




One of the things that make the homecoming games different from all other games is the crowning of King and Queen and Mr. and Miss Cub.









Tehnology classes specialize in the making of motorized equipment. The main project in the technology classes has been the development of a go-cart.









Best of all, the team had lots of fun playing the straw game by chaining plastic straws together and hanging them out the bus window, and making playful bets for steak dinners.











Overall, the team had a successful and above all fun season.



wrestling Cubs had a great season with a record of 23 wins with only 4 losses. The team was also very young, but made that up with heart.


"Everyone had to work hard and push each other harder in order to win, we just stuck together as a team, " said freshman George Murray.










plan to do really good."





just taking time."


Strengths of the 2001 club include durability and control.





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

The NHS is a great club that serves the community and school. The club raised around \$2,000 and volunteered more than 6,000 hours.

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

Junior Jerry Eaton commented, "History and Travel Club is a great experience. We get to travel to lots of cool places. I look forward to every trip I go on."

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




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
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

Members of FCCLA include: Sheila Patterson, Amanda McCarty, Carissa LaPine, Jackie Geoppner, and Kelli Hoffman.





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
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
