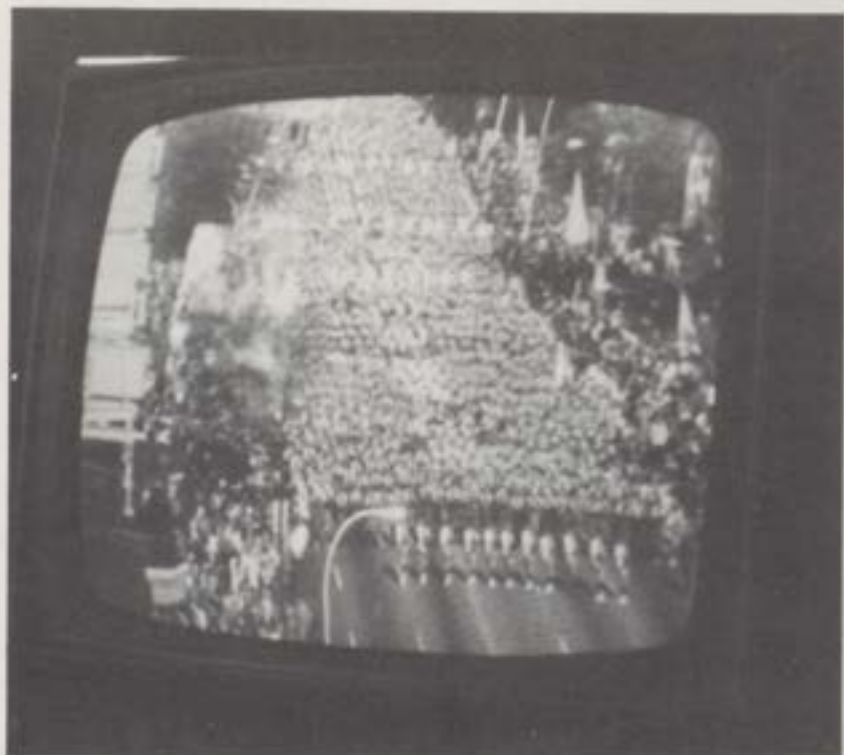


Schoolwide Trip To 1776

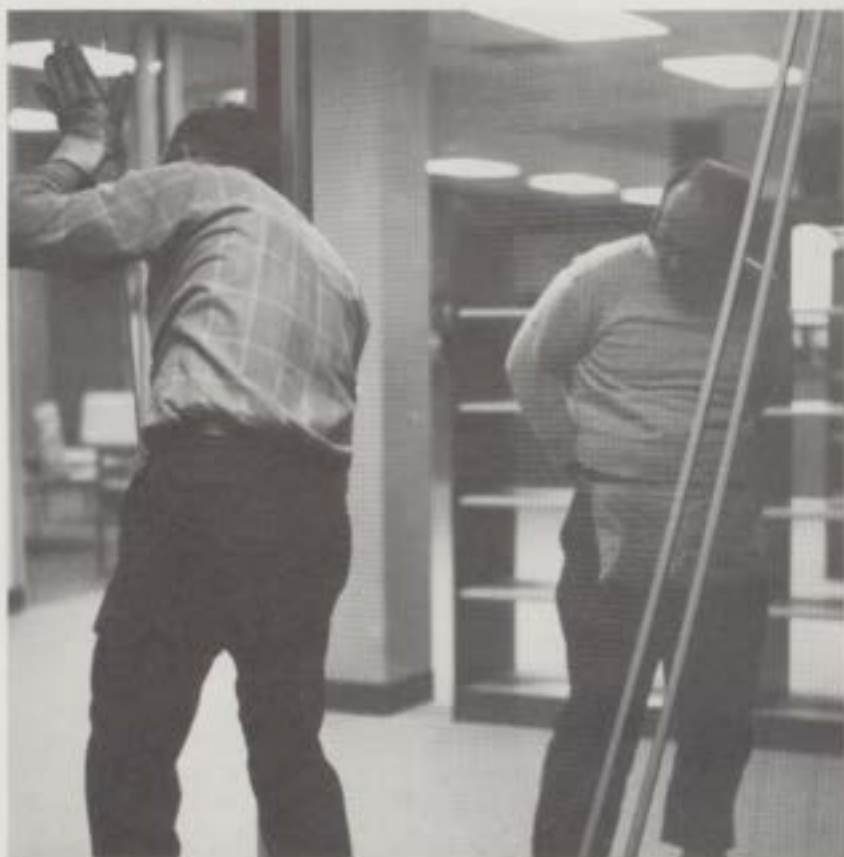

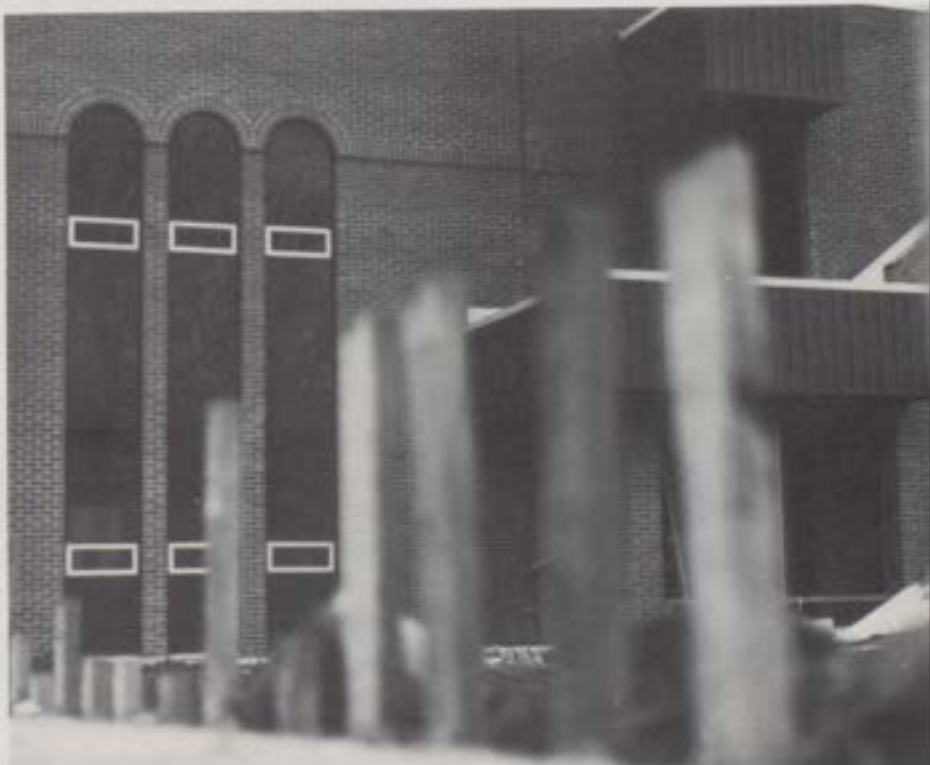

