Science Olympiad has several elements to it. Some events require bullding models or conducting experiments. Other times stations are set up where students are introduced to information and then asked many questions about what they learned.

Spellbowl consists of Indlvidual scores totaled to come up with the group score. Each person is asked to spell nine words.

Superbowl competitions consist of six groups with three people on each team. There is a general theme and six categories (social studies, math. English, science, fine arts, and
interdisciplinary) in which questions related to the theme are asked.

spent her 14 years at MCHS developing the strong academic teams we have now.
