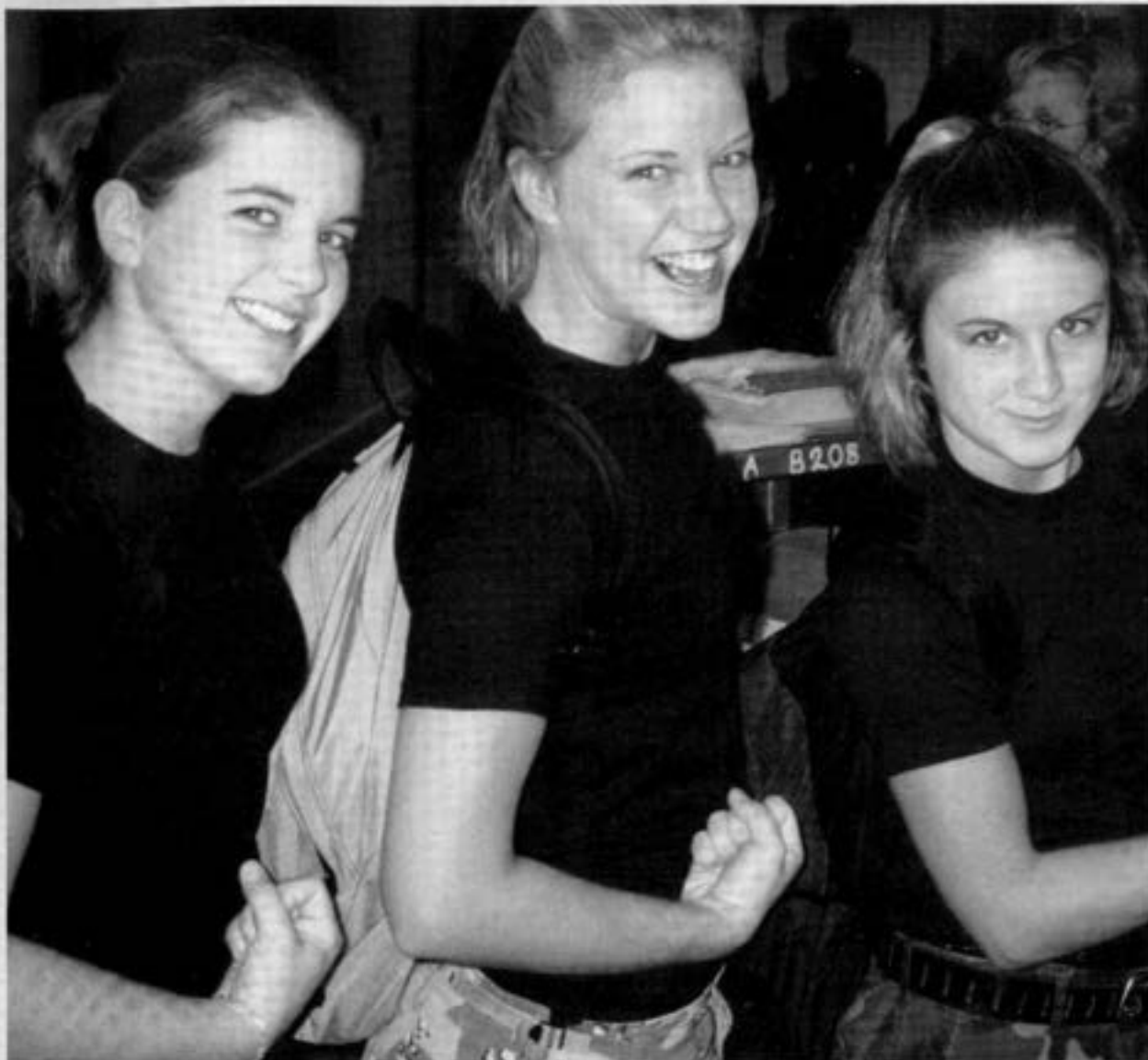

Waking up in the morning for many students is the worst chore of the day, but can anyone imagine going to school for eight hours, then working five hours after school and then trying to get up?

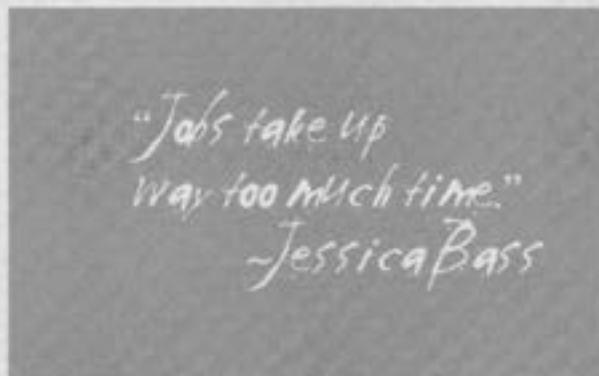
Well, this is something that everyday more and more students experience everyday. Work is just another thing that most of the students are involved in besides school and school-related activities.

