

### Learning our history and government







### Making prime careers for the future








### Prime enthusiasm in clubs & activities



### Administration, Faculty, and Staff

Think about it: those who can do — teach. Southwestern's teachers taught many subjects, growing along with their students, showing they care. Teachers are shaping the future leaders of tomorrow. It takes a special breed to be patient with twenty-five talking students six hours a day, but teachers do just that.

Managing a school also requires patience. From answering constantly ringing telephones to monitoring the school lunches, the administration and staff of SW establish and maintain over 600 students' daily school routines.

### Southwestern led by competent managers

The faculty, administration, and staff of Southwestern High School continued to lead and support the students in 1988-89. Forty-six teachers taught a curriculum which ranged from required courses such as English to electives such as foreign foods. After what at times were difficult negotiations, the teachers and school board settled on a master contract in November.

Perhaps the biggest change for teachers and students alike came in he form of a still longer school year mandated by the Indiana General Assembly. Teachers found themselves in the classroom June 5, due to the lengthening of the school year to 181 days and to the stipulation that days missed due to bad weather must be accounted for.

The school corporation was once again led by a competent school board and superintendent Dr. J. Patrick Leahey. The high school and junior high were supervised by Mr. Delbert King, principal. He was assisted by vice-principal Mr. Jerry Snapp.







## Flags up for color guard & winter guard flag groups


The 1988-89 color guard/winter guard consisted of nine members. They practiced three days a week for most of the year.






