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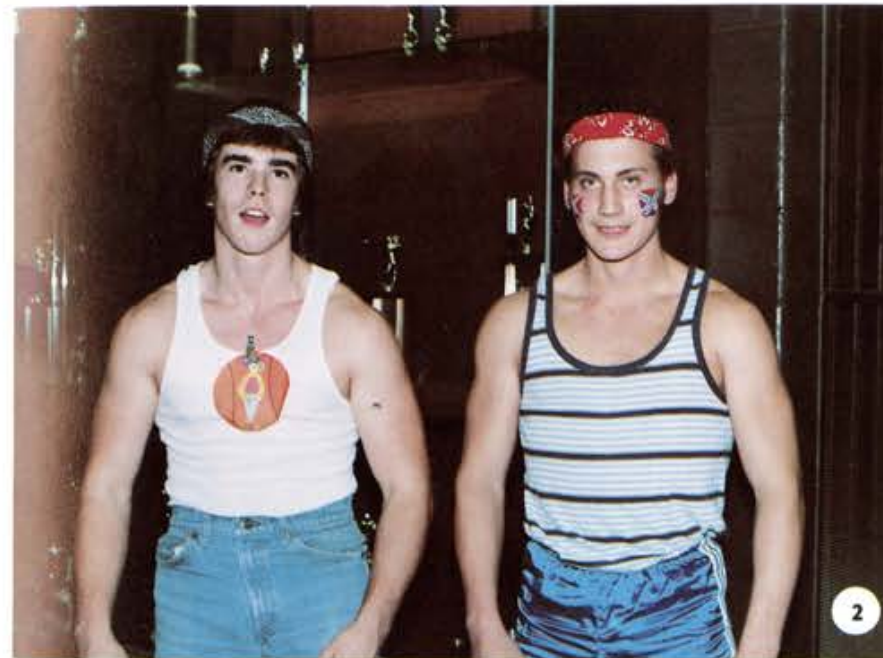

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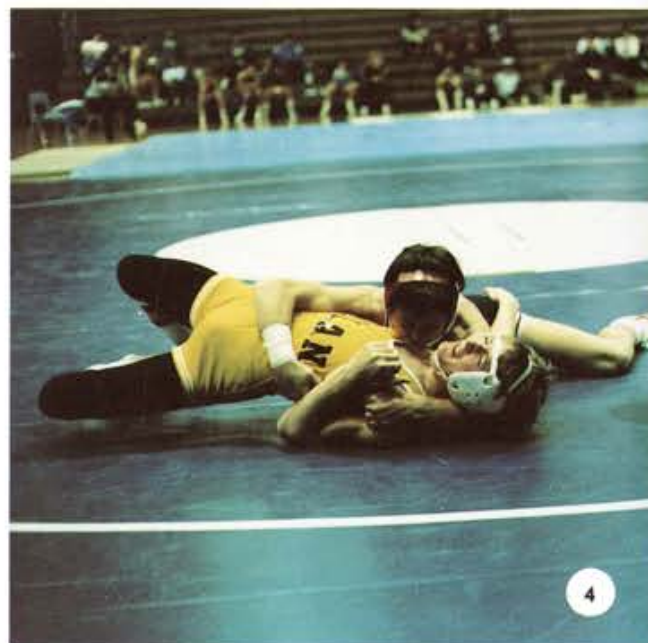

