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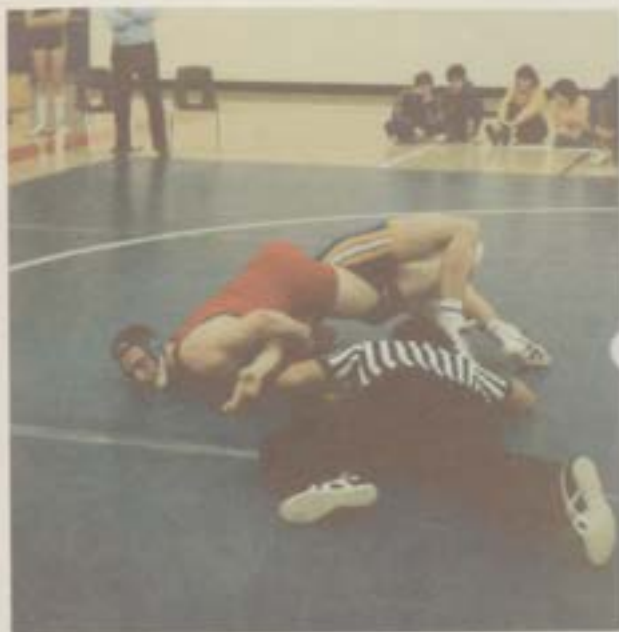

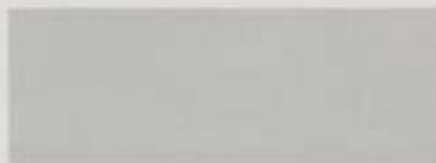




# Fashion — SWHS style

# Down year? Never!

"The era is over! The dominance is gone! Get set for a couple of down years." These words floated through the halls of Southwestern after the close of the 1984 cross country season. On that team, three of the top five runners were seniors. At the close of the season the outlook for Southwestern cross country in 1985 seemed very dim.

Along with the new school year came a new cross country team, a new coach, and a new attitude. New coach Leon Perry, the well-respected cross country coach at Shawe Memorial High School for the past six years, decided to accept a teaching position at SWHS, and with this came a coaching job, a job almost any coach in southern Indiana would have coveted. Along with his new coaching techniques, he brought a new attitude. The majority of the team members felt pessimistic, but Mr. Perry quickly changed their feelings.

Practices began a week late because of hiring complications, and the first two weeks of practice were like always — the worst because the runners were tired, muscles were sore, and team members became cranky! By the time the first meet rolled around, the team was very short-tempered and tired, but that did not seem to affect the teams' performance; the running Rebels defeated a strong Switzerland County team by the score of 26-33. Senior Captain Steve Morrill ran first in the race. Coach Perry also had fine performances from freshman Jay Miller and juniors Sean Harvey, Bryan Bailey, and Bob Hatton.

Coach Perry suddenly realized that his team truly did have the dedication and talent it took to be one of the best running teams in Southern Indiana. Although the team had an excellent first race, they still had room to improve and secret weapons to unveil! Just in time for the harriers' third race, Coach Perry pulled a trick from his sleeve of magic, and its name was Curt Hilleary. Hilleary had put

in his ten practices and was ready to do battle with the Shiners from Rising Sun, who were not expecting the novice Southwestern basketball player-turned-runner and were surprised by Southwestern's victory of 24-36.

With the addition of Hilleary to the team, its running power increased. He quickly took over the second position on the team, tightening the gap between Morrill and third man Jay Miller. After the Rebels' first two victories, their confidence increased, as it did after the third, fourth, and fifth victories. The running Rebels were 5-0 and had beaten every team in the conference except the undefeated Jac-Cen-Del Eagles. Before they tackled the Eagles, however, the harriers took a break from conference action to run in the Madison Invitational Tournament. Southwestern would try to beat Madison, Shawe, and Switzerland County teams for the fifth time in a row. On September 28 the Rebels met their first pre-season goal: they won the county invitational. They ran a very demanding race, winning easily. Morrill was the individual winner, coming in first at a time of 17:40. Hilleary also had a fine performance and placed third, only two seconds behind Madison's Scott Holcroft. The Rebels' top five runners finished in the top ten, all receiving the honor of membership on the All-County team.

