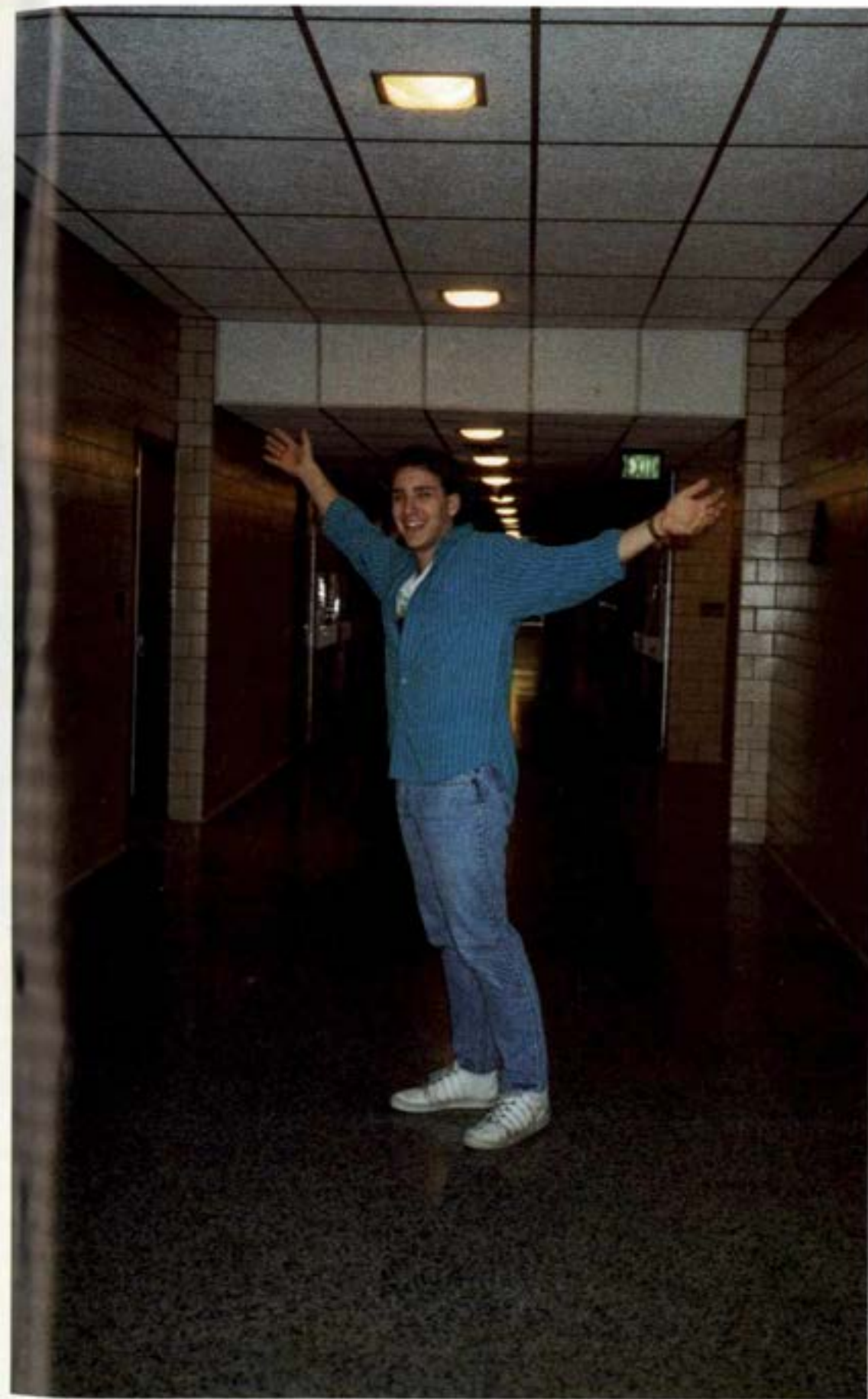

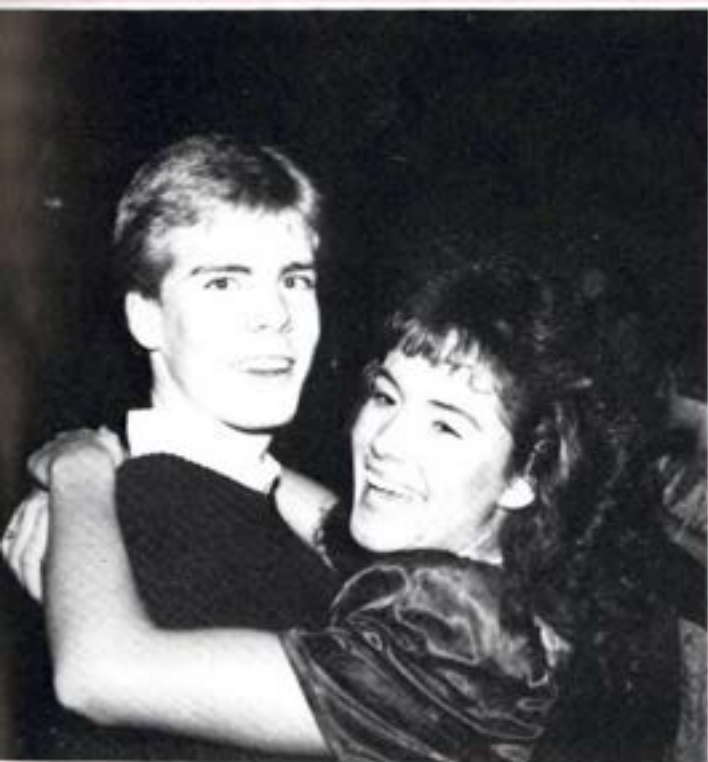
CHRISTMAS DANCE

HALL DECORATING SPIRIT!!

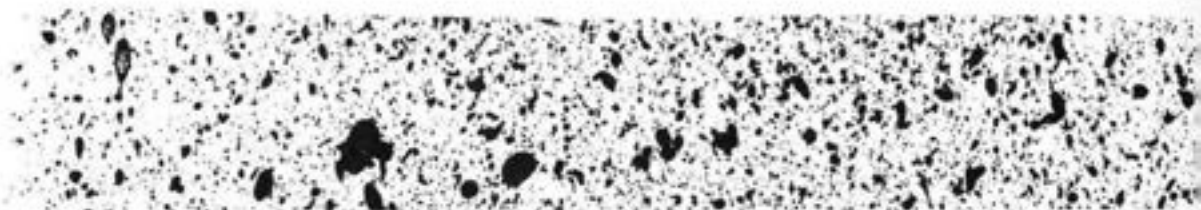

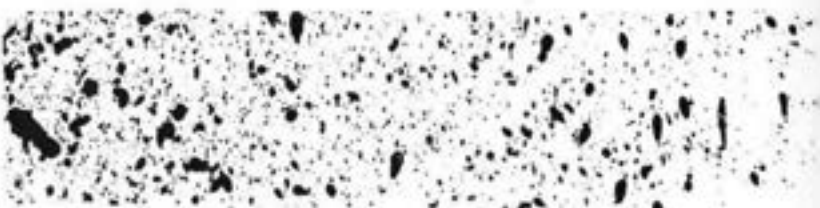

Marc Miller, and Kathe Risk.

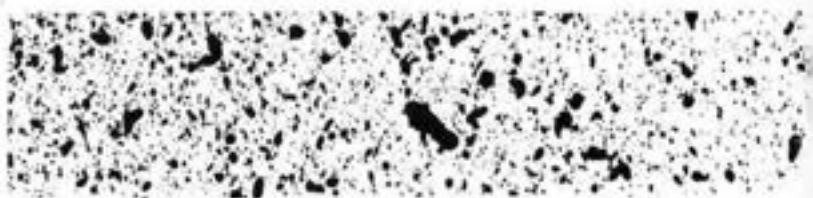
The musical "Grease" was staged in the auditorium.

A sizeable cast, led by Dawn Webster and Jamie Royce, succeeded in bringing back memories of the '50's for the many people who attended.