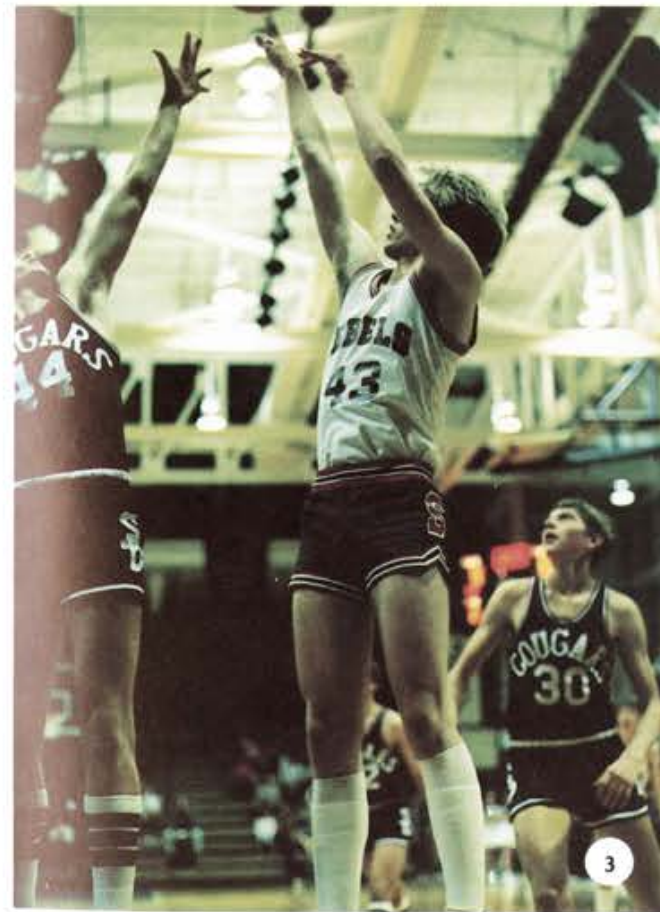

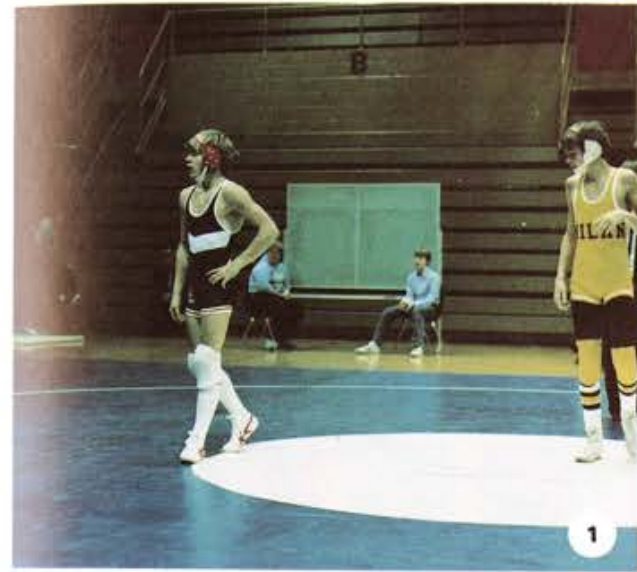

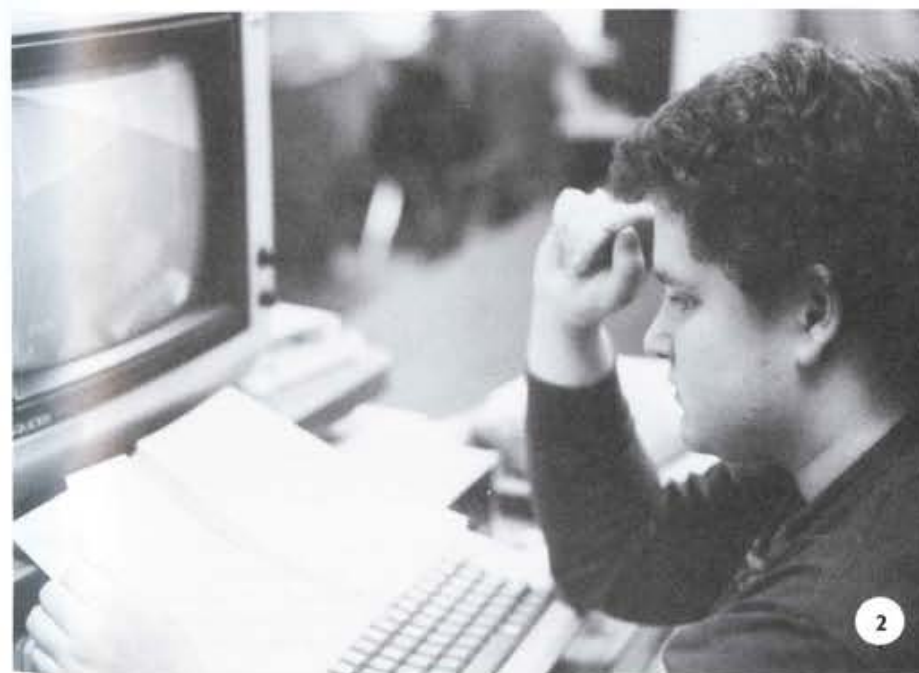
# MR. ROBOTO

# I FEEL THE EARTH MOVE

Agriculture is a main source of income for the United States. At Southwestern High School Ag was a main source of awards. Adviser Ken Salkheld supervised this group for the past four years. With his dedication and willingness to work, the FFA Chapter at Southwestern was considered one of the best in the state. The FFA Chapter, during the past year, won many judging events. In Soils Judging, Southwestern had a first place team from Jefferson County. They participated in the area contest and won third place. They then participated in the State Soils Contest held in Wabash County. This dedicated team consisted of Jim Tingle, Joe Neher, Mike Grubbs, and Keith Means. Joe was the high point in the county. In dairy judging, Southwestern had a first and second place team in Jefferson County. The teams participated in the area contest and received fifth place of 14 teams. Jim Tingle was high individual in the county. In Livestock judging, Southwestern had a first place team. This group participated in the area contest and