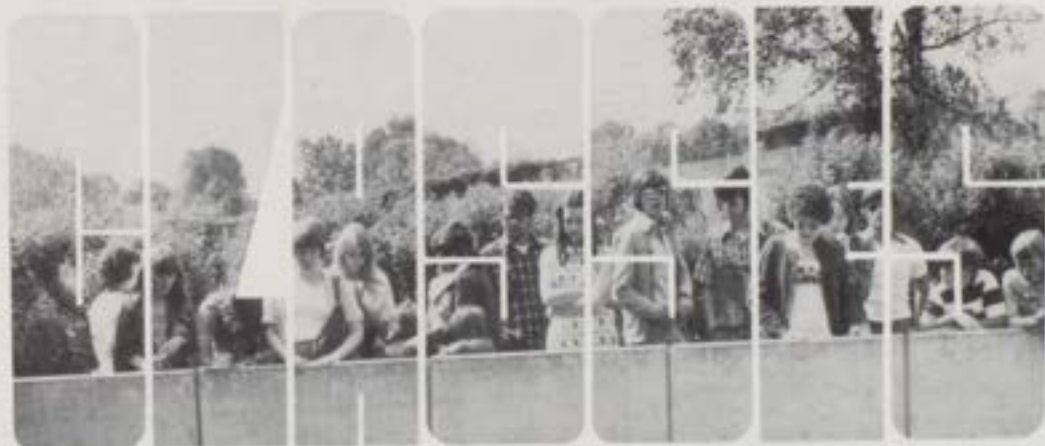

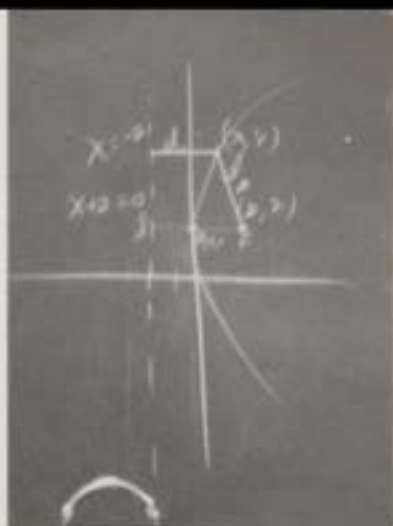
Spacious Chalkboards: A Dream Come True