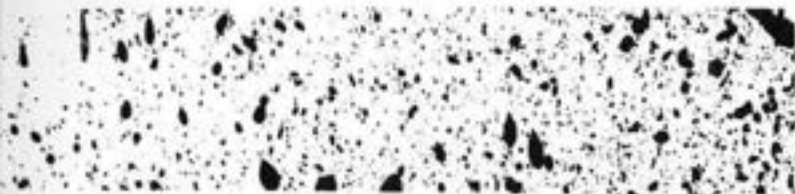

pay off their cars, a major necessity of a teenager's life.

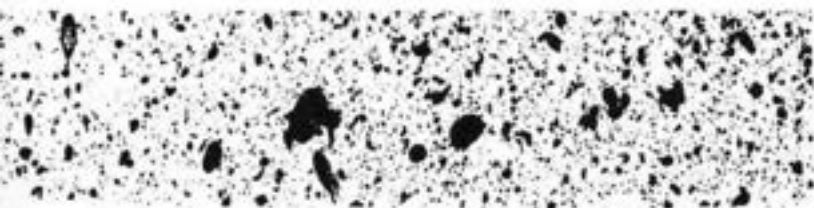

also. Not many of the students kept their smoking in that one designated area. Any time between classes, many students could be found smoking in the bathrooms, which proved to be a problem for many others.