After the County meet, Rebel harriers traveled to the Jeffersonville Invitational, where they hoped to face their last conference rival, the Jac-Cen-Del Eagles. However, the Eagle coach decided not to run in the invitational. Despite rainy weather, the Rebels turned in a good performance. Returning to conference action, the SW runners took on the strong Eagles and a weaker Shawe Hilltopper team. In spite of the strong reputation of the Eagles, the Rebels found no difficulty controlling them. The Rebels won the meet by ten points over Jac-Cen-Del and went

on to beat Shawe easily.

The Rebel had now conquered all six conference foes and all that was left for them was to keep their momentum until the conference meet. They managed to hang on and to achieve their second pre-season goal: they became ORVC 1985 Champions, thus earning their coach his first "Coach of the Year" honor. By the end of the season the Rebels had compiled a 13-0 duel record.

With the conference championship win the Rebels only had their third pre-season goal to achieve: they wanted a trip to the Regionals. In October they accomplished this final goal. With less than full strength, the team gained the fifth berth at the Sectional and a trip to the Regional. Although they were favored to be one of the powerhouses of the race, with two runners short, the harriers came through by the skin of their teeth. With this win the Southwestern Cross Country Team achieved the triple crown of racing: the Conference, the County, and the Regional.

A few days after the season ended at the Fall Sports Banquet trophies were given to Steve Morrill: Most Points and Captain; Jay Miller: Most Improved; and John Stoner: Hustle; and Pat Brawler received the JV Hustle Award. Morrill, Hilleary and Miller were members of the All-Conference Team. Principal Delbert King praised Curt Hilleary and commented about how the seniors on the team truly revived school spirit.

In terms of future years the Rebels look as if they should continue the strength of past years. The team will lose seniors Curt Hilleary, Tom Hertz, and Steve Morrill. Returning will be juniors Sean Harvey, Kevin Shelley, Bryan Bailey, Jerry Thornton and Bob Hatton, sophomore John Stoner and freshman Pat Brawler.

# On the mat is where it's at!

On to state we went! For the first time in SW history three wrestlers advanced to the Semi-state and one proceeded on to the State meet at Market Square Arena. It was the best season ever for a Southwestern wrestling team. Coach Andy Simon and Assistant Kurt Hummelldorf spent long hours working with the grapplers, and their dedication and determination paid off. The Rebels compiled a 11-3-1 record in dual meets and 32-6-1 record overall.

The wrestling Rebels won the eight team Waldron Invitational Mohawk Classic held in Waldron, Indiana. Four individuals were crowned champions: Tony Brawner at 112 pounds, Brandon Silcox at 119 pounds, Jeff Annon at 138 and Sonny Clair at 185 pounds. Clair was crowned outstanding wrestler of the tournament. He had an outstanding day by defeating two previously undefeated wrestlers.

The team tied for first in regular season conference dual meets and placed second in the Southern Indiana wrestling conference tournament. Again Southwestern had the outstanding wrestler; Tony Brawner at 112 pounds was named Outstanding Wrestler of the Tournament. We had four individual conference champions: Tony Brawner, Brandon Silcox, Steve Annon and Jeff Annon.

The grapplers had an unbelievable sectional. Eight wrestlers advanced to the regionals. Second place finishers were Tom Hertz, Steve Annon, Jeff Annon, Bob Ford and Larry Hancock while first place men to advance were Brawner, Silcox, and Clair. Three wrestlers moved onto Semi-state: Tony Brawner, Brandon Silcox, and Steve Annon. Brawner advanced to state.

Brawner was the school's first three-time sectional champion. For four years in a row, he wrestled at 112 pounds. He was also the first wrestler to make it to the State.

At the Awards Banquet the following awards were presented: Most Improved, Brandon Silcox; Hustle, Tony Brawner; Most pins, Jeff Annon and Tony Brawner tied with 20 pins each; Most Take-Downs, Steve Annon (a school record with 47); Senior Scholastic, Sonny Clair. Co-captains for the team were Jeff Annon and Tony Brawner.

