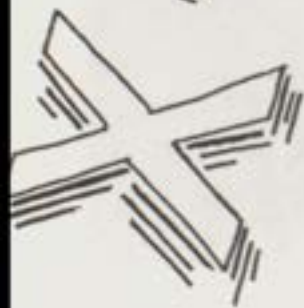

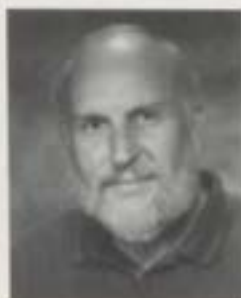

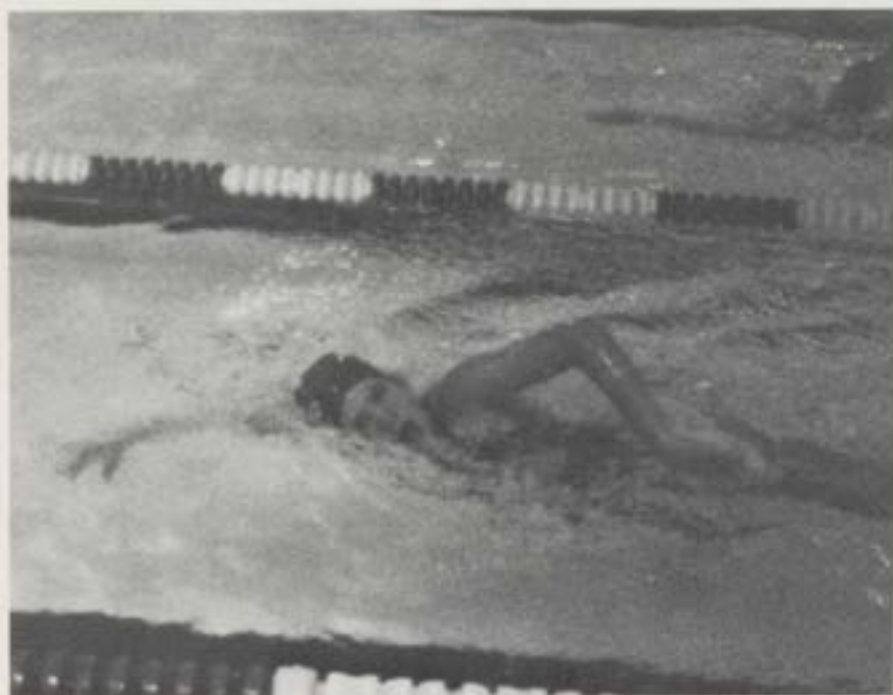


SWIMMING GIRLS END SEASON WITH A SPLASH

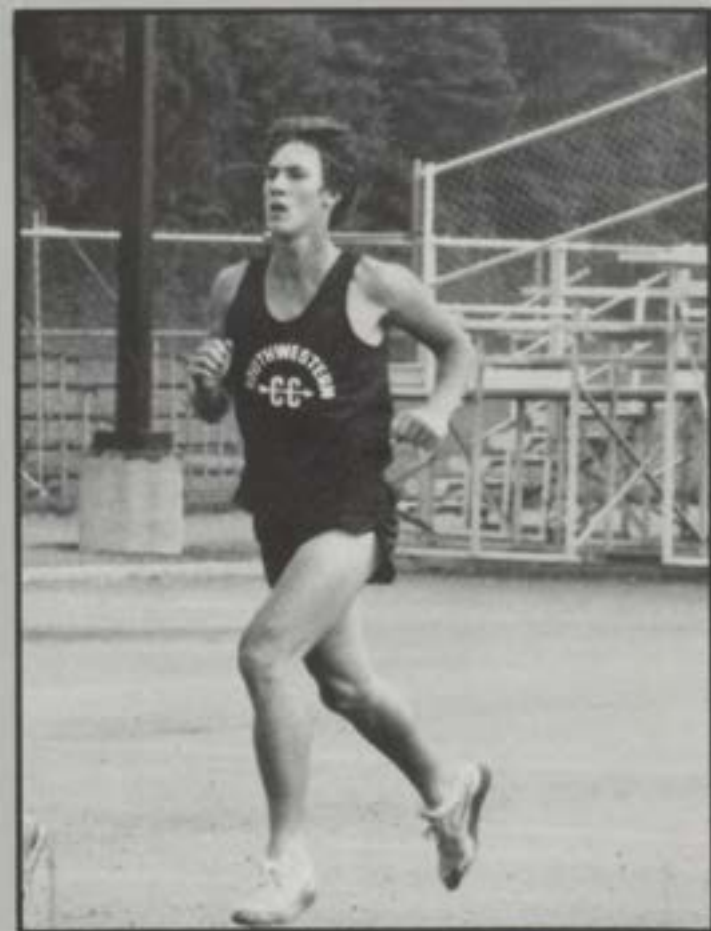
