

Southwestern looked forward to 1982 with fervor and hope and in the end it all paid off.











Progress was the name of the game and the Southwestern-Hanover Chapter of the Future Farmers of America really progressed during the past two years.

Under the direction of their advisor, Ken Salkeld, the Chapter entered many contests and were involved in many other activities. During National FFA Week the Southwestern-Hanover FFA Chapter celebrated by having a Farmers' Day, Offical FFA Dress Day, a Western Dress Day, and they also served breakfast to the junior high and senior high faculty. The Chapter was visited by Dave Anderson, Indiana State Secretary, also during the week. The FFA's annual fruit sales proved to be very profitable. Over 1000 boxes of Florida Citrus Fruit were sold with Steve Uebel, the top salesman, selling 150 boxes and Joe Neher coming in second with 81 boxes sold.

The Chapter captured five first places at the District 12 leadership camp, more than any other chapter in the district. The results included first places in Secretary's Book and Treasurer's Book, Chapter Exhibit, Chapter Cooperative Award, Improving Agriculture and Leadership, and Dave Habetler's Conservation Demonstration.

Chapter Officers and the "Peanut Gallery" participated in the Chapter Meeting Contests at Jac-Cen-Del High School and received first place. 





team to beat in the years to come.





At the close of the evening, each couple received champagne glasses as souvenirs. It truly was a night "for your eyes only"!





During the 1981-82 school year, Southwestern had 77 students attending the Southeastern Vocational School. Actually these vocational students were quite lucky because they had a "school away from school".











We Mean Business














Chosen To Guide

Building For Tomorrow