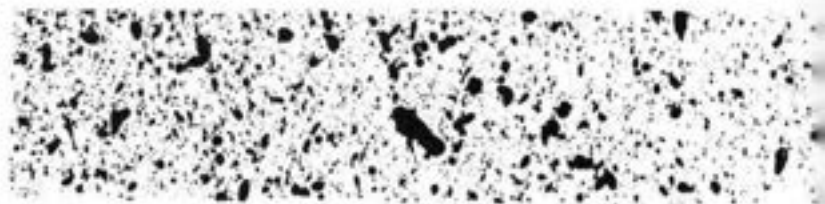

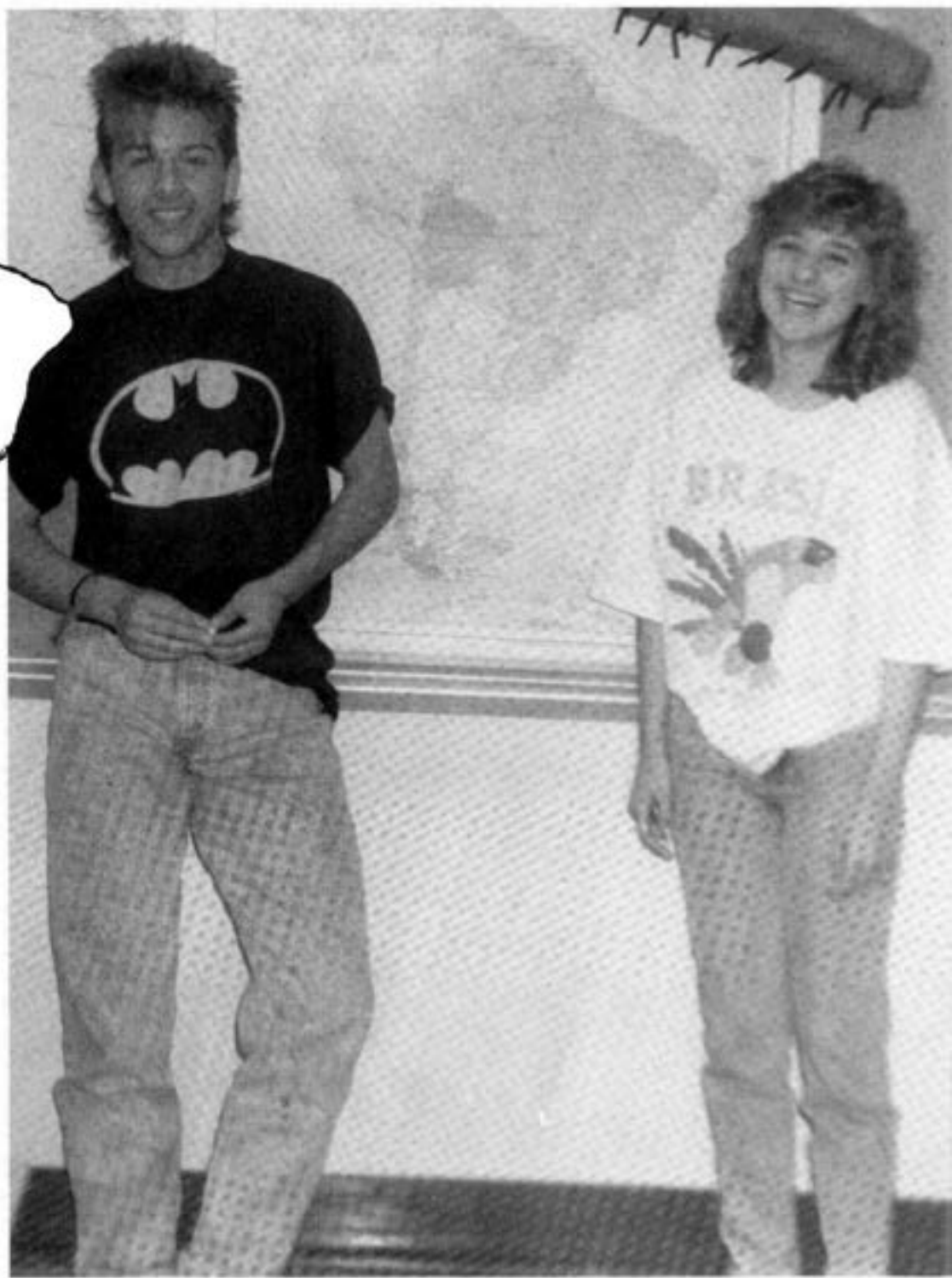

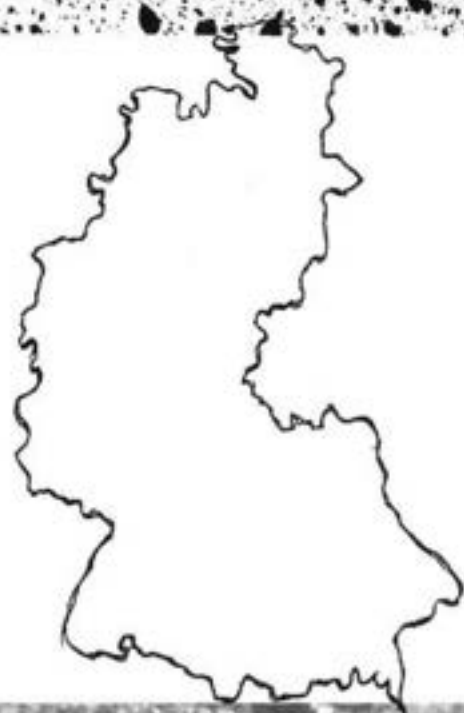

ACADEMIC COMPETITION

The Key To Success

1989 was the first year that Madison Consolidated High School students fully participated in three different academic competitions. Spell Bowl, the Academic Decathlon, and the Academic Super Bowl posed a challenge for Madison's participants, and the teams performed well.

