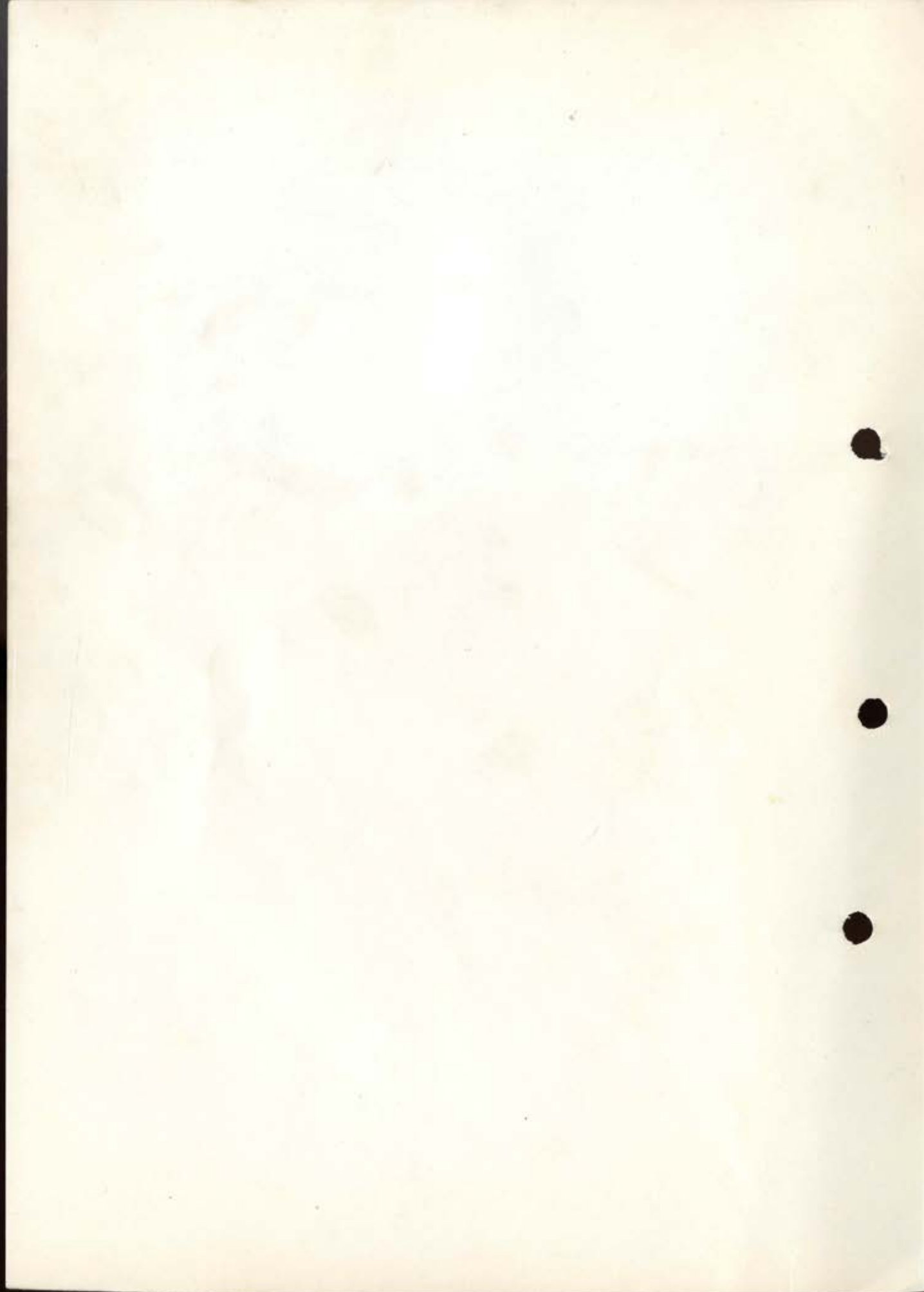

## SOPHOMORE CLASS HISTORY

At the opening of the school term in the fall of 1932 the class of '36 began its career in North Madison High School with a membership of seventy-four. This is the largest class that ever entered North Madison as freshmen and it was our determination to be not only the largest but also the best.

Our class membership decreased to fifty three in our sophomore year. While this loss was in part due to some dropping out the greater part was due to the transfer of students from North Madison to Central. However it has been our aim to make up in accomplishment what we have lost in number.
