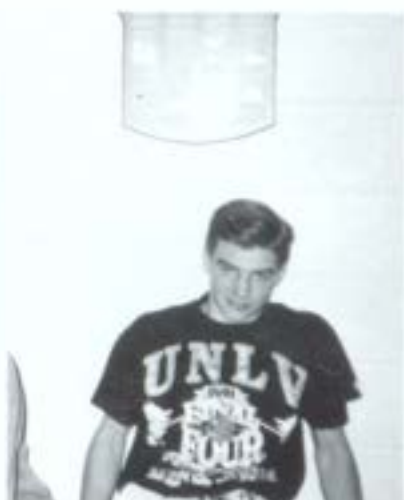
STUDENTS VENT OUT ENERGY

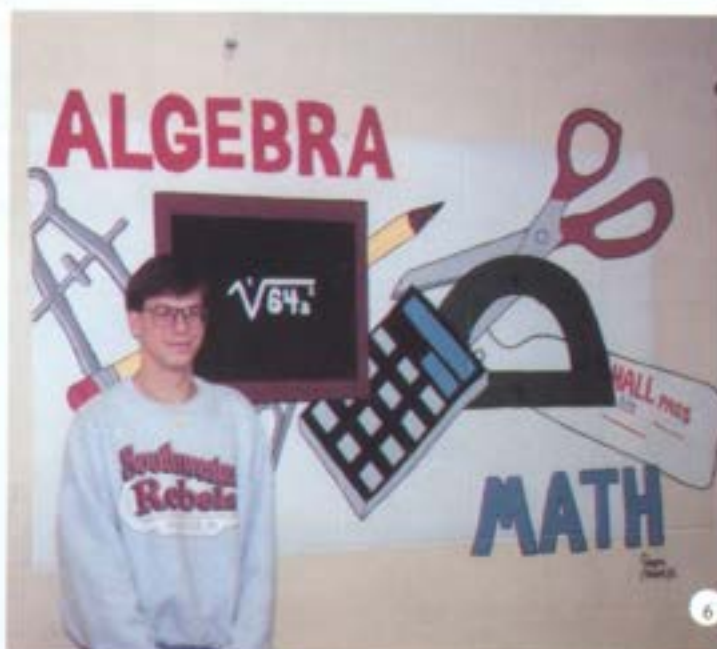

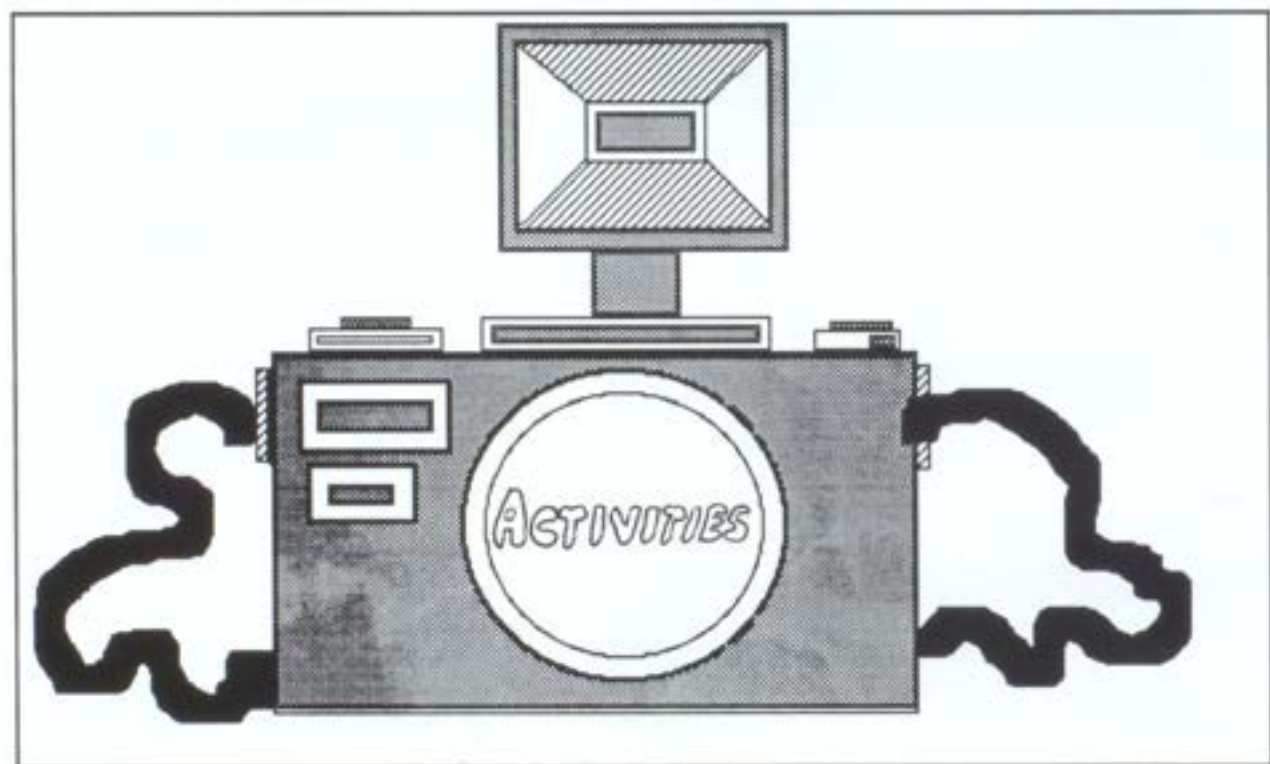

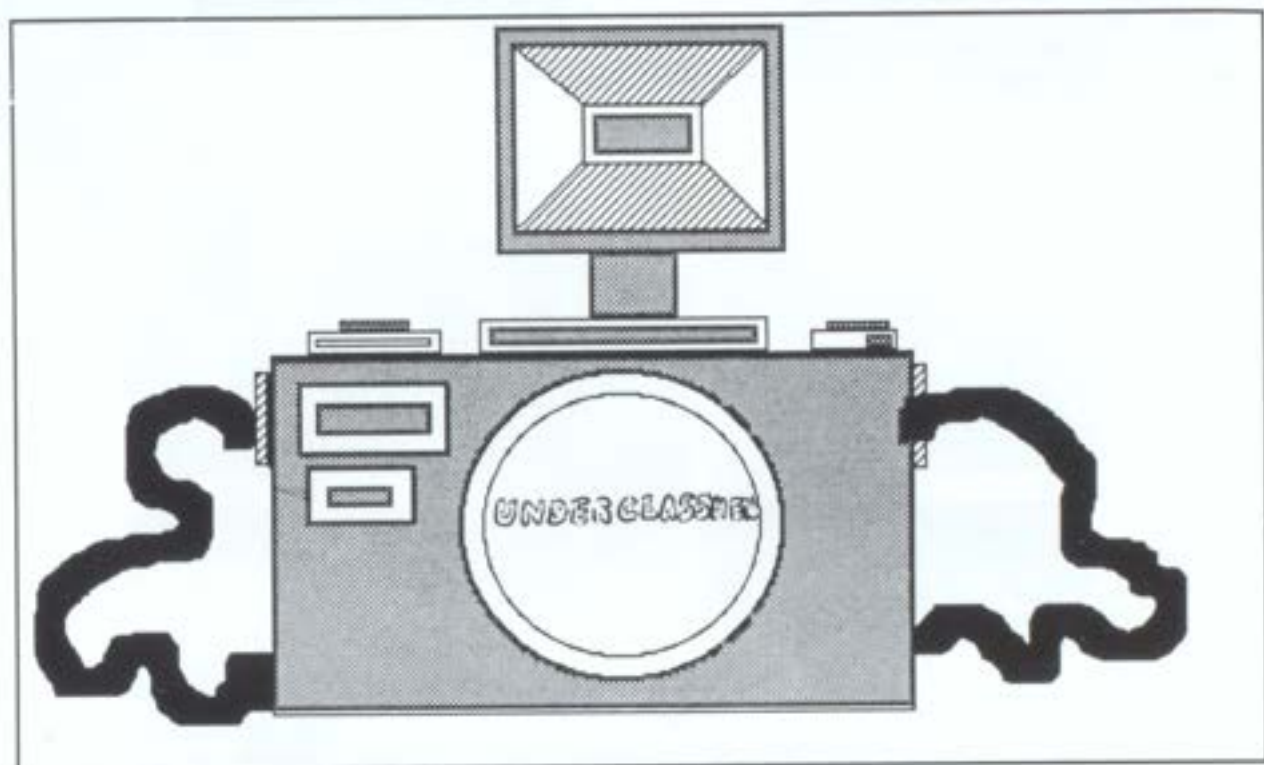


VARSITY GOLF

Tyson was found guilty on three counts.

Thursday, November 14, 1991, Earvin "Magic" Johnson announced his retirement from the Los Angeles Lakers after testing positive for the HIV virus. Determined to turn tragedy into opportunity, Magic pledged to become a spokesman for AIDS research. • In the past year, eleven hostages were released from captivity in Lebanon, including six Americans. Terry Anderson, held for 2,455 days, was the last American hostage released. He was held captive longer than any other hostage. Two German relief workers remained in captivity. • The nation's attention turned to Hawaii on December 7, as we marked the 50th Anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. • Milwaukee serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer pled guilty by reason of insanity on 15 counts of murder. After a search of his apartment, police found 11 dismembered bodies, seven skulls, and a heart in the refrigerator. Dahmer was found sane on all counts and sentenced to 937 years in prison.

NATIONAL REVIEW

After the Gulf War, President George Bush's approval rating of 89% was one of the highest in history. However, domestic problems, especially the economy, caused his rating to drop as low as 44% before the New Hampshire Primary. The people of that state sent the

President a message with their vote. While President Bush won, his opponent, Pat Buchanan, received over 40% of the vote.