The Southwestern High School wrestlers were supported by a large group of mat maids during the 1985-86 season. These girls were on hand at all matches to help the wrestlers and the coaches. Some of the responsibilities that the mat maids had were to run the scoreboard, to keep the record book, to pay dues that pay for refreshments given to the wrestlers, to decorate lockers and put up banners at school to encourage team spirit and support for wrestlers, to buy and wear a mat maid shirt to show unity and support for the wrestling team, and to yell and cheer for the wrestlers win or lose.

This year's Southwestern Mat Maids represented our school very well. We have the largest organized group of mat maids in this area. All the mat maids received certificates at the athletic Awards Banquet. In addition, Barb Annon, Jo Bare, Dawna Gross, Kim Howell, Angela Kidwell, Darla Owens, Laura Schwartz and Tara Taylor were awarded pins for being outstanding mat maids. Barb Annon had perfect attendance at the wrestling matches for two years.

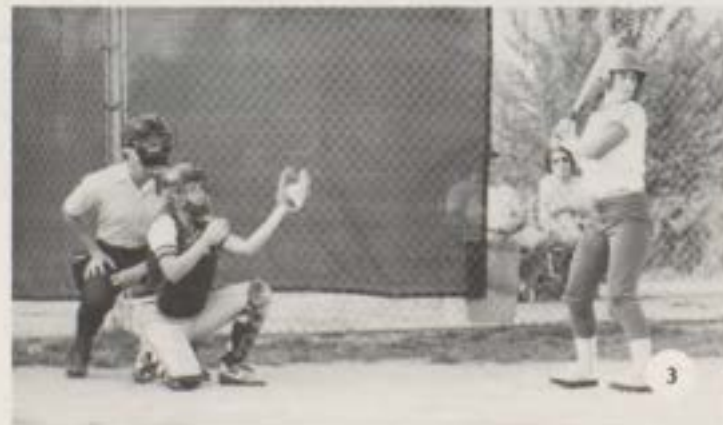
# A winning season for the ladies!

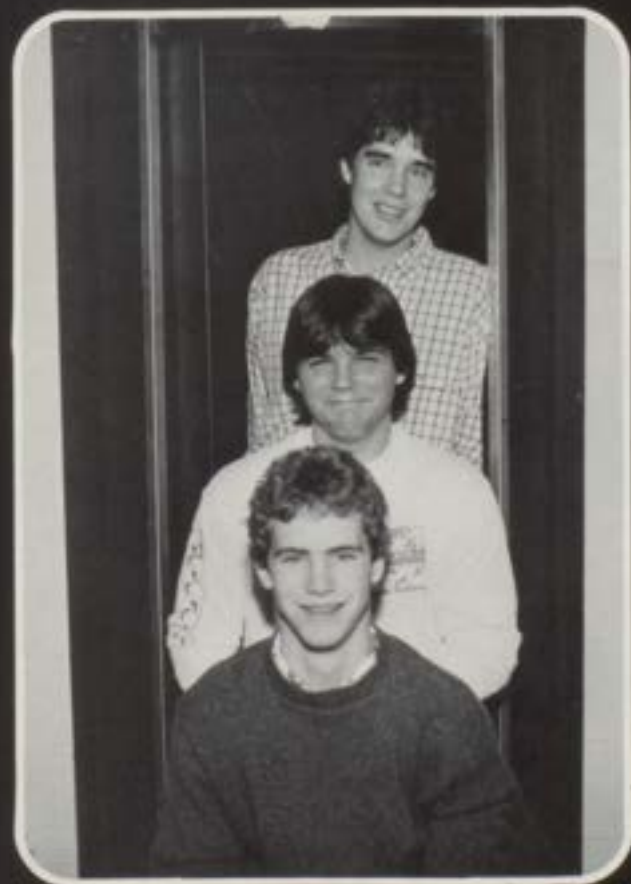
