



NEW LOOK OFFERED

Over the past 25 years, many changes have been made in the English Department, the department with the largest number of teaching faculty members. Southwestern has acquired a highly educated group of teachers to handle

this department.

Freshmen entering high school were taught by Mrs. Mary Sue Barnett and Mrs. Martha Clancy; they refresh their grammar skills and gain knowledge about some of the great literary works. Sophomores built upon the knowledge already acquired under the guiding hands of Ms. Jennifer Atkins and Mrs. Virgie Dowell, who also serves the department as its chairperson. Mrs. Dorothy Wykoff and Ms. Atkins taught the juniors about the qualities of American literature and how to write a research paper. Remedial classes were also offered at all levels.

All seniors except VOCA stu-

dents were required to take two units of English or literature. Seniors had a variety of semester choices from which to choose. Creative Composition, taught by Mrs. Marcia Morrill, gave students the opportunity to be imaginative as they wrote short stories and poetry. Many of the college bound students took Mrs. Morrill's Advanced Composition class. Here she gave the seniors a preview of composition experiences they will face in college. Students in composition classes were encouraged to enter writing contests; many were successful in winning several of these.

For many years speech, taught by Mrs. Lorna Naylor, was required; however, this year the class was changed to a one semester elective. Many of the students planning to attend college elected to take speech. For our students who plan to pursue theater careers, there was Mrs. Dowelll's Dramatic Literature class. Students in this class produced a play. Masterpiece Literature, the study of the greatest works ever written, was taught by Mrs. Wykoff. Mrs. Morrill also taught England in Literature. Seniors learned about the great classics from England, covering works from the Anglo/Saxon Age to the Twentieth Century.

Our English Department has also developed an excellent journalism program. Mrs. Clancy and Mrs. Morrill were instructors in this area. Students must take Journalism I before they were permitted to take Media I, a class in which the CONFEDERATE is published, and Media II, the REBIAN production class. Being involved in the production of the school newspaper and yearbook have proven to be rewarding experiences for the members of each staff.

Christmas promised exciting fun for French students. They cooked and presented plays. The plays varied from dress-up to puppets. Allin-all it was a fun and exciting time.



Studying a foreign language can be very rewarding. We never know when we are going to be deserted on a desert island in the Pacific with only a Mexican or Frenchman to talk to!






As the hour of twelve drew near, the garter ceremony was announced, and the couples danced to the theme song. Then much too soon, the lovely evening came to an end.

Any Rebel fan can depend on the varsity boys' cross country team to be competitive and exciting to watch. The 1984 season proved to be no different as the Rebels ran competitively against the cross country powerhouses in Southern Indiana (Charlestown, Jefferson-ville, Jac-Cen-Del). Charlestown competed in the state meet, and just one month before, the Rebels beat them by one point.

The team was composed of seniors Bob Moore, Rick Johnson, Mark McCloud; junior Steve Morrill; and sophomores Brian Bailey, Bobby Hatton, and Kevin Shelley. Individual as well as team goals, were set and records were broken.

The Rebels started the season with a 19-36 victory over Switzerland County and continued this victory pattern throughout the season. With a score of 19, Southwestern won the Madison Courier Invitational Tourney and reigned as county champs for the third consecutive year. To be competitive, a team must run in large invitational meets. The Rebels proved themselves by placing third of eight teams at the Jeffersonville Invitational, fourth of 11 teams at the Jennings County Invitational, fifth

of 12 teams at the Pekin Invitational, and third of 11 teams at the Bloomington Invitational. The team placed fourth in the Sectional meet to earn a berth in the Regional. The team itself had a 65-28 record over-all and was undefeated in dual meets this year.

By the close of the '84 season, four runners were standouts: Moore, Johnson, and Morrill were all a part of the All-Conference team, the All-County team, and the All-Sectional team, and McCloud made the All-County team. At the County the Rebel team had its first five runners in the top ten, and they also had the first three finishers.

Bobby Moore set a new course record and placed first at the Jennings County Invitational, and he also set a new course record of 16:00 at Switzerland County. Rick Johnson had two memorable races, one at Regionals and one at the Conference meet, where he ran first for the team. Steve Morrill and Mark McCloud also had their best seasons. Steve and Mark finished second and third respectively at the county

meet, Mark's best finish of his carreer.

At the awards' banquet, retiring Coach Steve Bright honored his runners. Bob Moore received the most points award. Steve Morrill was given the Most Improved trophy. 



The 1985 Boys' Track Team had a disappointing season this year. The first official practice consisted of many athletes, but as the first meet approached, the team dwendled in size. Smallness of the running Rebels was only one problem; another was the poor attendance at practice sessions. The Senior Trip contributed a role in the future success of the 1985 track team as well.
















CLASS OF '85




All in all the year was an exciting one for the class of 1986.