received second place. They then participated in the State Contest held at Purdue University. Team members included Scott Ison, Jim Tingle, Joe Neher, Dallas Hardy. Scott was high individual in the County and fourth in the area. In Crops judging, Southwestern won first place in the County and placed tenth in the Area Contest. In Horse judging, Southwestern placed sixth at the Area Contest.

Leadership was a big plus to the FFA. At the District Leadership Contest, Southwestern participated in twenty of twenty-one contests and placed first, second, and third in thirteen of the events. Don Brooks was named the District XII Star Agriculture Businessman for 1984 and received his degree at the State Convention in June.

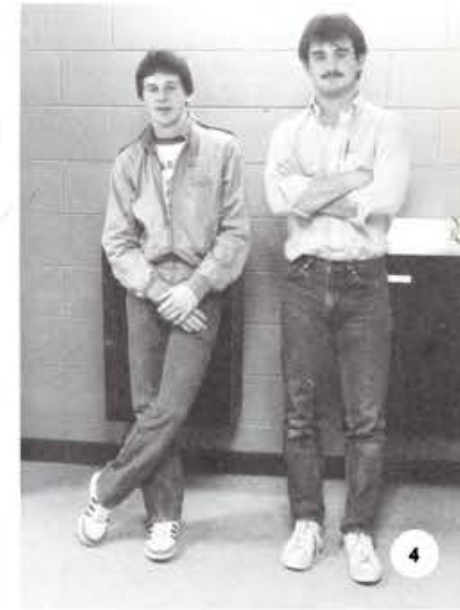


# LONG ARM OF THE LAW

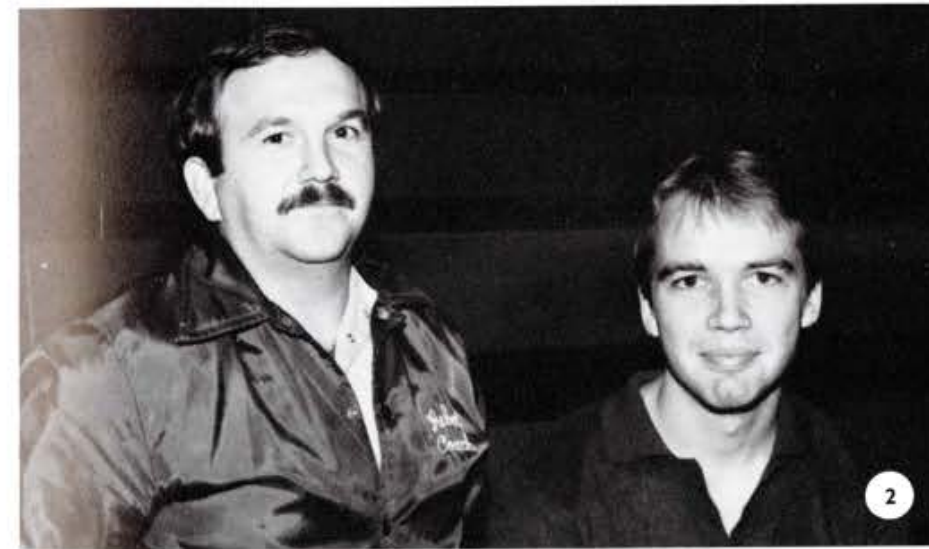
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# RUN, RUN, RUN AWAY

