




Principal Roger Gallatin stated, "The wing is a great asset to our school. The new addition will offer a wide variety of services that are found in the real world, enabling students to go into society more prepared."





Missing nine days of school because of snow disappointed seniors as they looked forward to graduation. In early January, Mother Nature dumped 12 inches of snow to create three foot drifts and make Jefferson County roads impassable. The *Blizzard of '96* marked the second big snow of the decade, with the last one occurring in 1994. Most students spent the days sledding at Hardy Lake Dam, traveling to Paoli Peaks to ski, catching up on sleep, and shopping in Clarksville and Louisville. Highway crews cleared the main arteries within a couple of days, but the county roads demanded a lot more than salt and cinders. 



ACADEMIC COMPETITION

Academic Decathlon

The Decathlon team sported a very successful year. In January the squad captured Overall Champion honors in the small school division in the Area Academic Decathlon competition at Southport High School. Team members earned 38 medals in nine areas, plus a third place rating in the Super Quiz. In state competition, Madison placed eighth. Members brought home seven medals - *Honors Division Winners* Kellie Park, second in interview, and Nicholas Buchanan, third in mathematics; *Scholastic Division Winners* Julie Demaree, first in speech, and Gayle Putrich, first in science and third in language/literature; *Varsity Division Winners* Angel Gardner, first in language/literature and second in interview. The Decathlon topic focused on *Competition and Cooperation*.

Spell Bowl

At the 10th Annual Hoosiers Spell Bowl, held at Switzerland County High School, Madison tied for first in the Class II category. The spellers correctly accumulated 75 out of 90 correct words, resulting in a tie with South Dearborn and Austin high schools. In the tie breaker competition, Madison outspelled South Dearborn but deadlocked with Austin. As a result, both schools shared the honor of regional champions. Perfect spellers for Madison included Annie Hoffman and Jayme Hart. Madison went on to compete at state, where the team received a fourth place overall in the Class II category.

Super Bowl



JOURNALISM / MEDIA

Journalism I, II

Before the school year ended in June, 30 J-I and J-II students produced 18 editions of *Time Out News* and four issues of *The Madisonian*. The last newspaper featured 44 pages, with a picture and brief biography of each senior. The 20-minute weekly video newscast also aired on local cable, as well as throughout the school each Friday morning. Numerous staffers attended conferences - from Bellarmine, IU Southeast to Ball State - to broaden their knowledge of media, technology, operations and issues. At the SISP conference in November, *The Madisonian* received nine major awards. Over the summer, senior Karen Roark captured honors for her division at the Indiana University Journalism Institute. Later the National Newspaper Association named Roark one of seven national winners for her advertising work for Mike's Grill. Katie Wildman and Gayle Putrich also merited regional recognition, winning mini-internships in public relations and newspaper. One of five tapped from the Louisville Metro area, Putrich won a one-week job-shadowing opportunity with *The (Louisville) Courier-Journal*.

Yearbook

Through the hard work of 15 staffers, *One Step Closer* evolved. The 136-page book featured 32 pages of process-color, which included the opening and senior sections. To accommodate the newspaper, video newscast and yearbook load, the journalism area acquired four new Power Mac computers, a scanner and a 600 DPI laser printer. In April, Erin Chapman, Kendra Gordon and Kara Dryden attended Ball State J-Day to learn new ideas for the 1997 edition.

Social Outings

Keeping with tradition, J-students participated in several cultural and entertainment outings. Numerous staffers ventured to the Kentucky Center for the Arts to view *Miss Saigon* and *Cats*, plus enjoyed *Christmas Carol* at Actors Theater in December. 























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

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

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








Biology II students Jill Pyles and Cari Barnes work together to dissect a baby pig. The annual project acquainted students with the location and relation of body parts.
