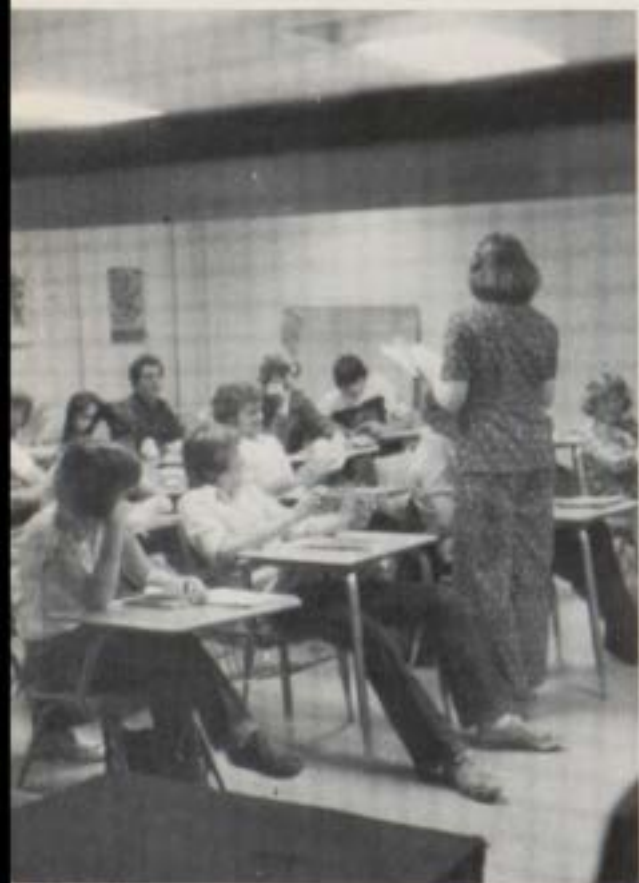

Southwestern's English classes include many areas of study dealing with language skills and a better understanding of literature. The courses usually include novels, short stories, drama, and poetry with related assignments dealing with the mechanics of English expression. Oral assignments sharpen the ability to express ideas verbally, and compositions develop ease in written expression. Evaluation of their own work and the work of others increases appreciation and critical reading. Aids to learning often take the form of full-length movies, recordings, film strips, field trips, and class-produced projects.

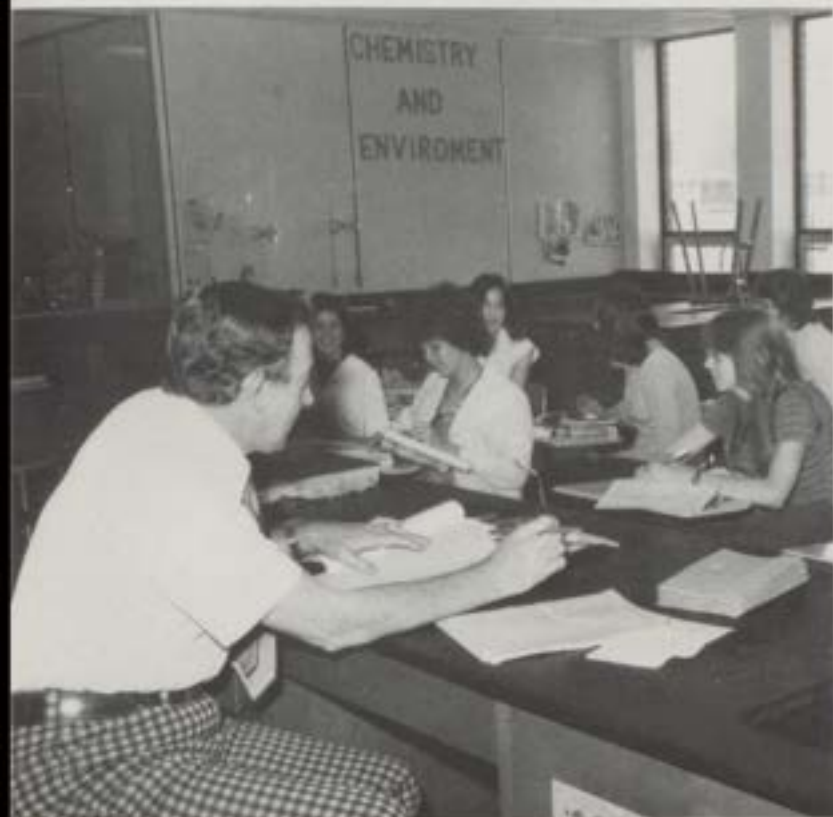
SCIENCES UNFOLD THE MYSTERIES OF OUR WORLD

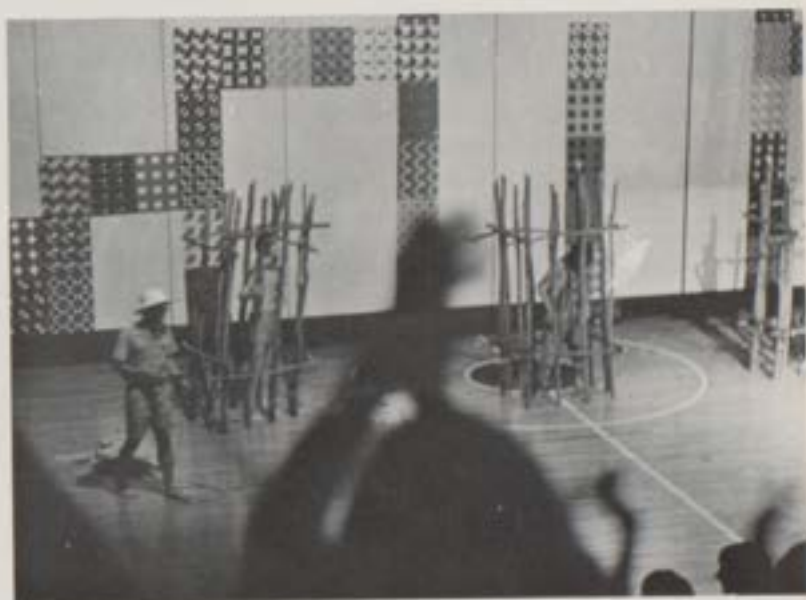

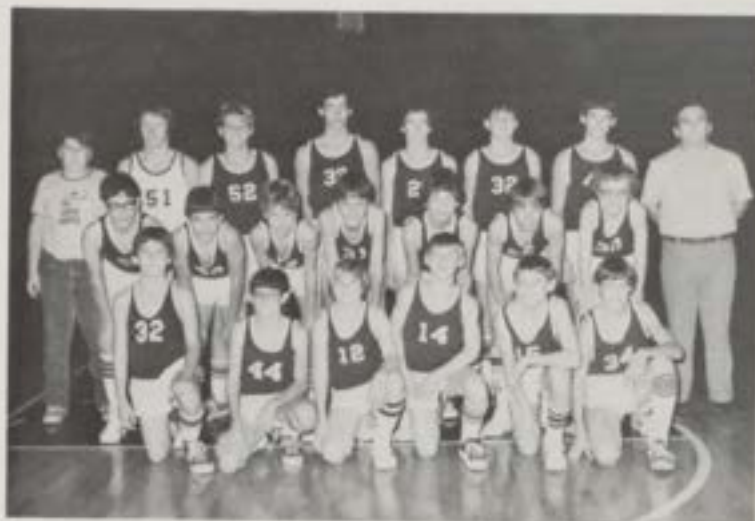
