
What we do from... Sunlight to Starlight




Star in the Spotlight

Madison Consolidated High School Show Choir and Madrigals are always trying to find a break to breathe. Their lives are constantly busy with the main contest and performance time starting in January and ending in March, there's always something to prepare for whether contest or show.

The Season usually starts for the Madrigals during the first weekend of February with the Indiana State Sectional Music Administration, a vocal contest. The Madrigals earned a one in group one which means they advanced to state. The Madrigals represented Madison well and brought home a II. Madrigals ended their performances in May at the Choir banquet.

Show Choir prepares for their biggest show of the year, The Show Choir Extravaganza. This year it happened to fall the day after contest. The show has largely grown since two years ago when the show only had two show choirs. Madison and Southwestern Esprit. This year the Extravaganza gained two new schools: Jennings County, and South Dearborn. The Show Choir usually headed to their contest at Paramount Kings Island in April but due to the many activities happening the weekend they were to perform the group declined the invitation.

The Show Choir had two special performances during the year. The Show Choir put on their show for the area youth when they toured the local elementary schools. Both the members and children enjoyed this opportunity. "It gives us a chance to show one of the exciting parts of the choir department and it really helps get the kids interested in our department," stated Senior Gayle Putrich. The most extraordinary performance of the year was their chance to participate in the Valley Choral Festival.

Valley Choral originated in 1944 at MCHS. On the 53rd anniversary, it again returned to Madison. The festival is a contribution of voices from eight schools in the tri-state area. They included Clarksville, Jeffersonville, Jennings County, Madison, New Albany, South Dearborn, Southwestern, and Switzerland County. A total of 600 students participated, and one director nominated by the Valley Choral committee (school music directors and past chairman).

A normal schedule for valley is the morning confusion of arrival, introduction of director, an hour of morning practice, a 15 minute break, another hour of practice, lunch break, one last hour practice in the gym and then individual school rehearsal and dinner break. With this schedule, participants are anticipating the dinner break out of sheer boredom or the need to move. Since Madison students remembered this from past years, they decided (with the help of some past alumni) to add a twist to the routine. They organized a plan to set up for live music, sent out faxes to the directors inviting all small groups of bands or singers inside their choir to participate. Lastly they set up a stage, sound system and dance floor.

When the DJ announced all groups or bands could sign up at the sound board the list quickly grew. Bands participating included 7th Harmony, an acappella Christian pop group, which includes several alumni, and senior Eli Center. They also added a soloist from Jeffersonville who did a magnificent interpretation of *End of the Road* by Boyt II Men. By the number of students who gathered on the dance floor and jumped around and enjoyed their breaks, it was a success.





Academic Teams spell V-I-C-T-O-R-Y

The students on the academic teams deserve congratulations on the accomplishments they have made this year. Many of these students devoted much of their time and energy before and after school, and weekends to the academic competitions they competed in.

The decathlon is a national scholastic competition for grades 9-12. The levels of competition are divided by grade point average, with honors, scholastic, and varsity levels. Competing at honors were Seniors Kellie Park and Billy Underwood, and Junior David Knouf. At scholastic level were Seniors Annie Hoffman and Gayle Putrich, and Sophomore Katie Hoffman. At varsity level was Senior James Parks, Junior Angel Parks and Sophomore Christi Wolfschlag. The competition consists of ten events including a four minute prepared speech along with two-minute impromptu



speech, an interview, a 50 minute essay on a predetermined topic, six subject area tests, and a final event called the "Super Ouiz" with both oral and written phases.

MCHS took overall champion at the area academic decathlon. They competed in small school category but they were first in point accumulation over large schools also. Team members received 47 medals for nine areas and got second place in the "Super Quiz". The state academic decathlon competition resulted in an eighth place finish for Madison in the small school division. Nine medals were won at this event.

The Spell Bowl consists of 10 rounds and one student from each team competes in each round. Each round is made up of nine words, with each word worth one point. MCHS won first place at area Super Bowl for small schools as well as overall area champion. Madison spelled 79 out of 90 words correctly. State competition also was a good event for Madison with the team placing fourth in Class II spelling 77 out of 90 words. MCHS had three perfect spellers at state including Juniors Jayme Hart and David Knouf, and Freshman Tracy Ksiazak. Spellers that only missed one word were Senior Eli Center, and Sophomores Elizabeth Auxier and Laura Edwards.


This was MCHS's first year of competition in High-Q. High-Q is a game of general knowledge and quick recall that is sponsored by WAVE-TV in Louisville. Area schools compete in game show type of format and answer questions on a variety of subjects within a twenty minute time frame. The team was chosen through a series of quizzes and open competition. Five team members represented MCHS, Mark Nethery (captain), Melissa Buchanan, Micah Hofferth, Annie Hoffman, and Ben Rogers. They defeated Silver Creek in the first round but fell to Floyd Central in round two. Madison was awarded a total of \$1000 for their appearances.

Super Bowl is a state-wide contest sponsored by the Secondary School Principal's Association. Over 300 schools participate in the contest. The MCHS Super Bowl team made Madison proud with their excellent results. At the Austin Area Awards Madison placed first in all areas which included math, English, science, fine arts, and social studies. The teams placed third in the interdisciplinary round. This earned them a berth in State competition. They placed sixth in social studies, fourth in fine arts, third in both mathematics and English out of class II schools.





The creativeness and intelligence of the journalism staff of Madison Consolidated can be viewed through each edition of *The Madisonian* and every broadcast of *Time Out News*. Over 40 students participated throughout the year with 22 broadcasts of *Time Out* and 4 editions of *The Madisonian*.

Every student had a vital part in producing the school newspaper. The students would gather and determine what story ideas they would like to cover. They were responsible for designing and creating stories by an assigned deadline and many students got a view of just how hectic deadlines could be. Newspapers were distributed on Fridays and student story deadlines were on Wednesdays. The theme " Wonderful Tonight" proved to be more than just words.





Seniors Say Farewell Graduation 1997













Another Successful Season














FRESHMEN Cubs Improve With Time




Another Successful Season for Madison Wrestling








Girls Golf Team Swing Their Way To Success



Eicher finished fourth in the high jump. She jumped 5 feet 3 inches to top her bestever jump.








Attitudes Prevail As Madison Tennis Team Struggles













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

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
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Peer Counseling
