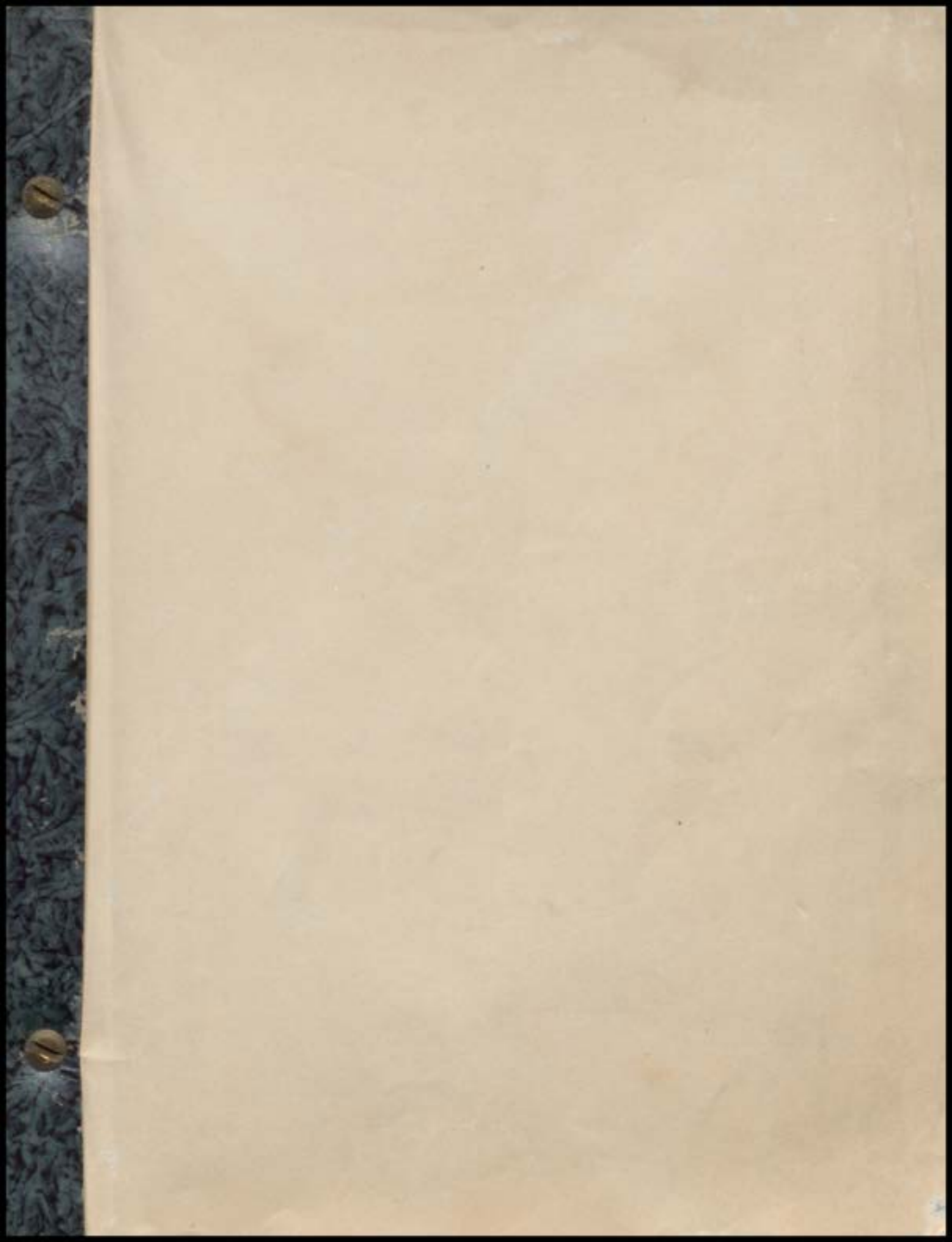


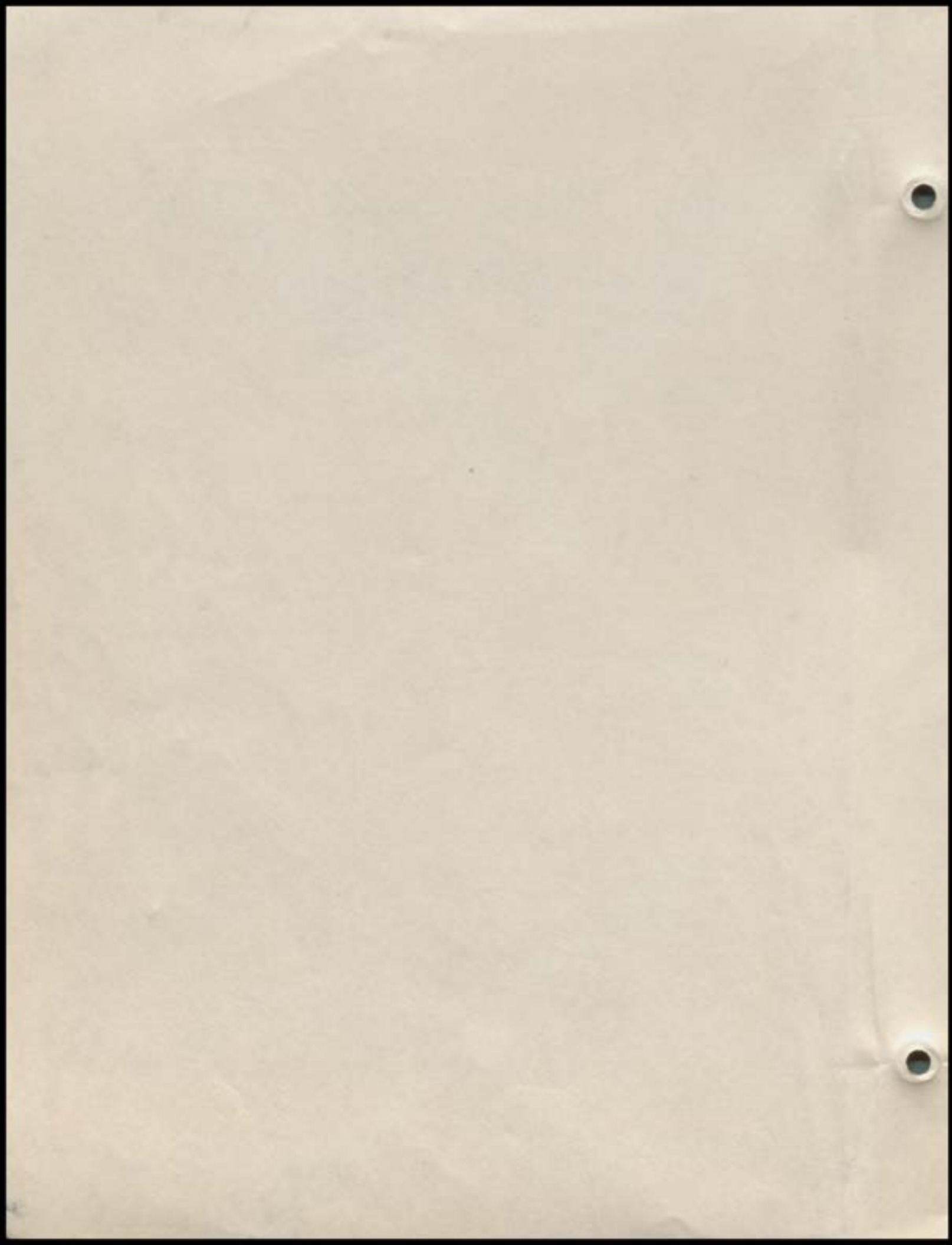

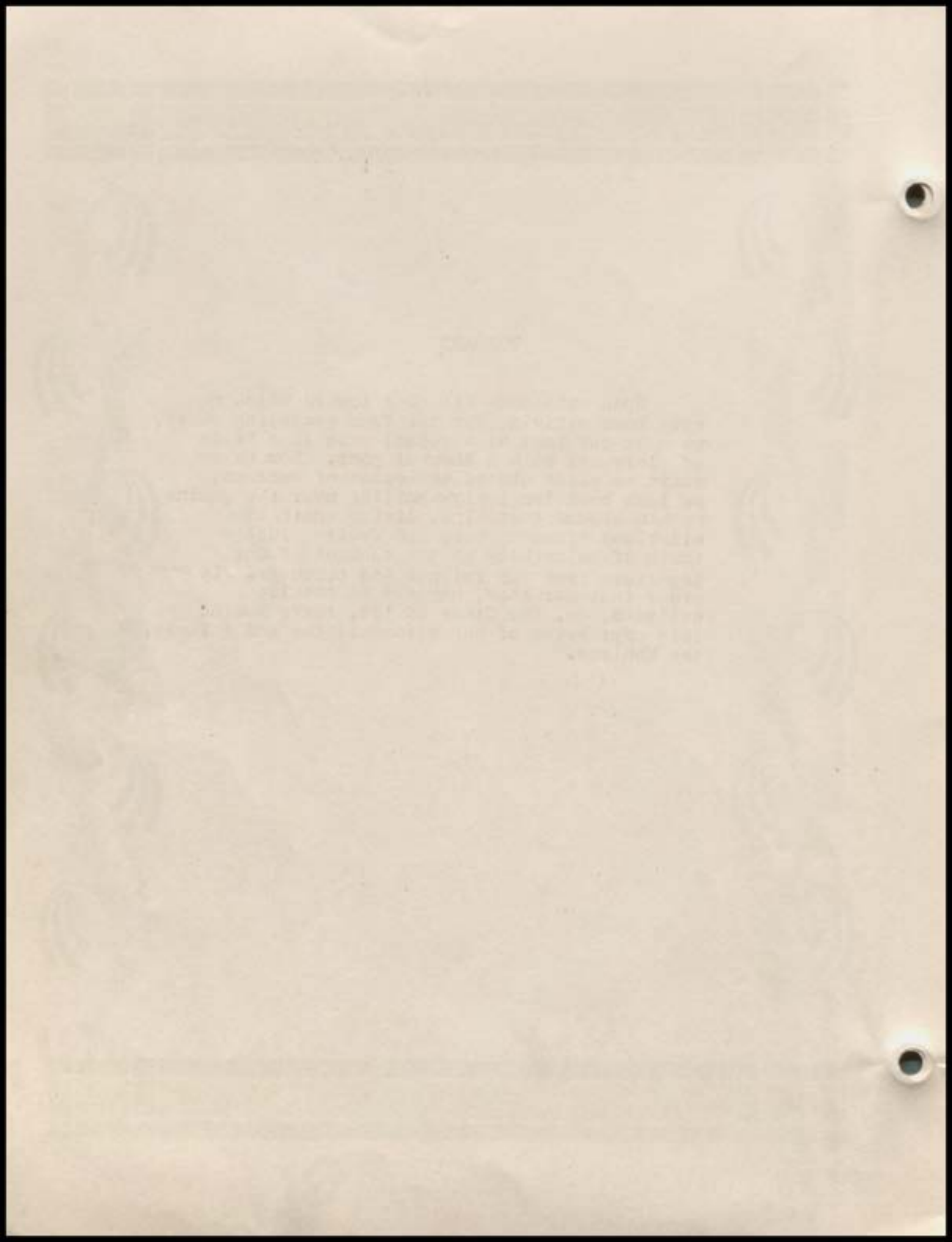




FORWARD

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



Mary Eunice Muncie, with her great "public speaking" ability is the country's greatest lawyer.


Walter Lundt went in for the uniform in a big way. He is a well-known Salvation Army leader.

"You're the Doctor" a three act farce, was the class play presented at the Brown Gymnasium, April 22, and it was regarded as an outstanding production.


Many complicated and humorous situations arose when an attractive young man dashed into the Crescent Sanitarium to avoid being picked up by a traffic cop.

This year the Science Club was a very active organization. Our changed schedule made it possible for the club to make sight-seeing tours to various chemical industries around the city.