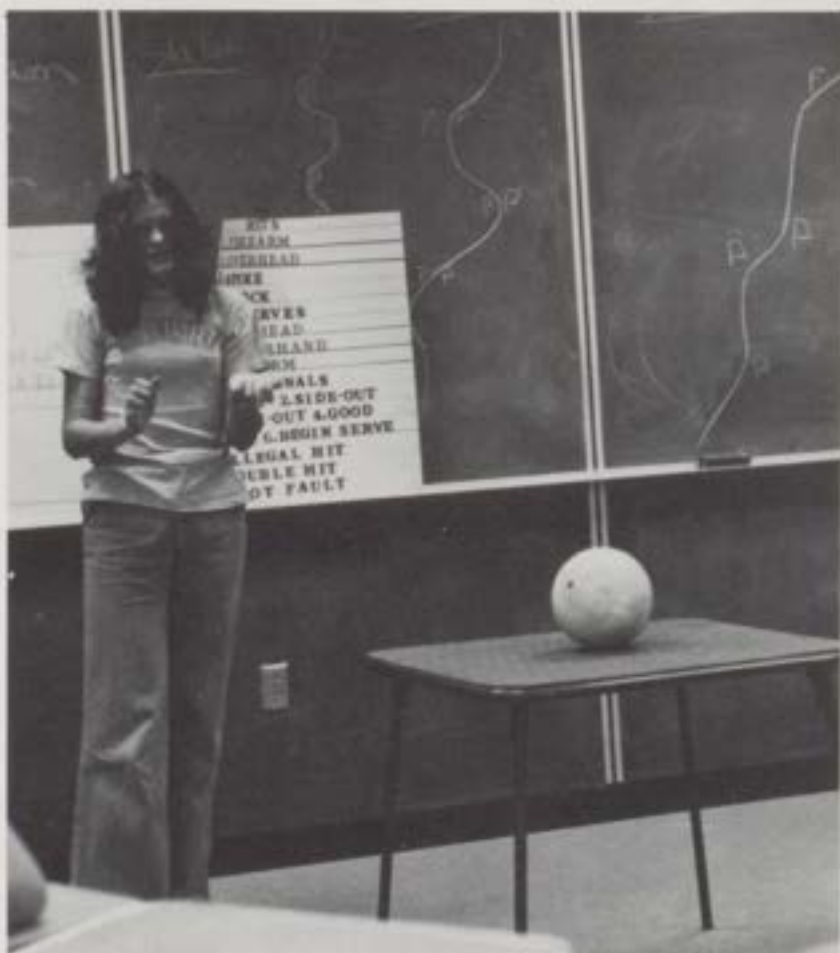


English-More than Reading, Writing

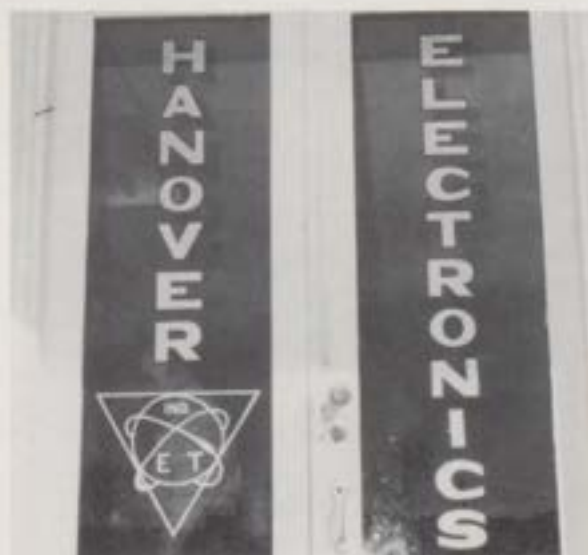

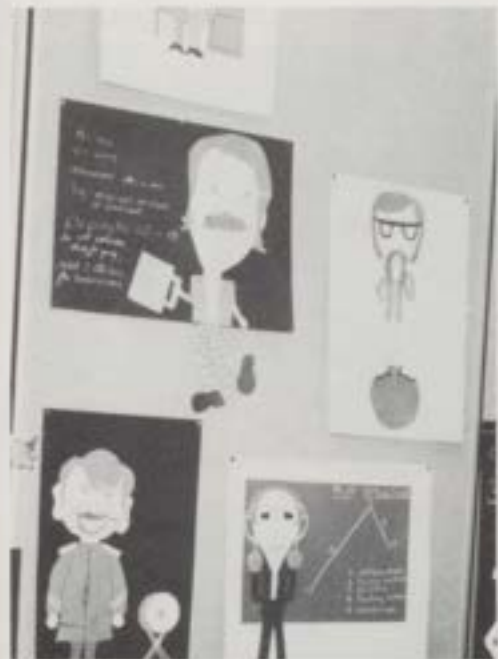
