



A day in the life of a Science and Math student at Southwestern may go something like this!

First, to Mr. Finnegan's room for a lecture in trigonometry and a test on the problems discussed for the day. Then on to physics for a discussion on changing Fahrenheit temperatures to Centigrade. In lab, there will be an experiment that, with luck, doesn't blow the roof off the building.

The rest of the day is much the same, with courses varying according to the grade the student is in. These might contain the above-mentioned trig and physics with chemistry, biology I & II, geometry, and physical science. Students have a wide choice from which to choose.



English

Since no one graduates without encountering English courses, this department has been designed to give students a varied choice of study. English courses include not only the required literature and grammar, but also speech, composition, and journalism. Activities which are an important part of these courses involve plays, poetry readings, and work in publications.

Learning to speak, read, and write in a language other than that which is native to them is an accomplishment of those students who study a foreign language. Two-year courses in French, Spanish, and Latin prove helpful as well as challenging to the students who pursue them.

Art, Music, and Social Studies

Development of creative ideas, skills, and interpretations are emphasized to students enrolled in humanities courses at Southwestern.

In art classes, the use of live models helps students gain an eye for artistic forms. Another form of art, sculpture, is learned by working with papier-mache.

Social studies classes involve themselves in the present problems of today's society. Discussions concerning urban problems in relation to the American Negro, talks on welfare and on the role of the police, take place frequently.

The skill obtained in music, whether it be choral singing or the technique of a band instrument, is treasured by those who have mastered it. The band and choral club provide students with an opportunity to become adept in music. Concert music, ensembles such as the pep band and brass choir, and student conducting broaden the scope of music for young musicians.

Industrial Arts

Industrial Arts classes consist of woodworking and drafting and are offered to any boy in high school. Students taking woodworking undertake projects such as the building of coffee tables, deacon's benches, and other home furnishings. Those boys enrolled in drafting learn to use various drafting instruments, scales, and measuring equipment. Under the direction of Mr. Jennings, industrial art students have produced many useful, and lovely projects.

Home Economics



Five Home Economics courses were taught this year by Mrs. Green. These included the usual freshmen, sophomore, junior, and senior classes and a family living course which was introduced this year. The Home Ec. room which was formerly the band room, is located in the gym. It is furnished with six kitchen units, 14 sewing machines, and four work tables. The freshmen and sophomore classes spend most of the first semester cooking, while the juniors study family relations during the year. Starting the second semester, the freshmen, sophomores, and seniors put the sewing machines to good use by making clothing from sportswear to dressy dresses. The new family living class studies food nutrition, cooking, budgeting, and care of clothing.

Physical Education

Getting used to running around in gym suits and gym shorts was one of the problems of being a freshman. Physical education, which is required for all freshmen, kept them busy dodging people as well as dodgeballs, in hopes no one would see them. The girls, taught by Miss Porter, participated in many games, including volley ball, basketball, and baseball. Exercising and jumping on the trampoline also was part of the year. The boys, directed by Mr. Montgomery, did exercises, lifted weights, and played volleyball and basketball.

Vocational Agriculture

Vocational agriculture is a subject which covers the numerous phases of modern farming. The boys enrolled in the class quickly learn the fundamentals of good farming. The instructors, Mr. Huffman and Mr. Harmon, supervise the boys as they progress during the year.

The average agriculture student's environmental surroundings are mixed among crops, livestock, and farm machinery. The boys learn the proper procedures for care of these things. They also study soil conservation, in order to preserve better soil for better crops.

Business Education

The business curriculum consists of bookkeeping, shorthand, typing I and II, business law and general business.

In bookkeeping class they are taught how to keep accurate records. In shorthand the girls learn how to take fast letters and how to type them. Typing in both I and II classes is made up of typing letters, cards, notes, and term papers. Business law is mainly a study of different types of laws and contracts. General business concerns buying stock and checking accounts.

Vocational School

Many students from Southwestern, along with students from 13 other schools, participate in the Southeastern Indiana Area Vocational School at Versailles. The purpose of the school is to help students who are not going to college to acquire a suitable vocation. Juniors and seniors are eligible, and they attend the vocational school in the morning, with their afternoon classes at Southwestern. There are as many as thirty different vocations taught at Versailles. The vocations favored most by SWHS students are beauty culture, business, drafting, electronics, auto mechanics, nursing or culinary arts.



The 1968 SWHS cross country season was composed of exhausting practice, self-denial and a determination to win. The team gave a good competitive showing despite the fact that the majority of Southwestern's thirteen runners had two years' or less experience.

In a regular season meet, Southwestern defeated Vevay to place first, and the Rebels defeated four rivals to finish in fifth place at the ORVC meet in Milan.

The team will lose four seniors this year: Mike Foley, Gary Furnish, Alan Hutton, and Larry Jones.





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
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
