

In Dedication To Kate King










The class of '84 truely had a prosperous year.






VOCAYS' OKAY
















AG. - THE FARM LIFE




SING, SING, SING






Mr. Kleopher kept his accounting class busy. They spent their classroom hours balancing checkbooks, accounts, and other business transactions.









Mr. Robertson instructed his students on one more paper mache project before the year came to a finish.


Mr. Robertson also teaches Art History, 3-D Art. Film Studies, and Drawing Technique mini courses.

LET'S GET PHYSICAL





COMPUTERS INVADE SOUTHWESTERN








REBELS EARN RESPECT



















FRESHMEN GAIN EXPERIENCE



The 1982-83 wrestling team started the year with the goal of achieving a .500 season. This goal was made prior to losing a wrestler at the 185-pound weight class, and another wrestler to an injury in the 155-pound weight class. Even with these setbacks the team accomplished a 6-7 dual meet recorded and placed fourth in the Charlestown Invitational Tournament which included eight teams from Providence, Carydon, Madison, Southwestern, Scottsburg, Charlestown, Jeffersonville, and East Hardin.

This year's team was young and will only be losing four seniors. These were Jeff Bruther, 155 lbs.; Carlos Suarez, 126 lbs.; Rodney Mahoney, 177 lbs.; and Alvin Hooker, HWT.

1983 marked the first time the wrestlers were given a pep rally before the sectional. Matmaids further expressed their spirit by decorating the buses for both sectional and regional meets.





CINDERMEN DO IT AGAIN



The girls had such tasks as stacking hats and carrying bats to and from the field. As a special treat, the girls decorated the boys' lockers and gave them cookies and candy before each game.








The junior varsity baseball team had a satisfying season and gained a lot of experience as they finished just below the fifty-percent mark with a 2-3 record.

FRESHMEN PROMOTE ENTHUSIASM





They faced many obstacles such as having seventy percent of their games away and therefore cheering many times to an empty audience.



CLASS OF '88 MOVES ON UP



BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE




This year was an exciting one for the Jr. High band. Their new band director. Mr. Drew Gorby, made sure of that.


DILIGENCE PAYS OFF IN ENGLISH






UPS AND DOWNS