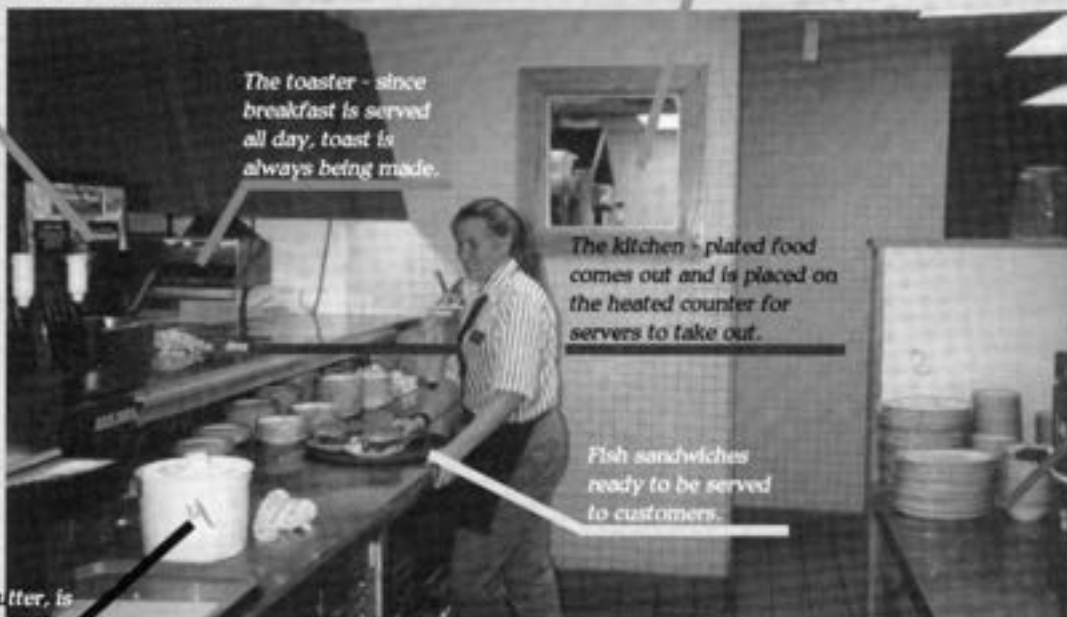

The Senior class nominates their members for these honors, and then the rest of the school votes on them. One of the nominees, Meredith Terrell, said,

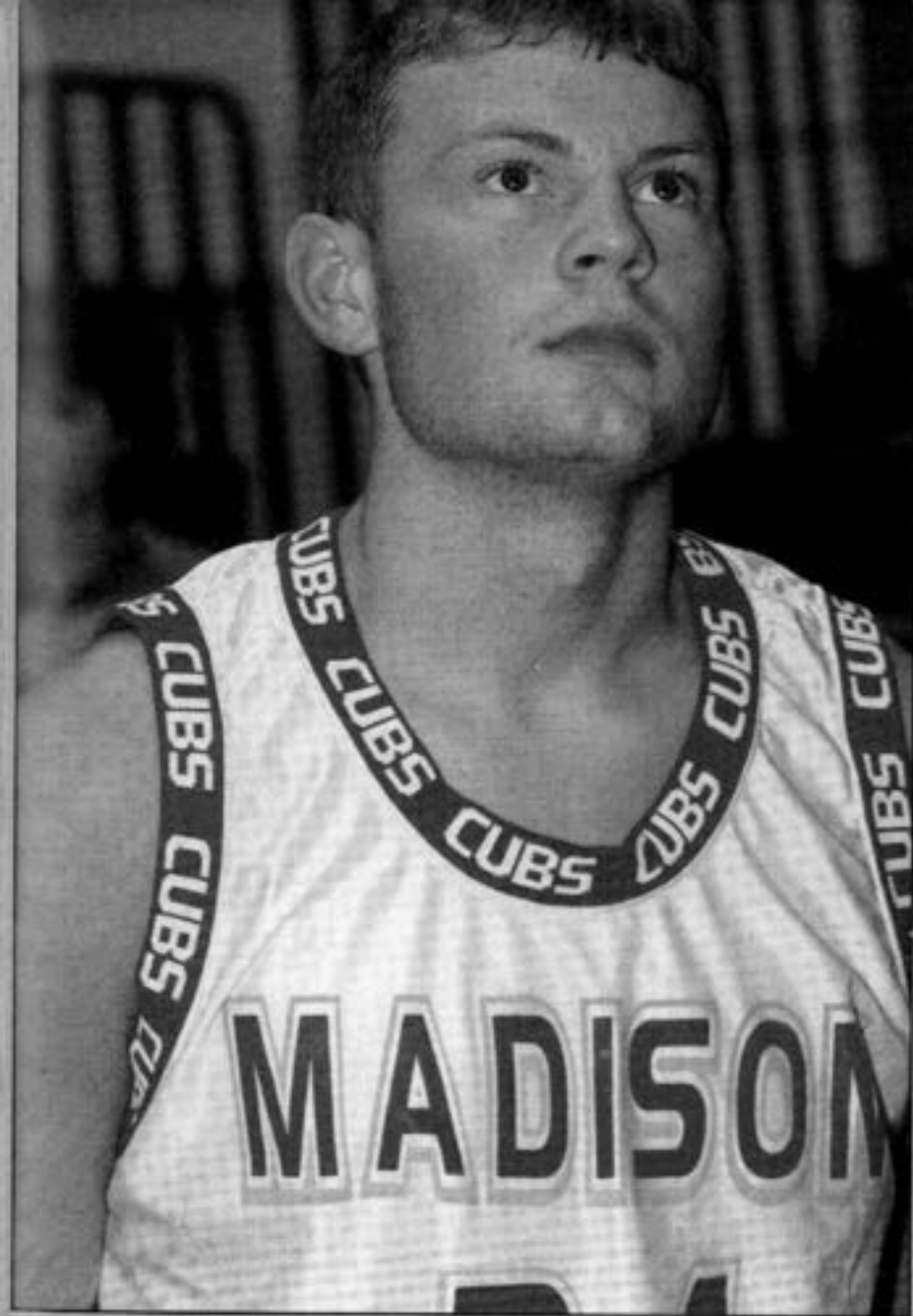
"Getting nominated was a lot of fun, but I was kind of worried what people might think of me when I was walking onto the field."

