

Some of the activities that were available to them were the Regional Science Fair and the different debates about nuclear power and U.F.O's.

In the more advanced science classes at the high school, the studies got harder, but knowledge became more thorough. In Mrs. Coghill's Biology I classes, the Freshmen learned the various anatomies of worms, crayfish, and starfish through dissection. The Biology II classes received a concentrated study of genetics and the environment. To climax the year's work, they were given a field trip to Big Creek to study specimens in their natural surroundings.

"Yes," comes the chorus of voices from the Math Department. "If you can stand the aftermath. It all adds up."







With the world shrinking all the time, the study of foreign languages is becoming more and more important to a modern citizen. After all, you never know when you might meet the "right person" in a different country.












#### VOCA TODAY, TOMORROW A JOB




Upper right: One of the advisors at the Vocational school is shown in the middle of lecture.





Mr. Kloepfer's students worked hard to learn the skills needed to get well-paying jobs in the business world. Workbook assignments nearly every day helped them get practice in real business procedures. They were given practice in practical areas such as writing checks correctly and keeping a checkbook straight.

Learning the keyboard and typing Christmas pictures were two main projects done by Mrs. Duke's Typing I classes. At the end of the year, several assignments were due daily. In Typing II, Mr. Kloepfer drilled his students on the finer points of letter style and activities designed

#### **GRAND PERFORMANCES**








The Rebels faltered in the madison Sectional after victories over Madison and Henryville, when they came up on the short end of 55-47 score to a very powerful Silver Creek Club.






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
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
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
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
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
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
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Another school year draws to a close, a year marked with great happenings and changes that will be landmarks in world history as well as in our smaller world at Southwestern.
