




Dreaming of a White CHRISTMAS










In the semi-final games it was "blood for blood." The juniors were the obvious favorites, because they had two teams, while the seniors and sophomores each had one team.

With the crowd support and some excellent volleyball action the seniors brought home the prize.



CIRCLE OF ... FRIENDS












CUBS PLAY WITH PRIDE AND DETERMINATION









As this year's team was fairly young, the Lady Cubs hold a lot of promise for the coming year.












Others going to college preferred to further their education out of state. Stephanie Townsend planned to attend Florida International University in Miami, Florida. There, she will be majoring in hospitality management.







Dr. Homer Lawson, school superintendent, presented the diplomas to the graduates while Mrs. Betty Sebree awarded the honor diploma medallions.



IN MEMORY OF ROGER WAYNE REED DEC. 7, 1974-DEC. 24, 1989