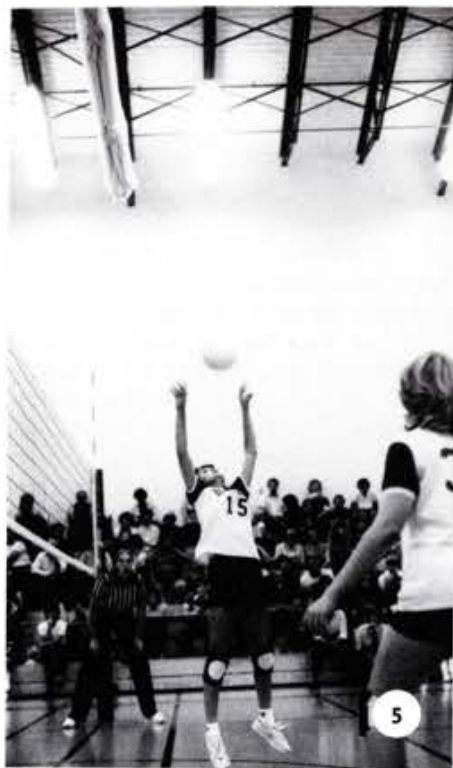


# PLAY IT DOWN

For the first time since wrestling began at Southwestern four years ago, the 1983-84 Rebel wrestlers pulled away with a winning season record (10-9).

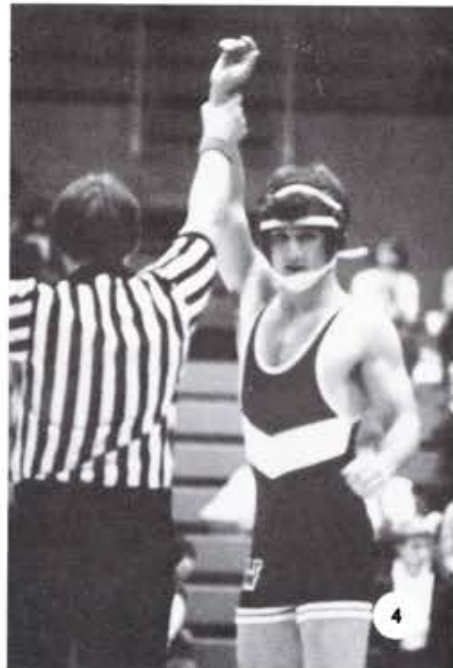

Clair and Paul Elles placing third in their respective weight classes.

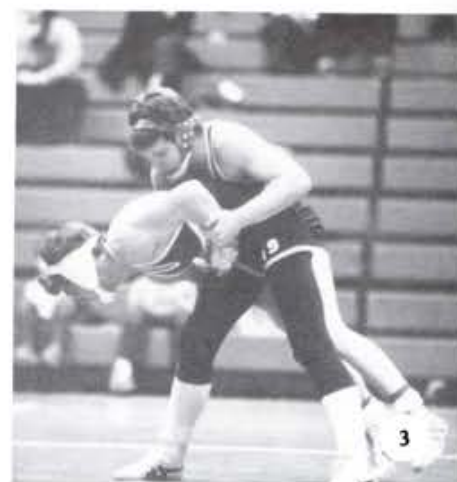
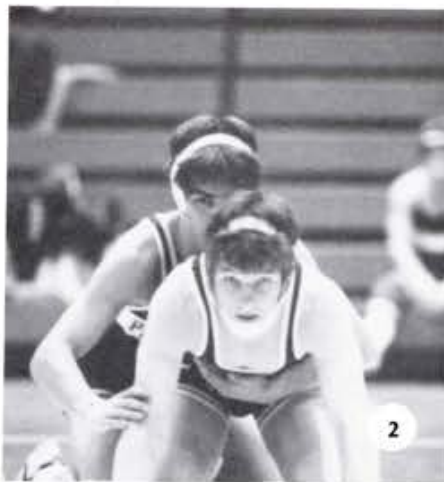