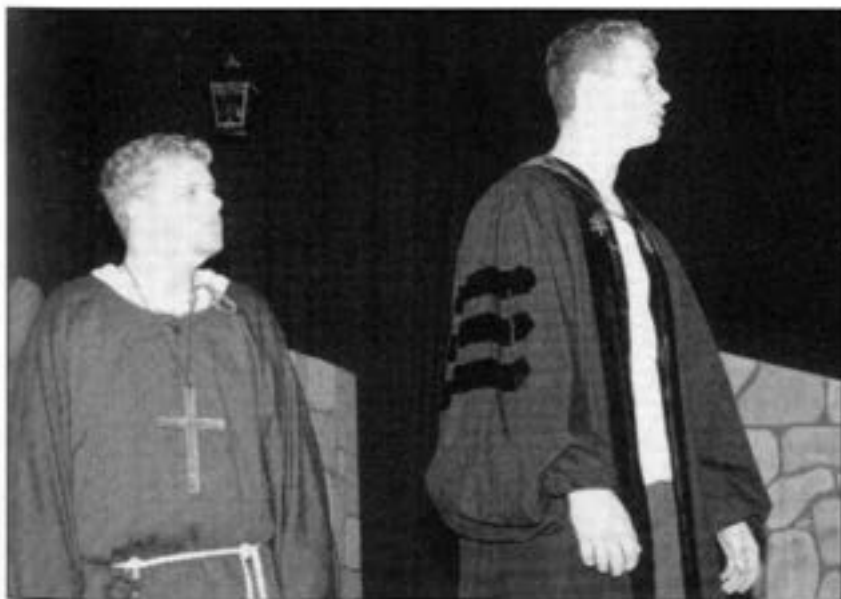

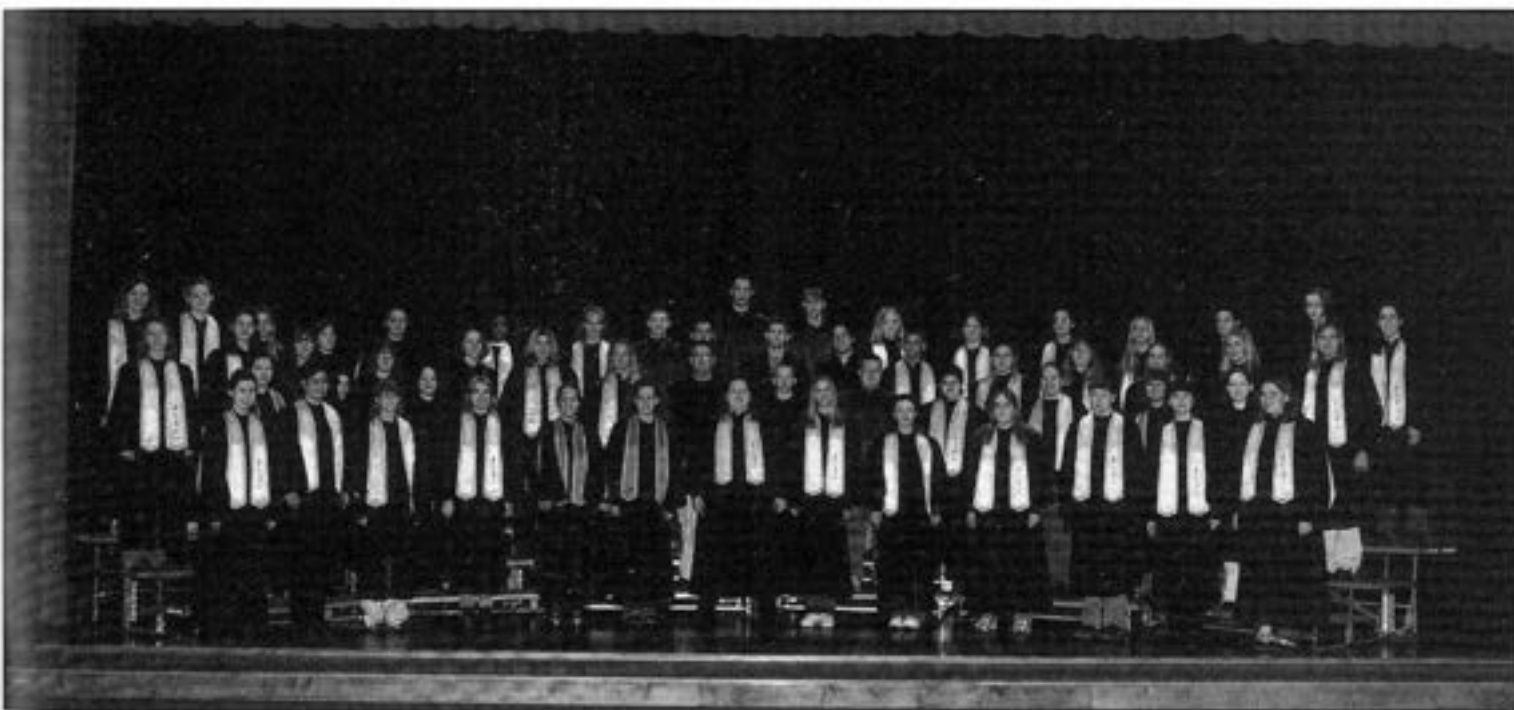

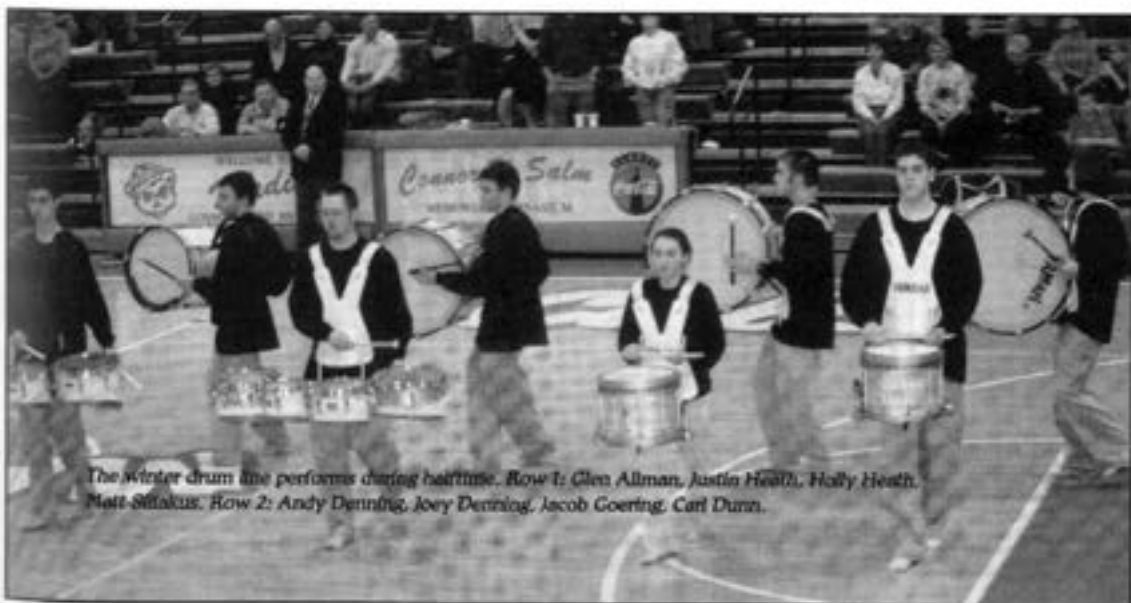

The students of MCHS have the opportunity to join any or all of the five academic teams that are Academic Decathlon, Knowledge Master, Science Olympiad, Spellbowl, and Superbowl. The only real requirements to join the teams are that students must be team players and have good study and preparation

skills.

"I joined the academic teams because I like taking tests," giggled junior Stephanie Werkmeister. "Actually, they really help prepare me for other classes like biology, chemistry, English, and math."

"Yeah! I like how I can relate concepts discussed at competitions with classes I am currently in," said freshman Adam Bair. "I learn more by participating in K.M.O. and S.O. (Knowledge Master and Science Olympiad)."

Each academic team participates in different types of events. Academic Decathlon consists of each person taking tests and later being interviewed, while Knowledge Master is composed of a group of people assembled in the library. There the group works together to answer a series of questions.

"You have to trust your

