During *Rivers and Streams Day* in October, the town's favorite natural resource - the Ohio River - doubled as a classroom. Science students sloshed along the shore line to test water quality, while English students used the mighty tributary to pen thoughts of love and write verses calling for environmental protection. Either personally or through club memberships, many showed compassion for others by helping the less fortunate at holiday time and volunteering at the Salvation Army, local hospital and area nursing homes.

Through cooperation and enthusiasm, the entire student body attempted to master the tools needed to **Rise Above the Rest** and be prepared to face the "real world."






Before Activities
