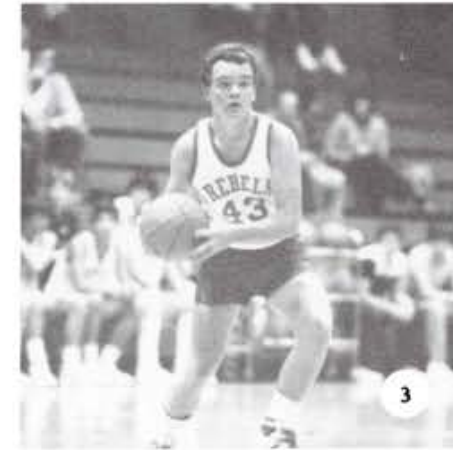


# WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS

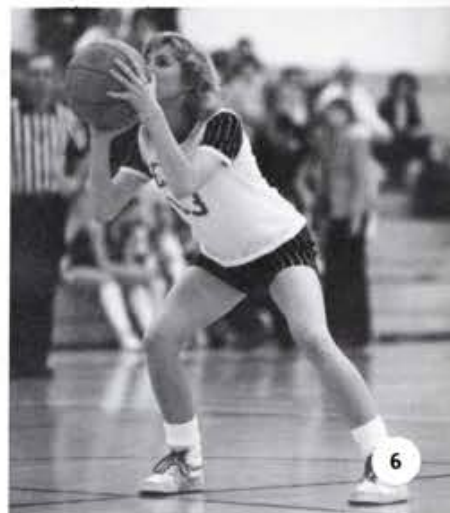

# ALL TIME HIGH

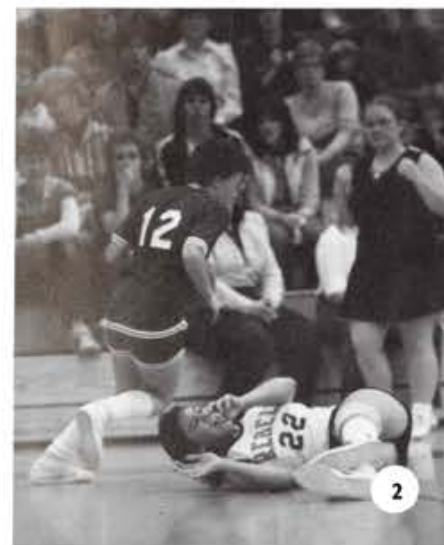
The Southwestern Lady Rebels had a very fine season with a 12 and 7 record, second best in their history.

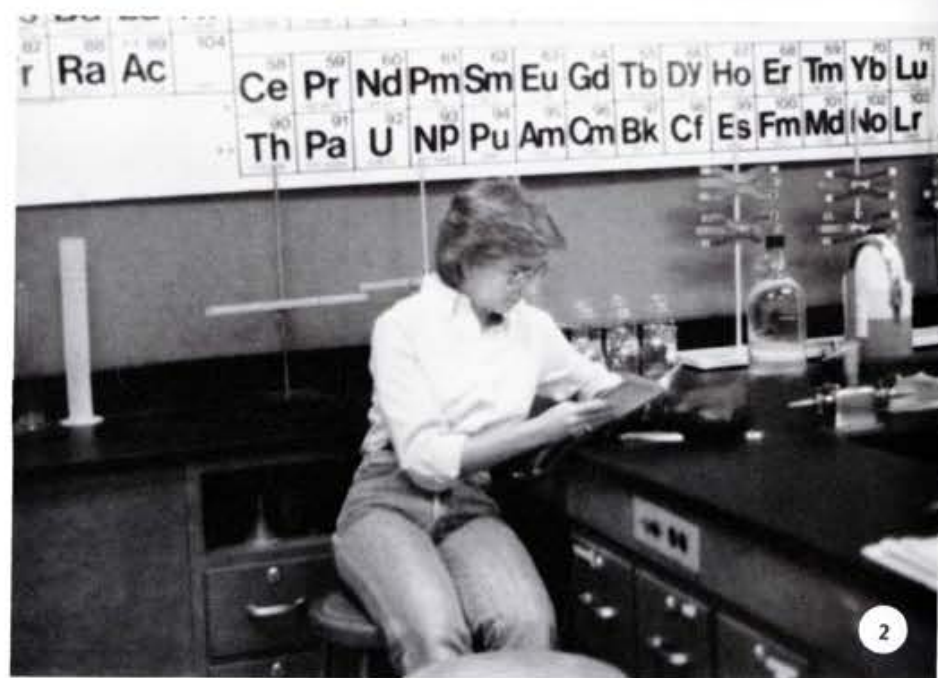
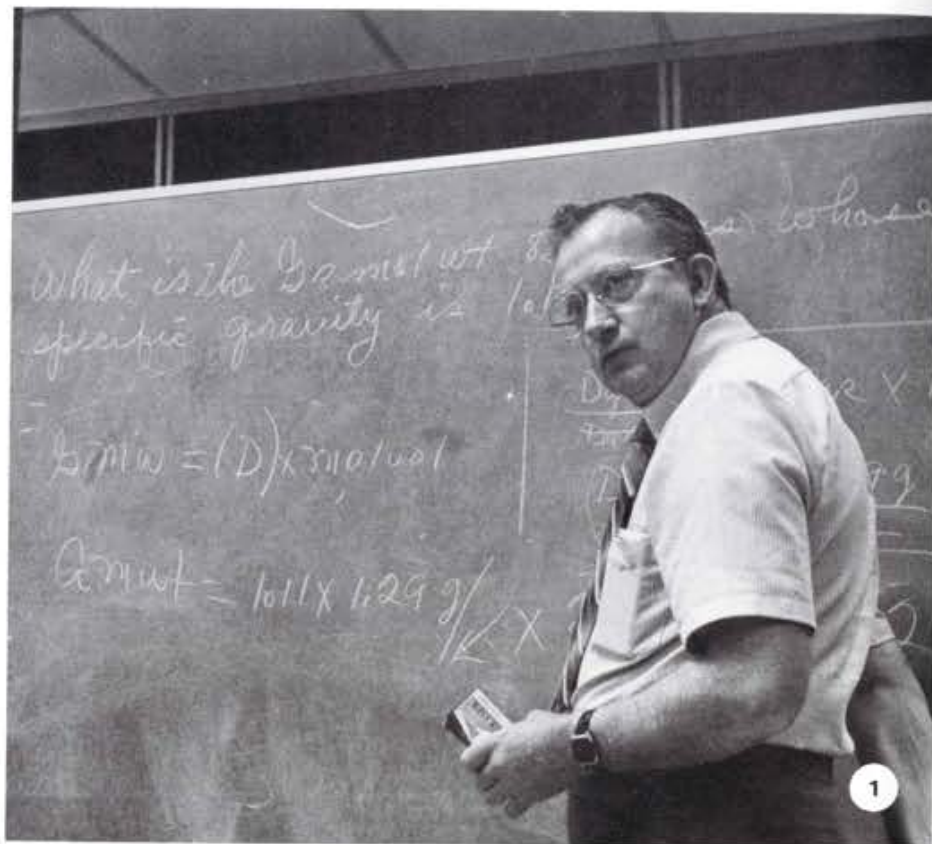
Biology II students studied in-depth units of genetics, human reproduction, the theory of evolution, and ecology. Biology II also enjoyed a field trip in the spring.