• Former Massachusetts Senator, Paul Tsongas, led the Democratic candidates in New Hampshire. Former California Governor, Jerry Brown, came from last place in New Hampshire to tie Tsongas in the Maine caucuses. • The Democrats waited for "Super Tuesday" to determine a clear-cut presidential contender. • Last year, 25 million people were unemployed at some time and the number of homeless Americans grew at an alarming rate. • In 1991,

retailers experienced the lowest sales growth in three decades. • After the initial elation about the Gulf War victory, some Americans came to feel that the war ended too soon and Saddam Hussein still posed a threat. In November of 1991, the last of the 714 burning Kuwaiti oil wells was capped off as the people of Kuwait struggled to rebuild their homeland.

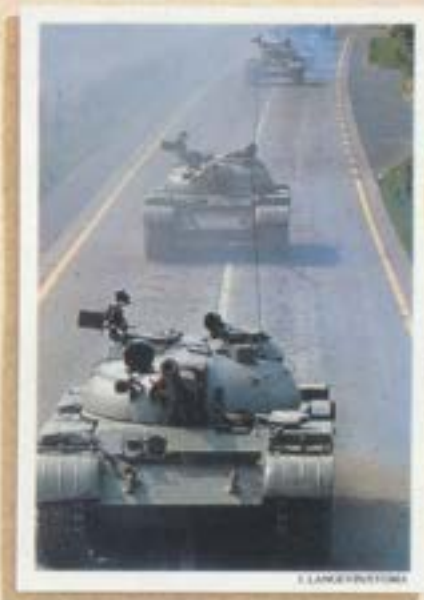


INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS



In August 1991, Communist hard-liners attempted to overthrow Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in a military coup. Resisted by supporters of reform, the coup failed, but weakened Gorbachev's position. Soon thereafter, Gorbachev resigned and the Soviet Union dissolved. Russian President Boris Yeltsin, along with the leaders of 10 other former Soviet republics, formed a Commonwealth of Independent States. Yeltsin promised to accelerate market-driven economic reforms, but the lives of people did not improve quickly enough to prevent food shortages and homelessness. Muscovites flocked to the streets to sell their personal belongings to help pay for food and clothing. • Despite George Bush's aggressive trade stand with Japan, United States exports were not expected to be much affected. However, Bush did come away with an agreement by Japan to open a \$6 billion government computer market to foreign firms. Japanese auto companies also agreed to ask their dealers to sell a token number of additional U.S. cars. • Yugoslavia broke into a bitter civil war on June 25, 1991, when the republics of Croatia and Slovenia declared their independence from the federal government in Belgrade.

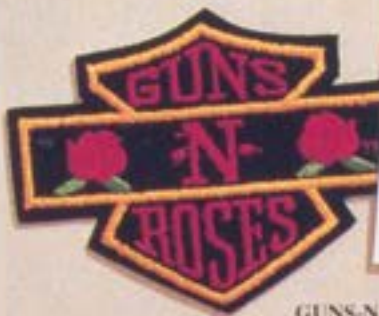

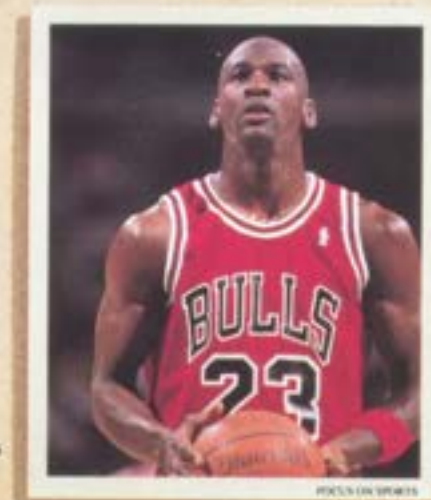
SPORTS CONNECTION

Michael Jordan led the Chicago Bulls in a spectacular battle for the 1991 NBA title. The Bulls defeated the Los Angeles Lakers 4 games to 1. • The Atlanta Braves and the Minnesota Twins rose from the bottom of their leagues and finished the season in a top-notch showdown. Three of the seven games stretched into extra innings. Four of them were won on the game's final pitch. The Series was close, but the Minnesota Twins captured the final game, 1-0 in 10 innings. • The Washington Redskins won Super Bowl XXVI by defeating the Buffalo Bills 37-24. The Redskins won 17 games during the '91-'92 football season and lost only two. • In the 1992 Winter Olympics in Albertville, France, speed skater Bonnie Blair won the first gold medal for the United States in the women's 500 meter. She won a second gold medal in the 1000 meter race. Kristi Yamaguchi became the first American woman to win a gold medal in women's figure skating since 1976. Germany won the most medals overall with 26. The Unified Team, formerly known as the Soviet Union, came in second place with 23 medals. Austria and Norway were the biggest surprises. Austria won 21 medals and Norway won 20. The United States ended up with 11 medals, five more than in the 1988 games.
