

The teachers had two student teachers during the second semester. Miss Laura Mordy helped Miss Smoots with her classes. She taught them some various tumbling skills and the formation of different pyramids. Miss Mordy also taught the classes many types of track and field activities.

The courses usually include novels, short stories, drama, and poetry with related assignments dealing with the mechanics of English expression. Oral assignments sharpen the ability to express ideas verbally, and compositions develop ease in written expression. Evaluation of their own work and the work of others increases appreciation and critical reading. Aids to learning often take the form of full-length movies, recordings, film strips, field trips, and class-produced projects.


HOME ECONOMICS CLASSES TEACH YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN HOME MANAGEMENT












SPANISH CLUB KEEPS ACTIVE










