#### SCIENTISTS ALIVE





#### FITEING FOR AGRICULTURE


















Upper left: Paula Wilson mixes art and music together to form her "Cloning of a Woman."










# BUMP, SET, SPIKE








With these words, the seniors rolled out of the parking lot and, heralded by the honking of the bus horn, began their twenty-two hour journey to the land of sun and fun.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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Have you ever stopped to think of who the people are who run the school? These people who work in the offices are just as important to the school system as the teachers and the students.