The Spell Bowl team prepared for competition by meeting with coach LaVonne Zimmerman on weekday

mornings to practice learning the spellings and meanings of words used in competition. The team placed first in area competition and third in state competition.

The Academic Decathlon team consisted of three separate groups. Honors, Varsity, and Scholastic. These teams were required to participate in speech, interview, fine arts, social studies, math, economics, literature, science, essay

competitions, and Super Quiz. Madison won first place in the area competition, and then won several medals at state.

The Academic Super Bowl team contained six teams including fine arts, social studies, science, math, and English. The Madison team performed well in the area competition. At State the all-around team was Champion in Division II schools.

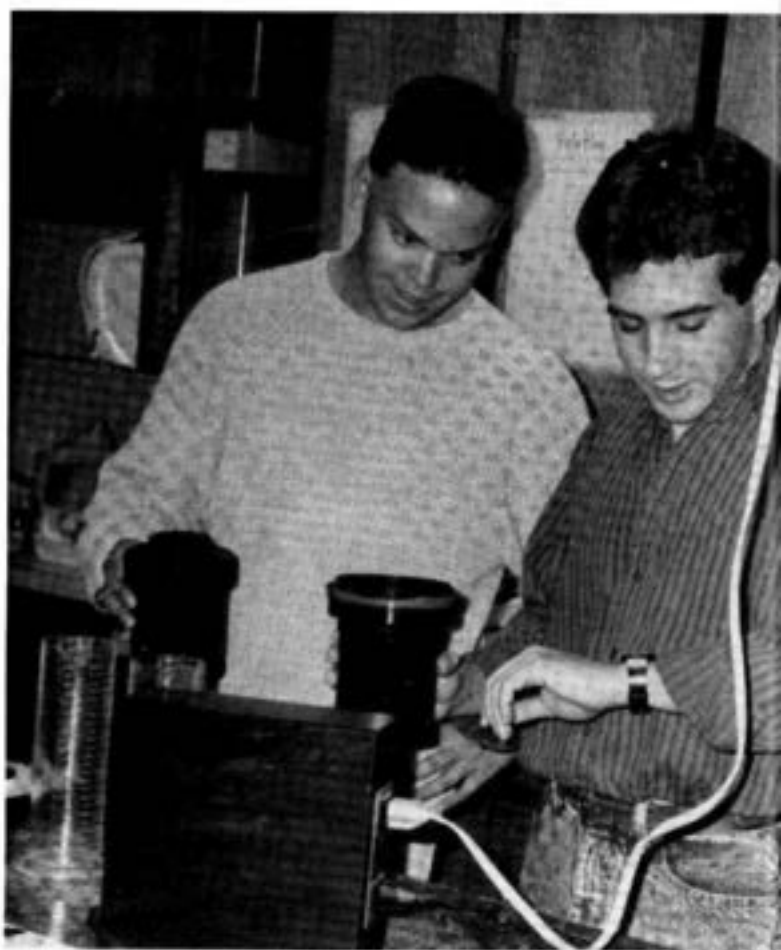

Beating The Boredom Syndrome



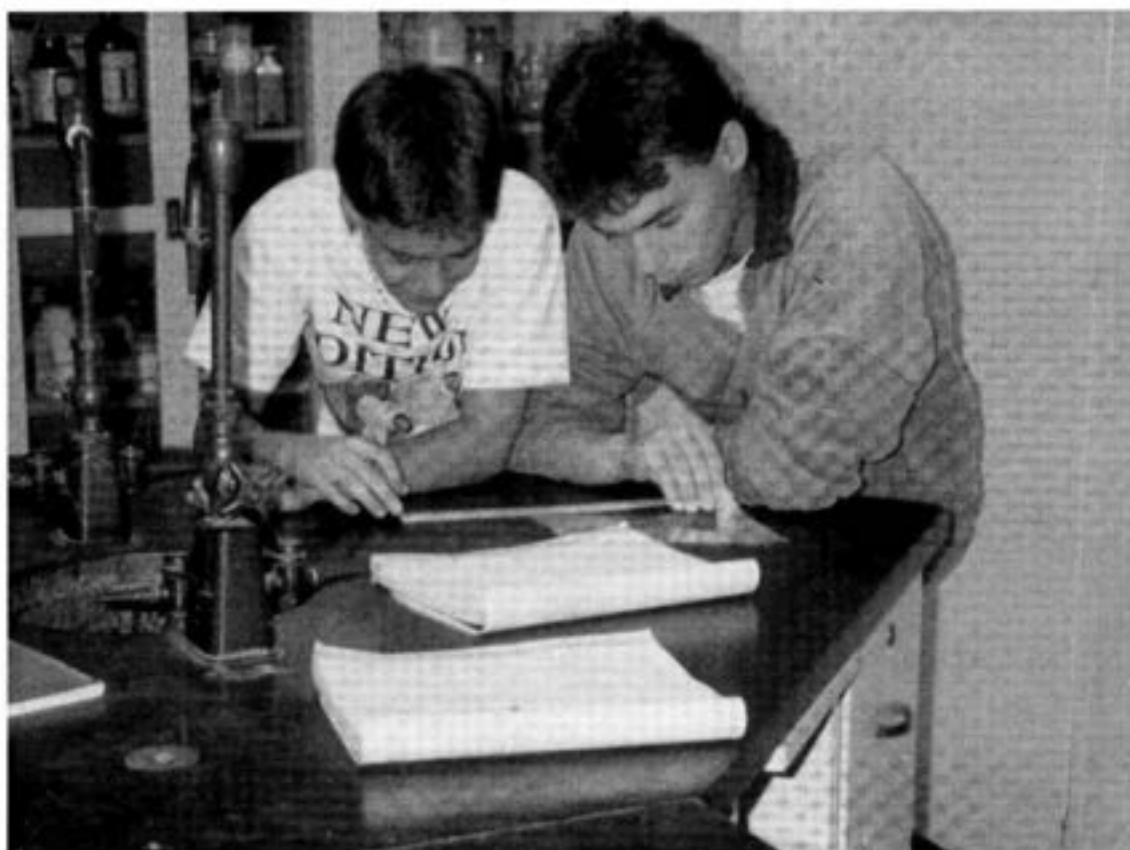

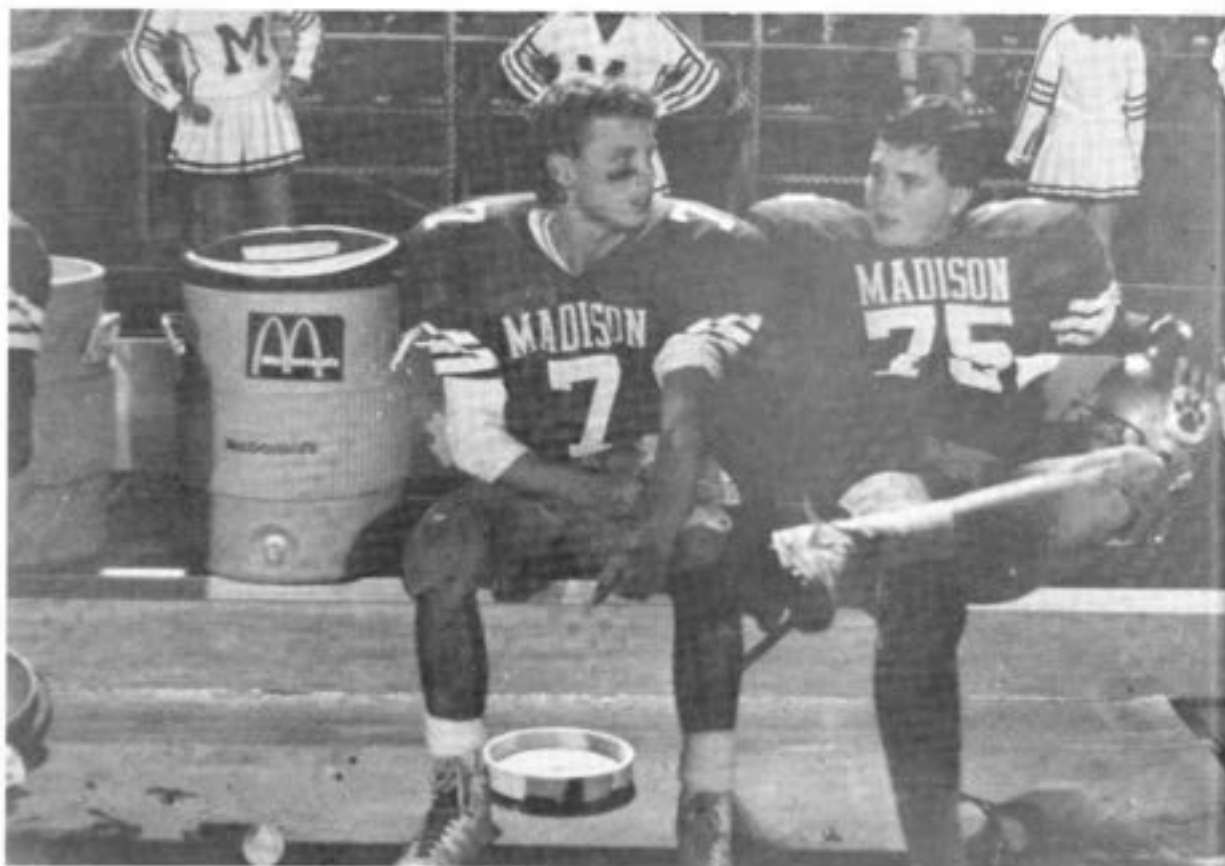
CONFIDENCE