instincts and yet cooperate with an entire group to get a consensus," senior Kayla Hawkins added.

Science Olympiad has several elements to it. Some events require building models or conducting experiments. Other times stations are set up where students are introduced to information and then asked many questions about what they learned.

Spellbowl consists of individual scores totaled to come up with the group score. Each person is asked to spell nine words.

Superbowl competitions consist of six groups with three people on each team. There is a general theme and six categories (social studies, math, English, science, fine arts, and

interdisciplinary) in which questions related to the theme are asked.

spent her 14 years at MCHS developing the strong academic teams we have now.

"She is so dedicated to the students and we all will miss her," said senior Katy Knouf.

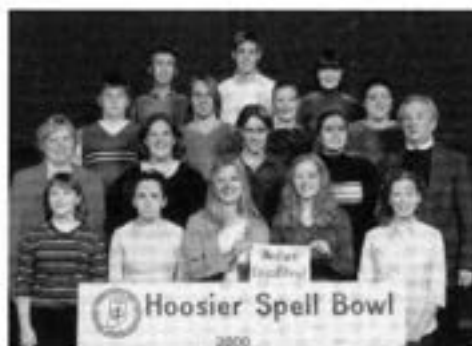

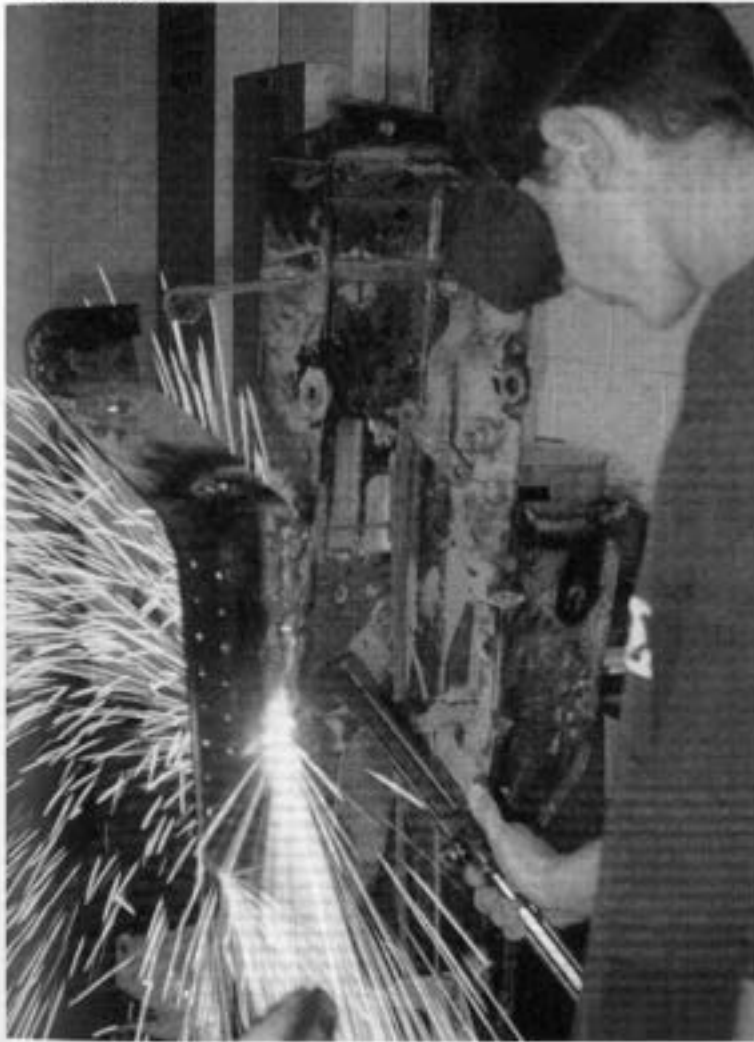

important, but often overlooked class in our school. Here students learn how to make advertisements and operate

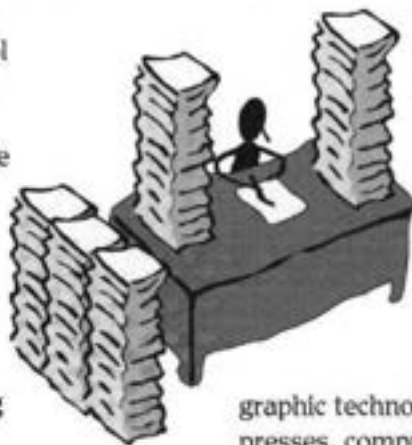
graphic technology like presses, computers, and shrink wrappers.