The faculty and administration of Southwestern really does work hard for the money.

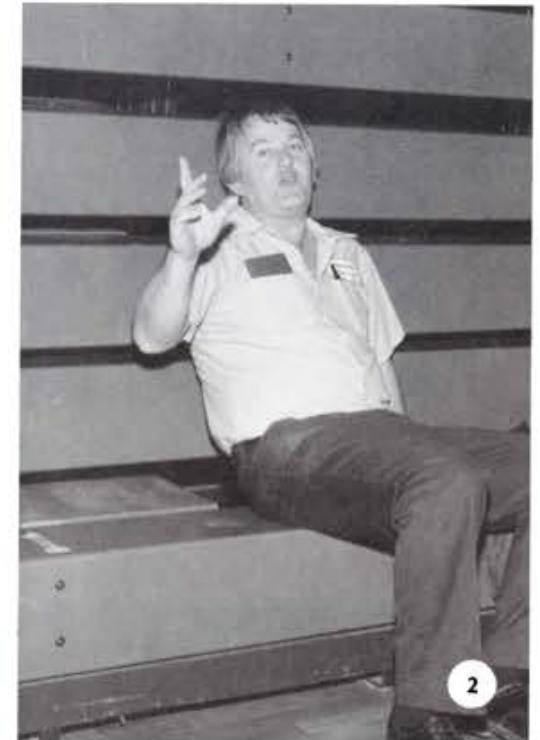
Dr. Pat Leahey, head administrator, made many important decisions concerning the future of Southwestern this past year.