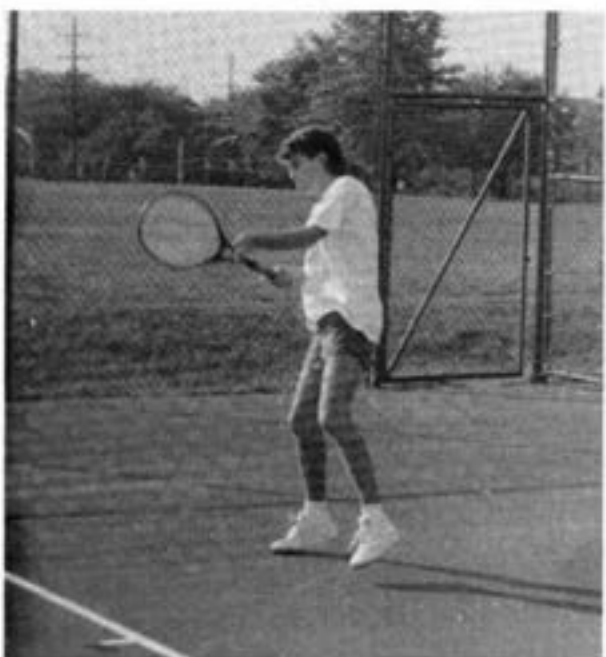

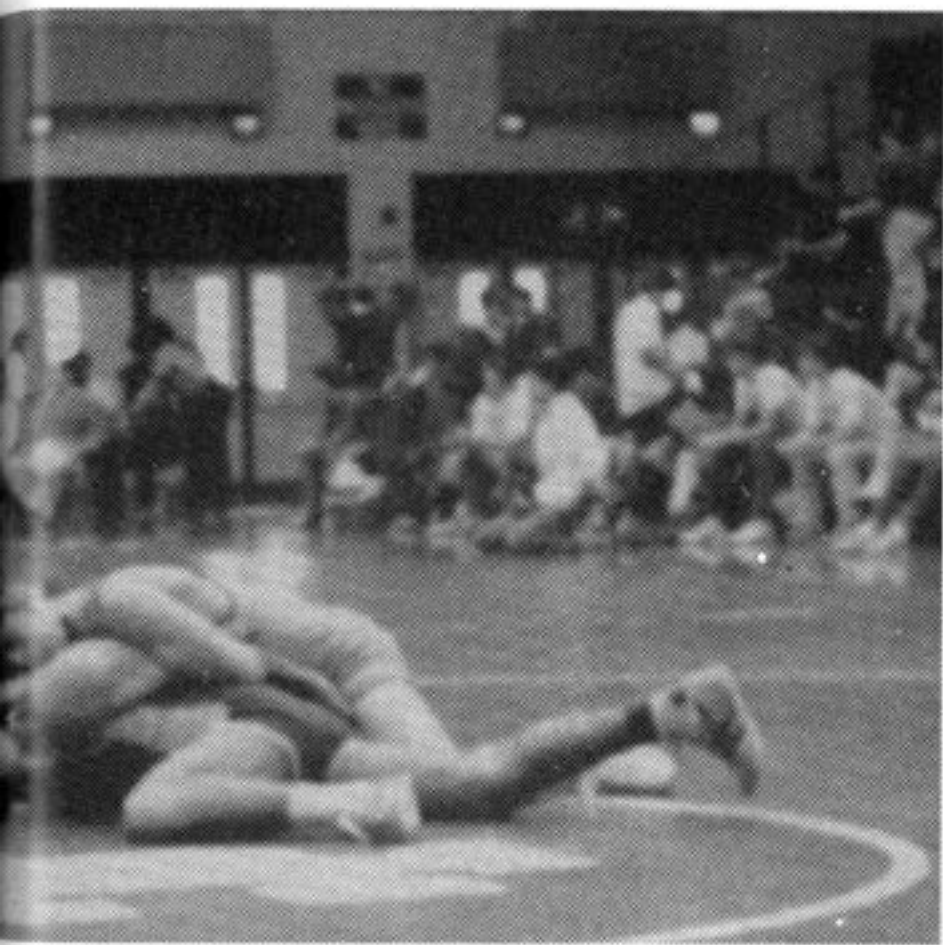

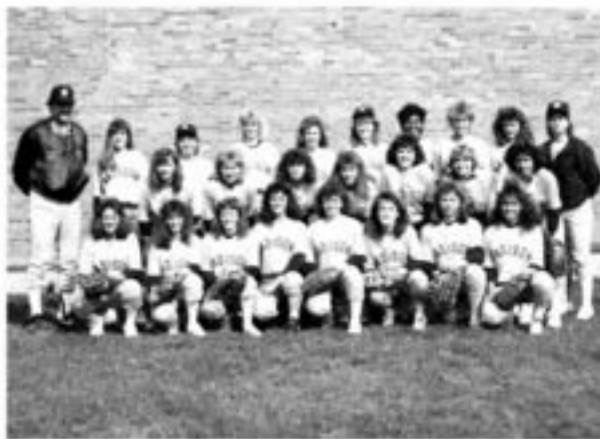

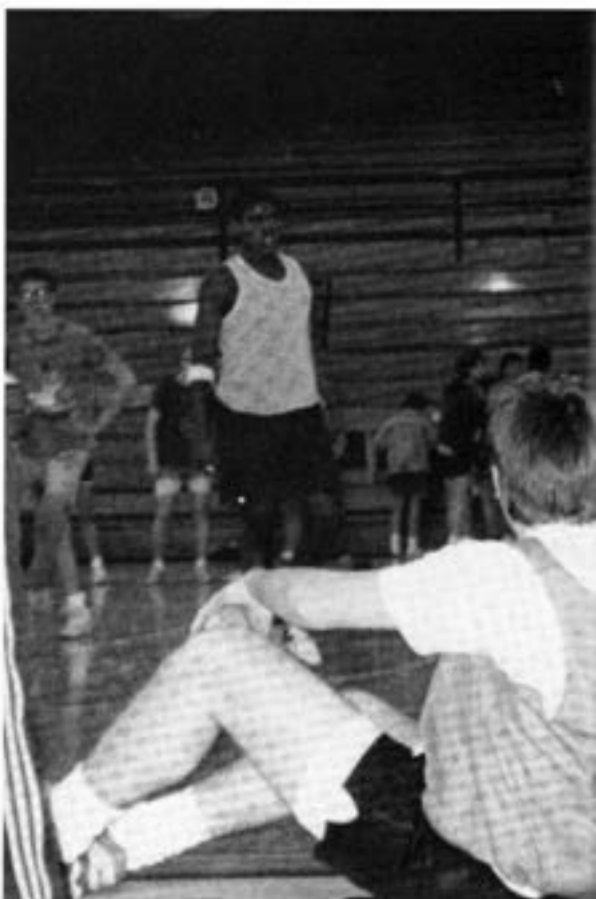

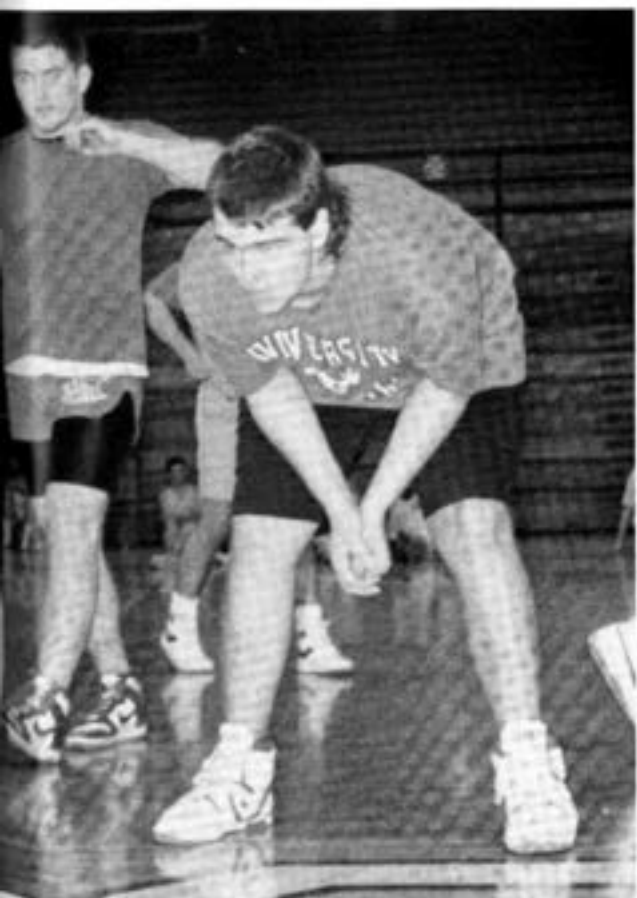

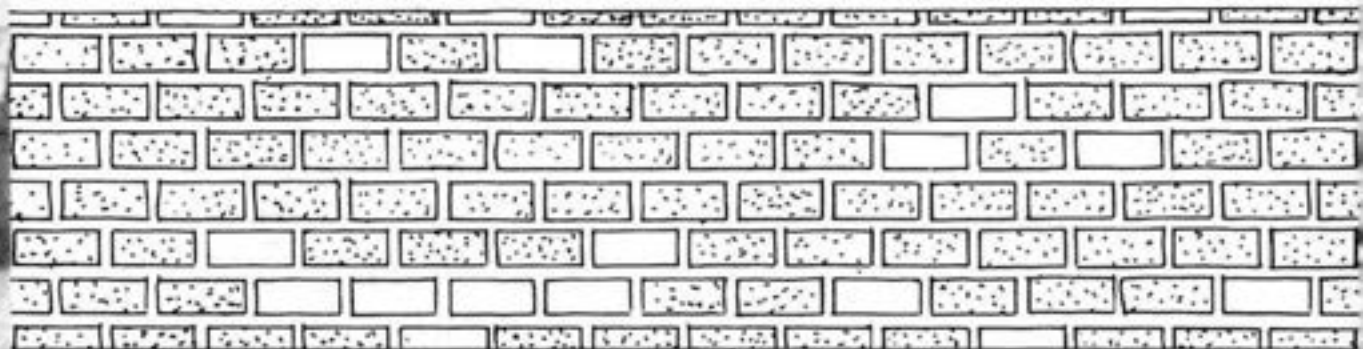
BUILDING SOLID

“Is today Activity Day?” If it was Wednesday, chances were it was. Three times a month, mass confusion set in as classes began and ended at completely different times. The end result was a thirty minute block of time between second and third periods for club