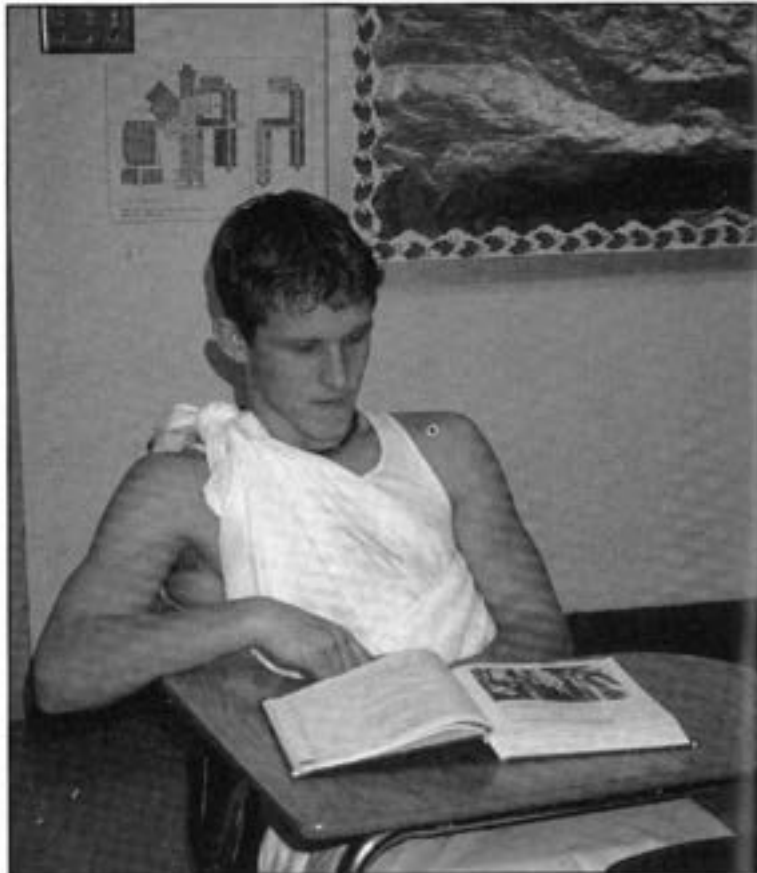

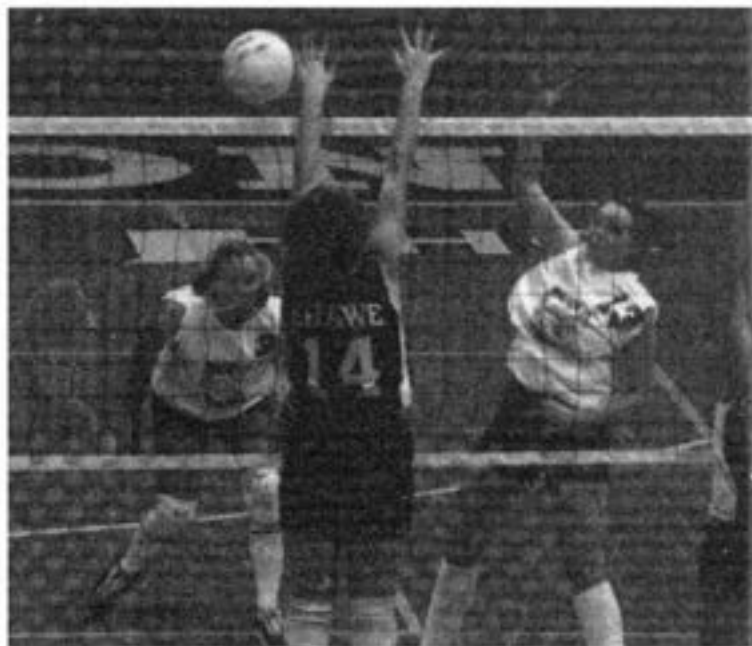

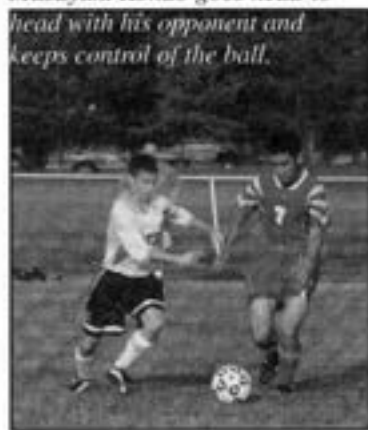

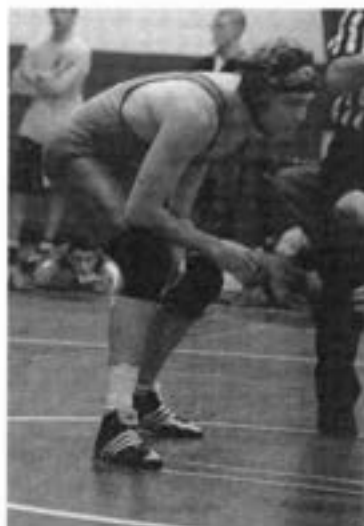

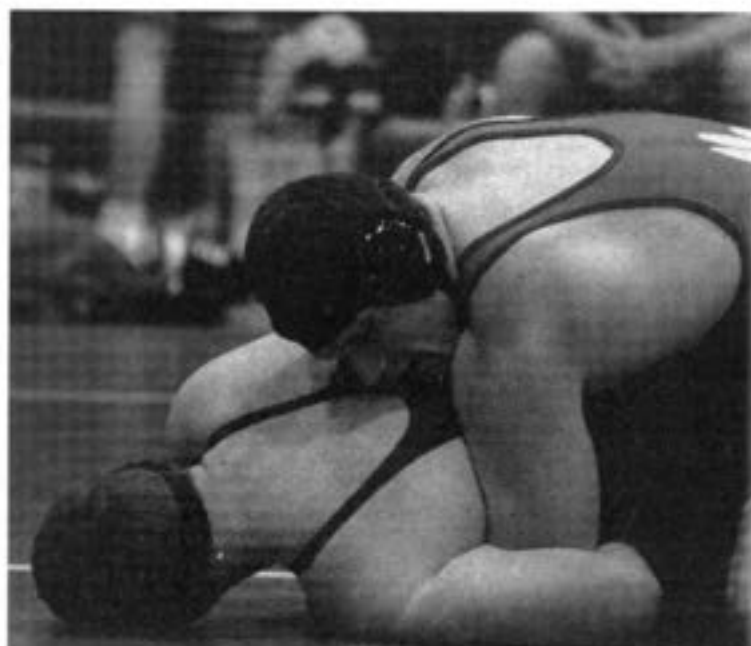

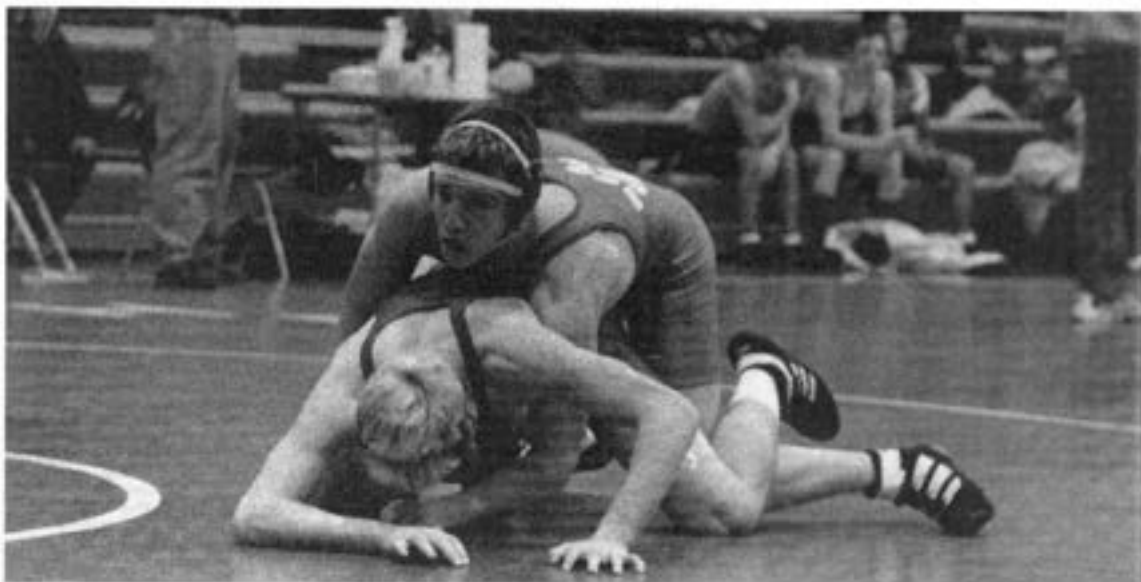

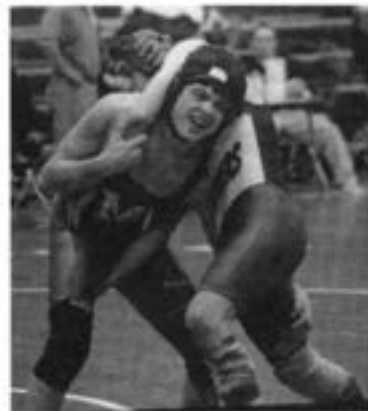

"It meant a lot winning sectionals this year because we were a young squad and the underdogs, and because this season was dedicated to Nick Shadday," said junior Chris Rector.

