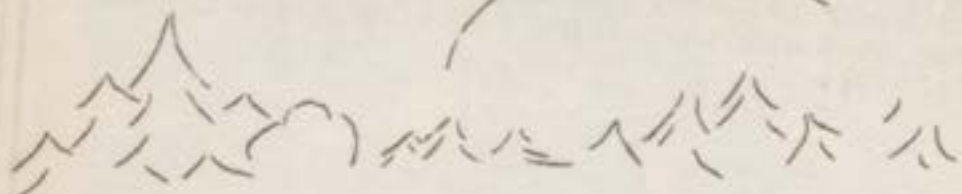
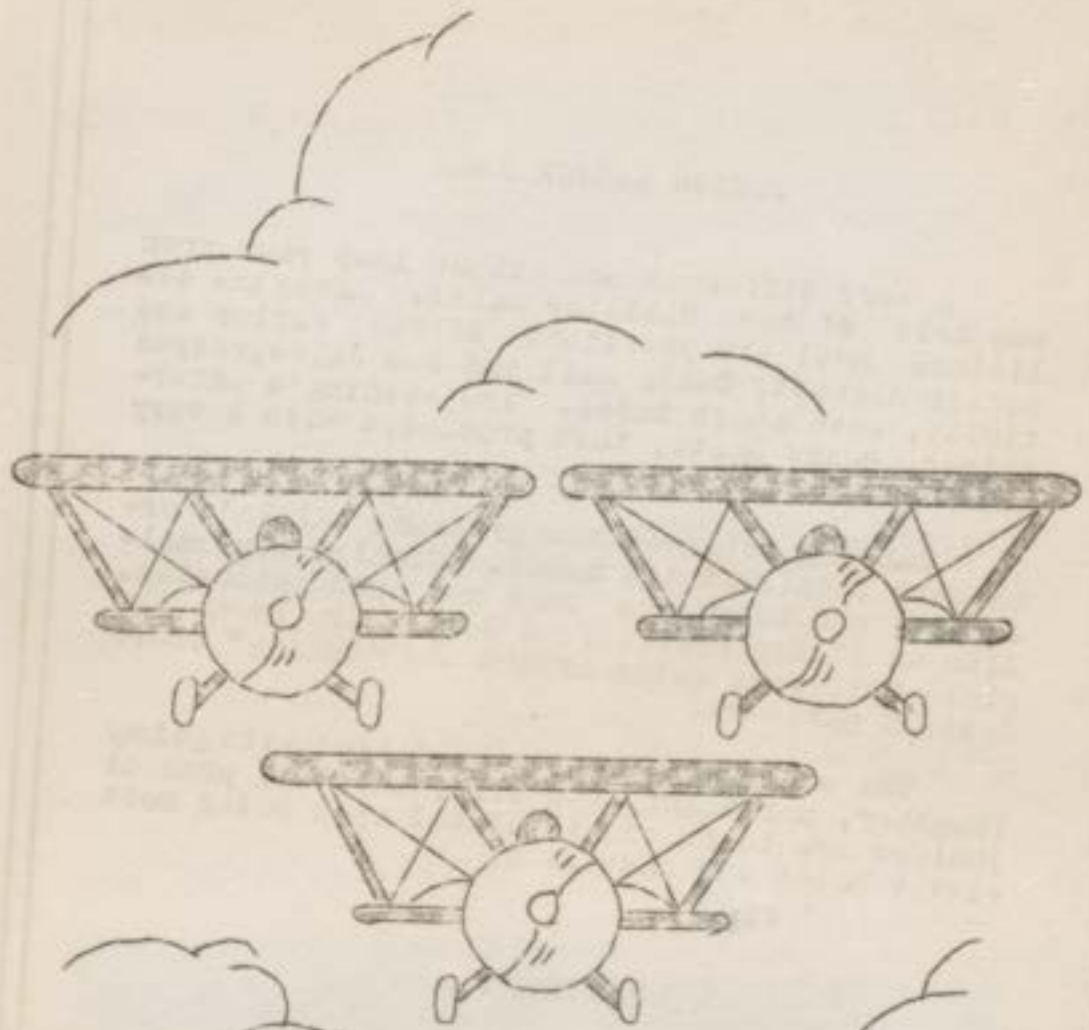
## FRESHMAN CLASS

## THE SUNSHINE SOCIETY

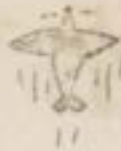

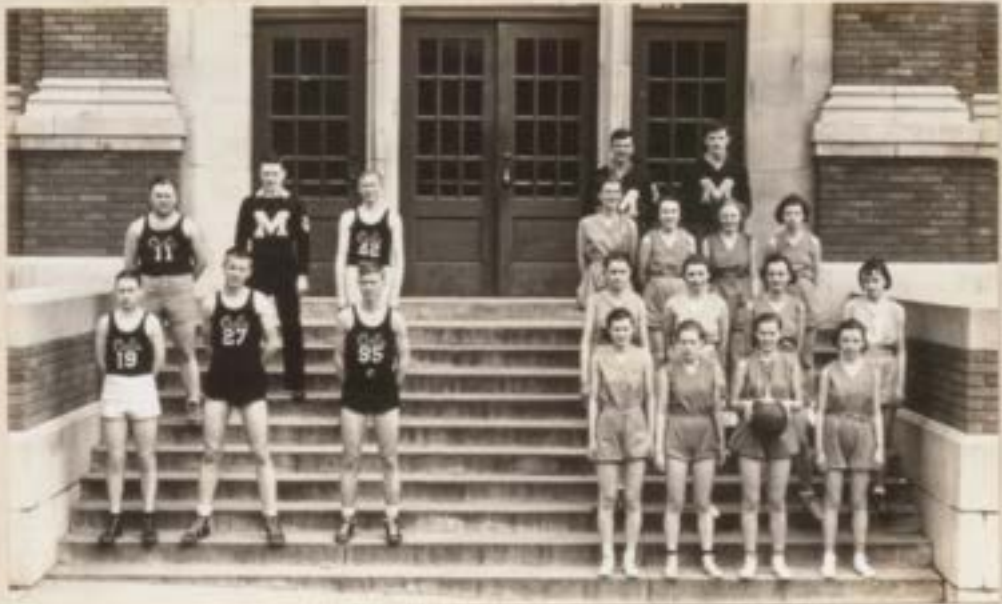