meetings. The only problem — besides the fact that few teachers or students knew the activity bell schedule — was that in those three blocks of time a total of twenty-one clubs met.

“Sometimes it’s hard to decide which one to go to, like when you have three in one day. You have to ask what is going on in each of them,” complained senior Tammy Dunbar. Although activity period would often create a conflict for those with more than one club meeting, it continued to be the best way for clubs to meet as it let people involved in after school activities participate in clubs. At the opposite extreme, for those not involved in clubs, activity period became a thirty minute study period.

Whatever time clubs found to meet, they served a valuable purpose in the school. 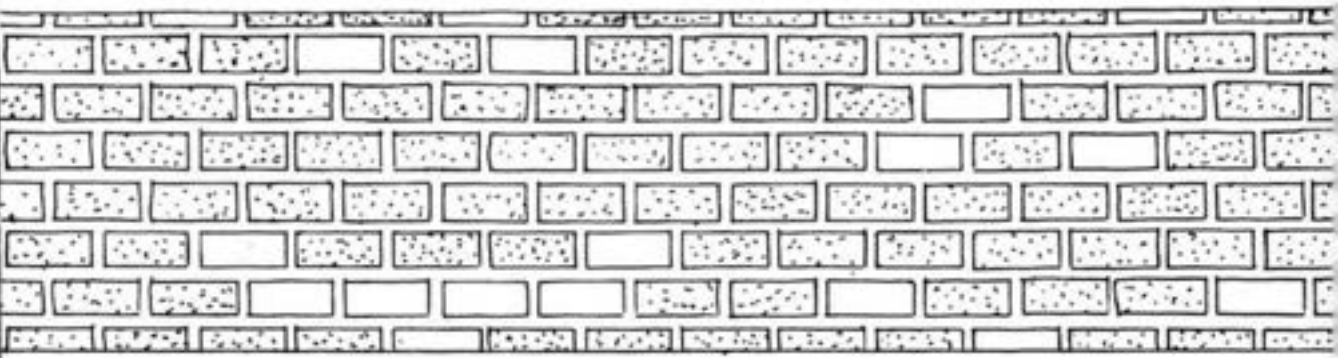
The senior year of high school was a time that aroused many emotions. Among many others, feelings of excitement, confusion, and fear surfaced during this period of our lives.

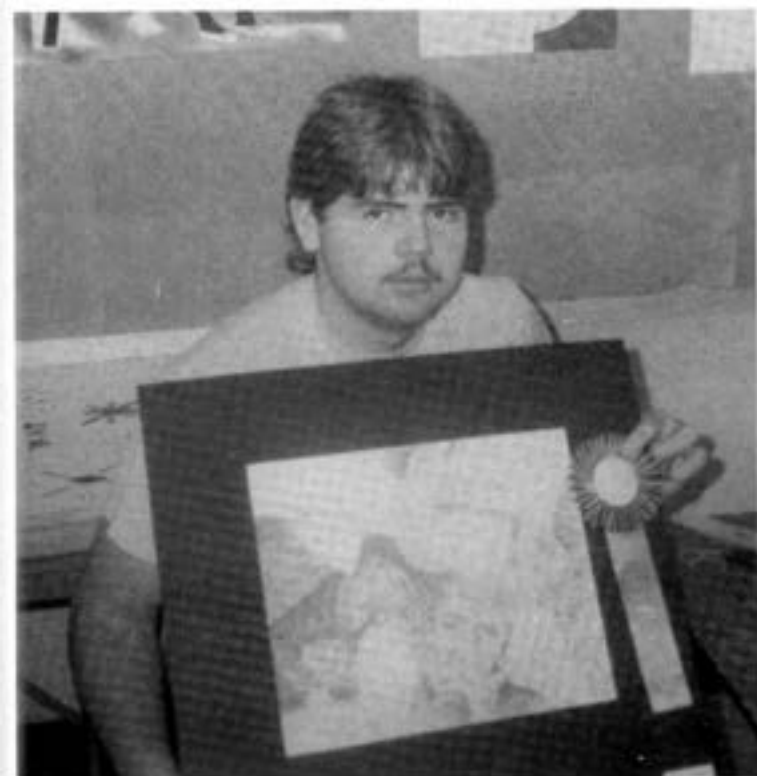