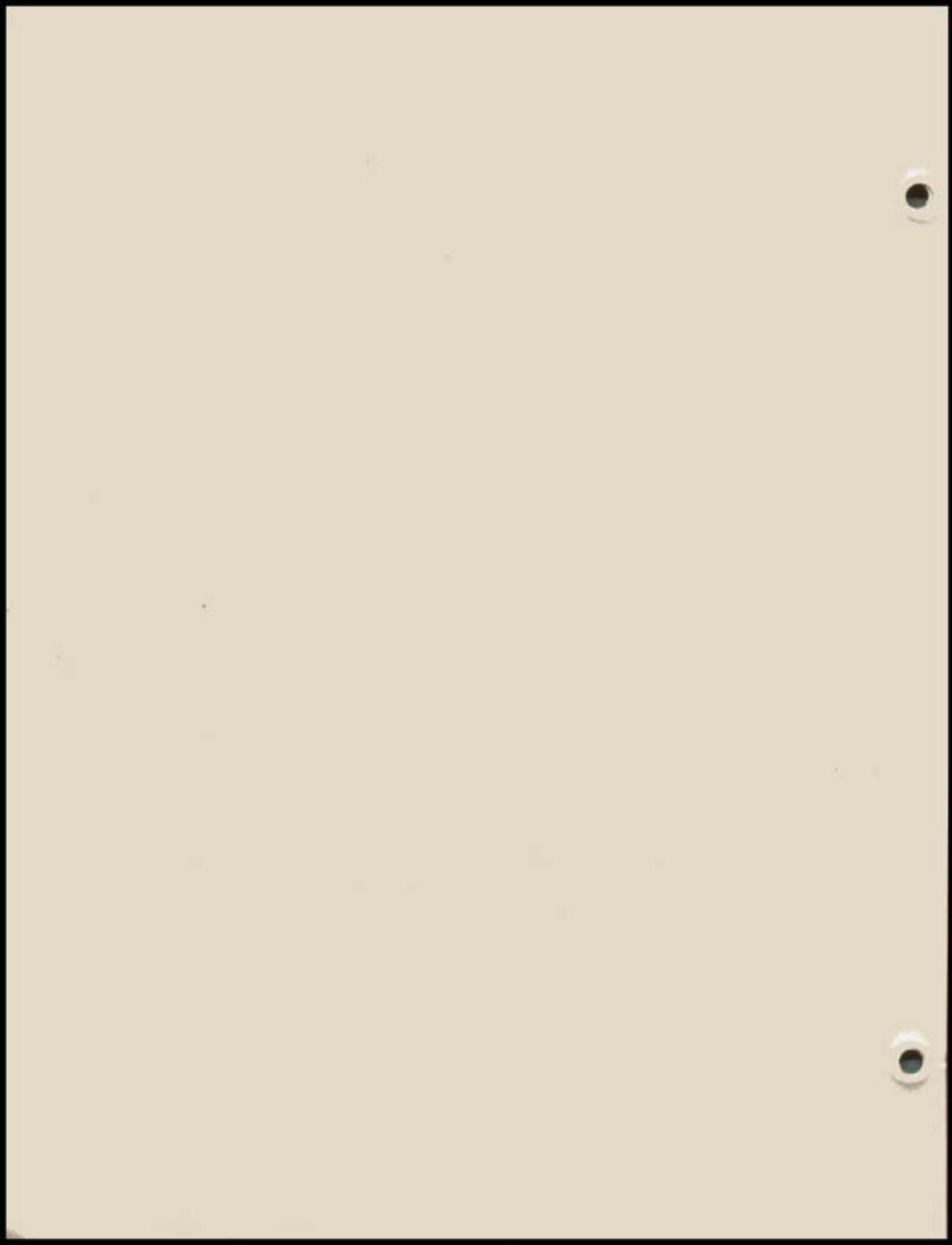

For the 7th time out of 9 they won the S.E.I.J.H.S. basketball tournament and also emerged victor in an invitational Blind Tourney.



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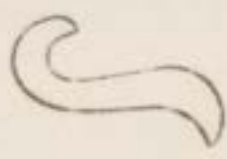
