



## Class History of

#### The Seniors of 364

"School days, School days, dear old golden rule days"
were here again and the halls of N.N.H.S. were echoing to
the tread of shuffling feet. On that day Sept. 12, 1932
seventy four freshmen proudly enrolled as students of North
Madison High School. Why shouldn't we be proud even if we
were the target for the wisecracks of the upper classmen?
Wasn't it the largest class in the history of our school?
Proud of our record we determined to do our very best and
show the others that even the green freshmen could do a
thing or two. Under the sponsor-ship of Mr. Shosmaker and
the leadership of Lucalle Bishop as President we made a
great progress toward our goal. We were well represented
in all the school activities and sports. Before our Freshmen
days were over we had proved to everyone that we were more
than just the largest Freshmen Class in the history of
our school.

Sept. 12, 1933 found us beginning our Sophomore year. Our numbers had been reduced from 74 to 48 as several of our clasemates had been transferred to Central. What we lacked in numbers was made up in spirit. So we continued merrily on our way as happy Sophomore "Red" Lemen was elected sponsor and Aldean Custer President. Again we were well represented in all the school activities and sports. Spring brought vacation time and the end of our Sophomore year.

On Sept. 13, 1934 we gathered At North Madison as Juniors. Our everdwindling ranks had reached the new low of 38 but we were not discouraged. The number of Juniors on the Honor Roll proved that part of us at least were making the best of our opportunities. "Red" Lemen was again chosen sponsor and Cynthia Pendleton, President. "Moon River Rancho" the Junior Class play was given April 6 in the High School gym.

On Sept 8, 1935 we again met in the halls of dear old North Town as the Seniors of 36°. Miss Risk was chosen sponsor and Cynthia Pendleton, President. Realizing that our days at North Madison would soon be over 34 Seniors set out to make this the best Senior Class in the history of our School.

Now that those happy days at North Madison are gone forever let us tell you the secret of our success, School is just what you make it and if you want an ideal School be an ideal student.





Sophomore Class: Myrns Greenwood and Joe Francisco.