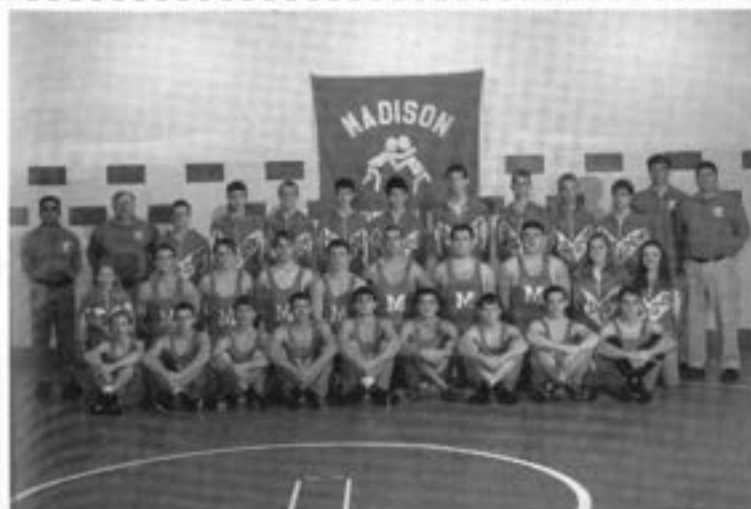

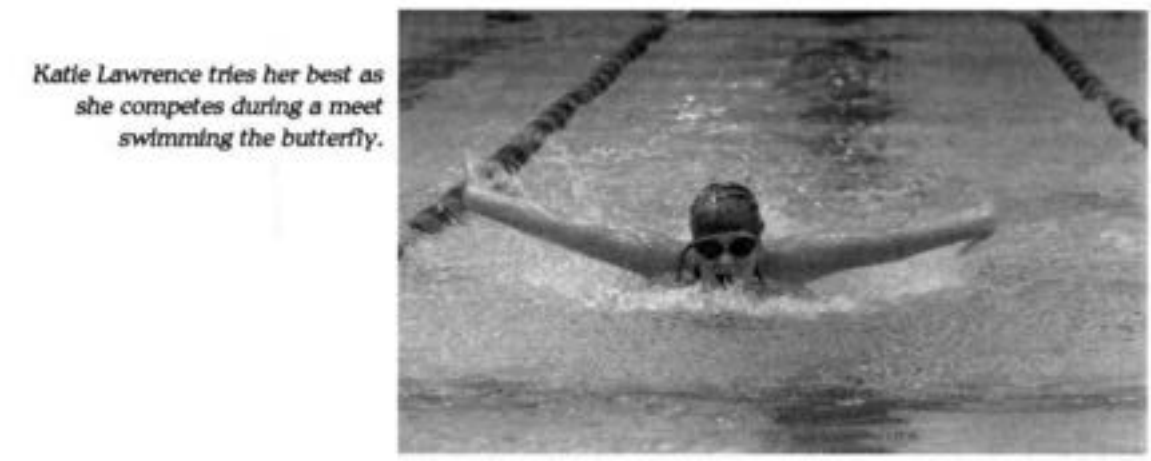

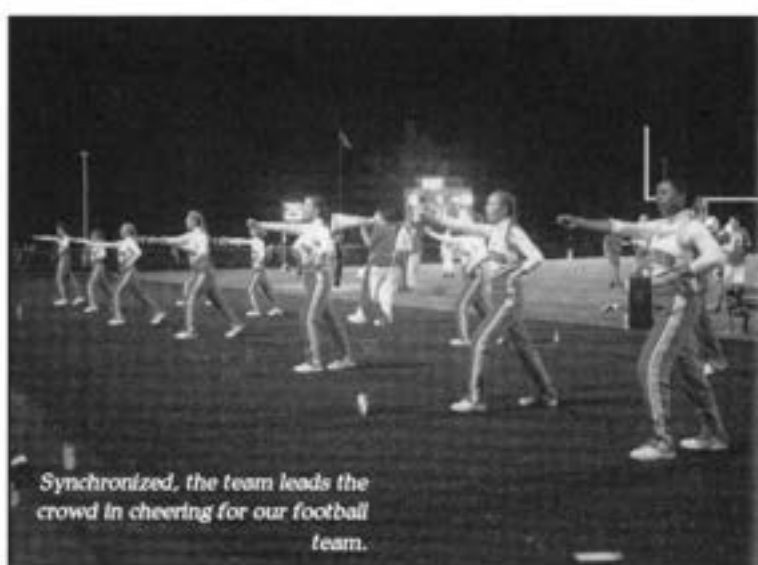

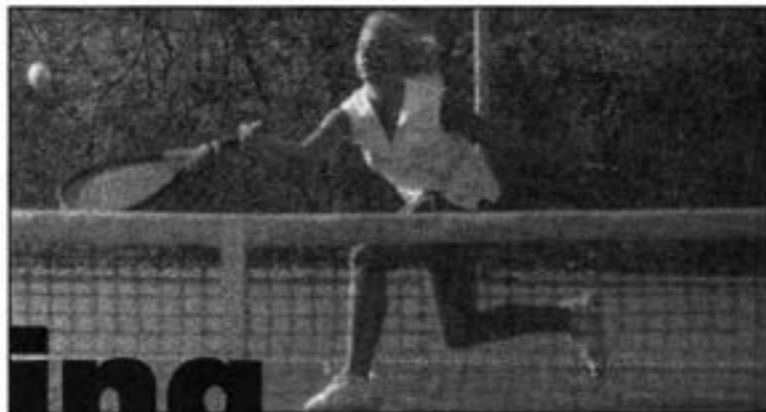

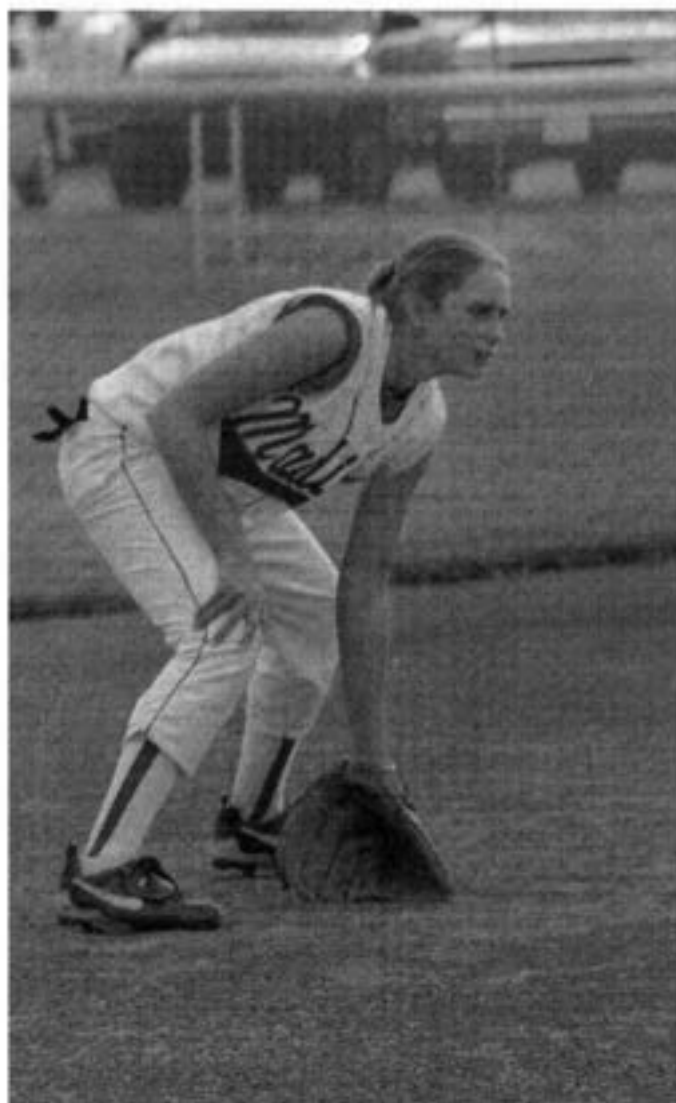

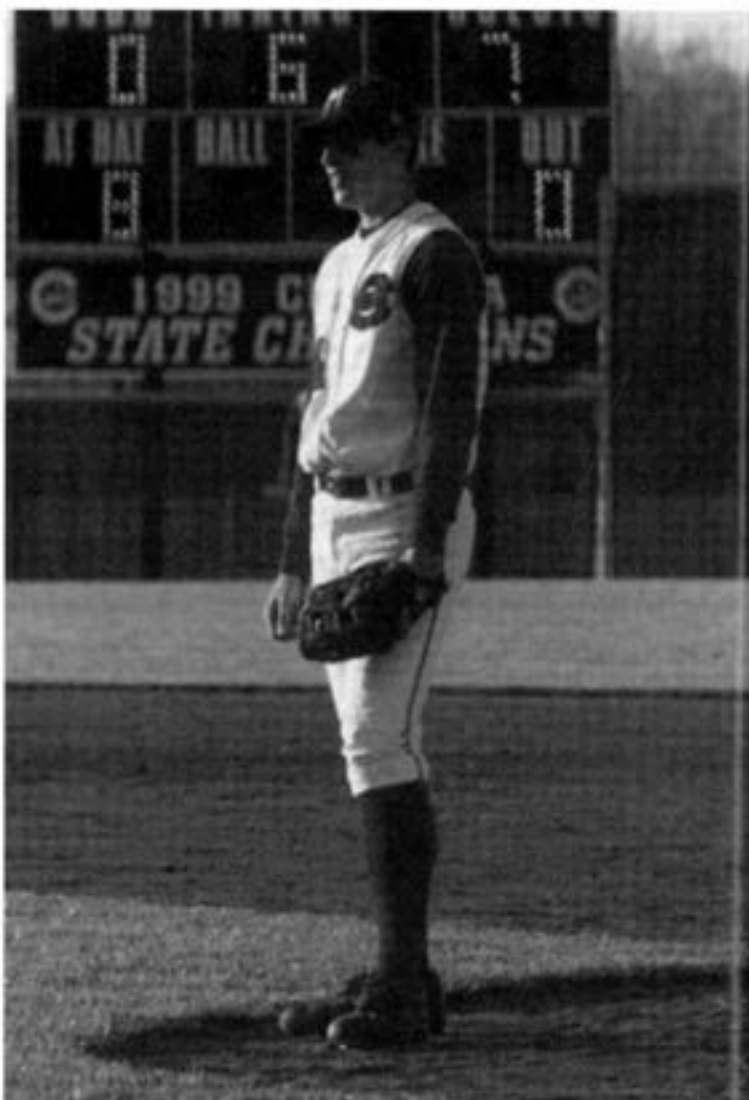

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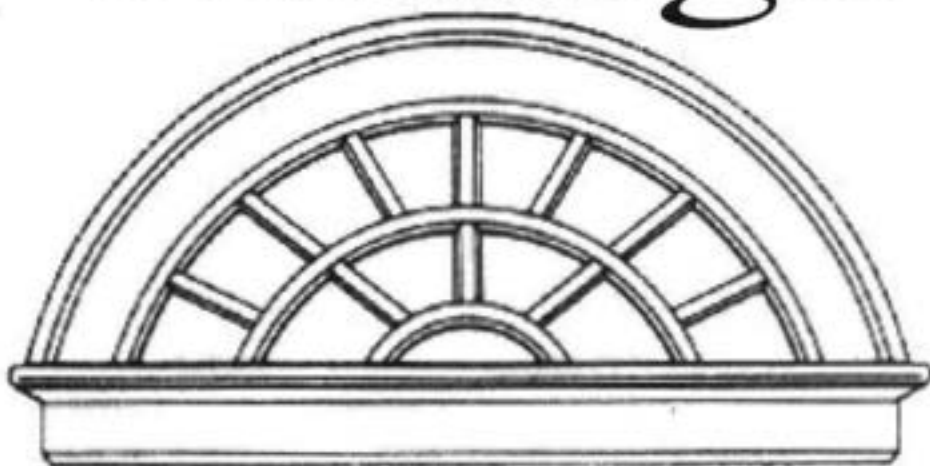

# TRAVEL CLUB

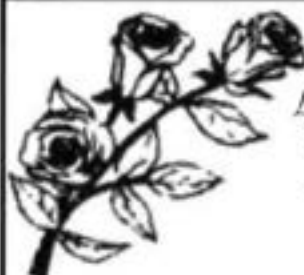

Junior Jerry Eaton commented, "History and Travel Club is a great experience. We get to travel to lots of cool places. I look forward to every trip I go on."

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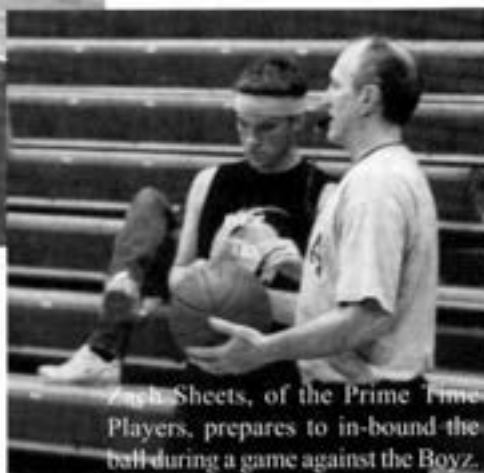


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Chad Gray, member of the Ex-Cubs, skys for the lay-up in the championship game.