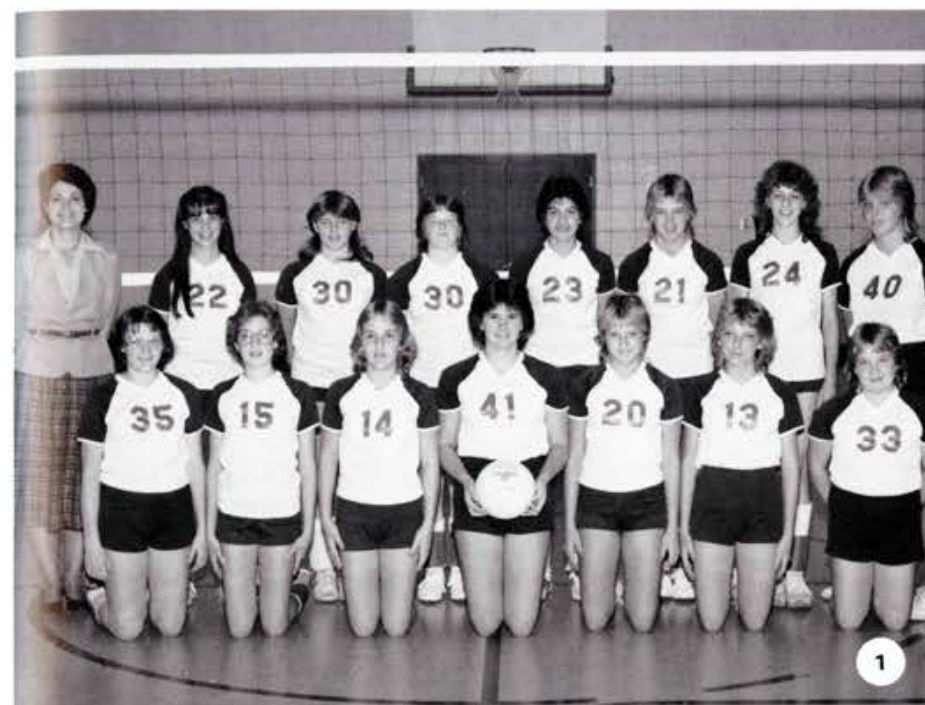

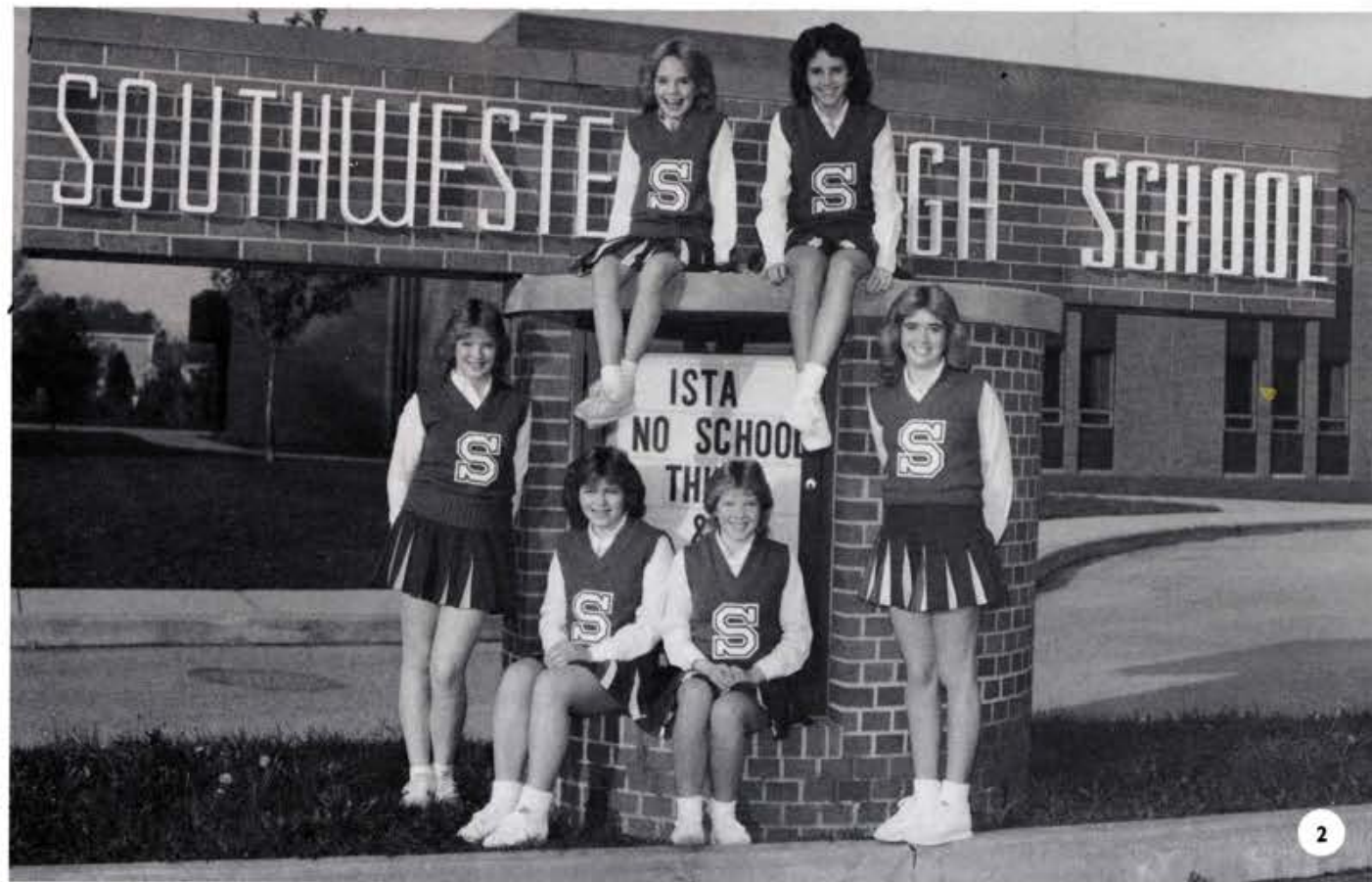


# I'LL TUMBLE FOR YA

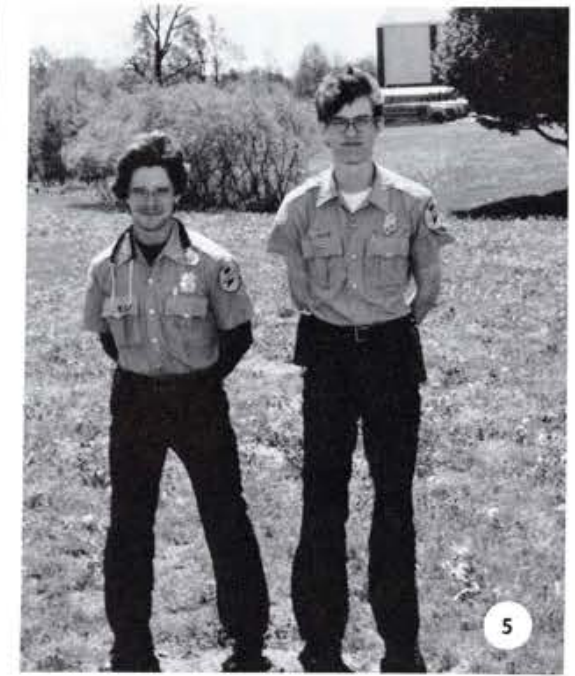




