Students at Southwestern are exposed to a variety of subjects which are

provided by the English department.

As freshmen, students learn all about verbals and phrases. They also read Flowers for Algernon as well as getting their first taste of Shake-speare when they read Romeo and Juliet. This year's freshmen were instructed by Mrs. Ann Campbell, Mrs. Lorna Naylor, and Mrs. Mary Sue Barnett. Mrs. Jennifer Orrill took her sophomore class through the tragedy of Julius Caesar, the drama of To Kill A Mockingbird, and the adventure of A Separate Peace. Between all of that, they find time to squeeze in grammar, poetry, and journal writing. During the junior year, students got their final review of grammar and discussed the works of Steinbeck, Thoreau, Hawthorne and other American greats. They were taught by Mrs. Dorothy Wykoff.

During their junior and senior years, students may select several other courses to meet their graduation requirements. Speech, an exciting, creative class taught by Mrs. Naylor may be chosen or perhaps Dramatic Literature, taught by Mrs. Virgie Dowell. There are also several classes taught to the seniors by Mrs. Marcia Morrill. Seniors may choose from any combination of Advanced Composition, where students may learn to make peanut butter and jelly sandwiches from someone else's directions, or Creative Writing, or the Literature of England where the class reads Macbeth and A Tale of Two Cities. Students may also take journalism, taught by Mrs. Martha Clancy, who exposes them to different facets of the journalism world. After taking this course, students may be eligible to work on the Rebian staff or the Confederate staff, also instructed by Mrs.

Clancy.



important.



skills.














INDUSTRIAL ARTS BUILD GOOD YEAR


Next year a new computer may be added to the communication lab for the improving of their projects.

BUSINESS BOOMS AT SOUTHWESTERN







The group contained various aged students, and although at times there were problems, the singer-dancers worked well and efficiently together.



The season began the first week of summer '86 for the Southwestern Marching Band. Long hours of practicing in the band room and out on the parking lot prepared the members for the Hanover Days Parade and the Madison Regatta Parade. Band members also donated at least four hours of their time dishing out sloppy joes and nachos to hungry tourists who stopped by the band boosters' booth at the regatta.

Band camp activities began in August. SWHS band director Miss Bonnie Harmon and her associates from Princeton High School spent at least eight hours a day for a week teaching the band the show that was performed every weekend that fall.

And it was a successful fall sea-

son for this group of musicians who wore handsome new uniforms, paid for through the efforts of band boosters and the generosity of the school board. The band's energetic show consisted of the selections "Opener 210", "Up the Ladder to the Roof", "I'll Take Romance", and as the closing number, "Belle Via Solero". With this combination, the band took many top awards and even performed the night show at Paoli, a premier competition for high school bands in Indiana.

Drum major Amy Manning received top honors wherever she went, and the color guard was rewarded with trophies at several competitions. The band received a I rating at the Indiana High School Music Association's district com-

petition and was edged out of participation at the state competition by a slim margin at the regional competition.

Through fundraisers such as paper drives and benefit ball games, the band went to the Apple Blossom Festival in Winchester, Virginia to perform in two parades and play a concert on the steps of the Capitol in Washington, D.C. After a rewarding, but tiring trip, band members came home, having placed tenth out of more than 120 bands from around the country.

Thanks to the leadership of Miss Harmon, guard director Mr. Jeff Burch, and the hard work of the band's 45 members, the year was a productive one filled with sweat. sore muscles, and pride for their accomplishments.




ART CLUB DRAWS ATTENTION


Quill and Scroll is an organization that recognizes high school journalists. The Southwestern Quill and Scroll chapter gave out many awards and initiated many new members this year.

NHS MEMBERS BECAME TEACHERS IN '87






STUDENTS STEP OUT AT '87 PROM





























The Rebels lost their semi-final game, 10-9, and ended their season at 14-15.




WRESTLERS WIN TOP HONORS IN "87"








JANEANE TURNER


















JUNIOR HIGH ACCOMPLISHES MUCH










By the end of the year, the eighth grade class was ready for their first year of high school.


















EIGHTH GRADERS TRY HARD, FALL SHORT OF SUCCESS

After finishing their first year of junior high, they could hardly await their return to SWJH, but this time as eighth graders.