# WORKING CLASS KIDS

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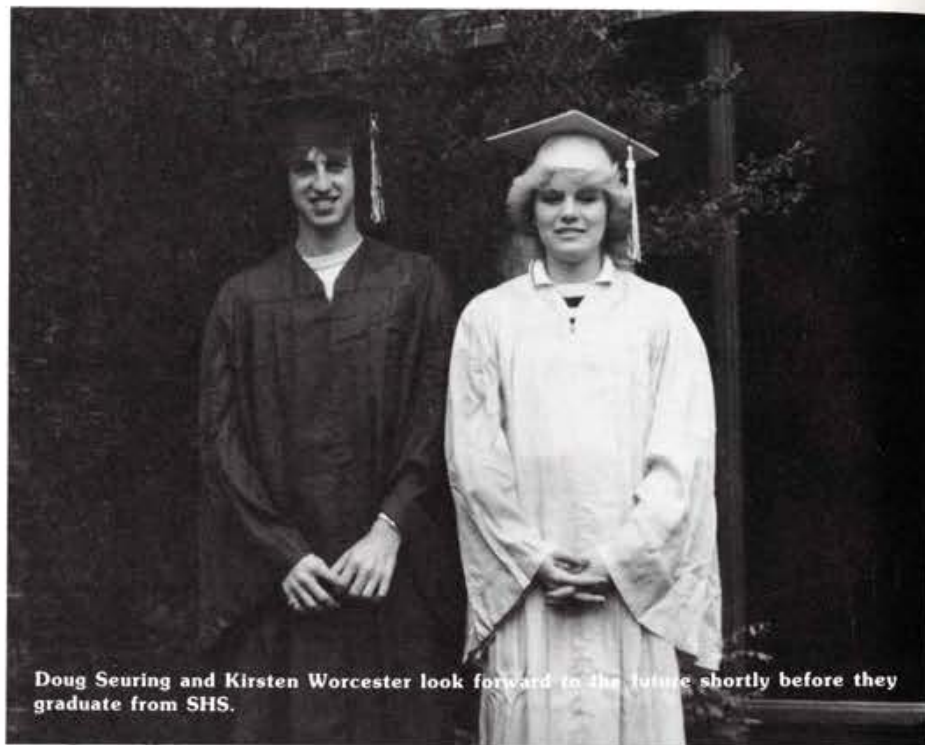
