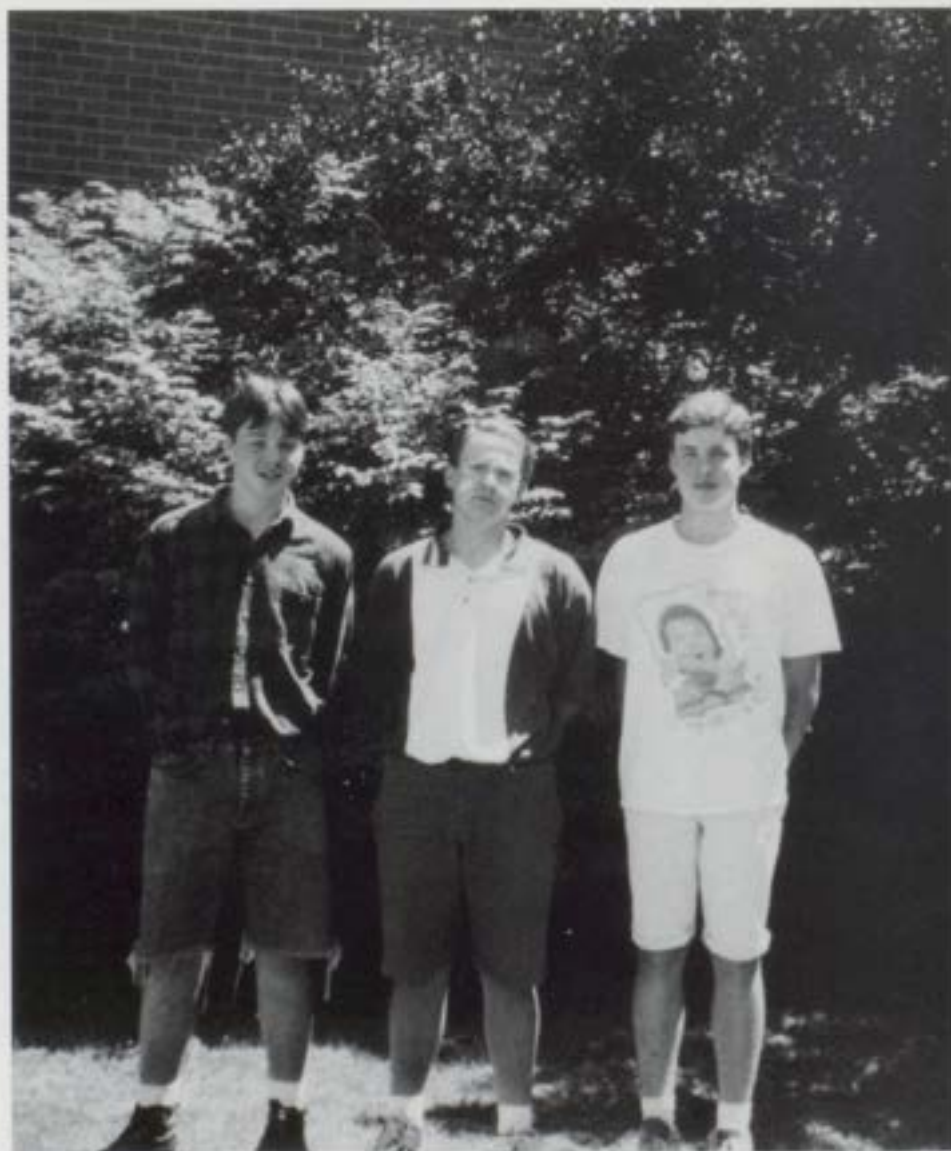


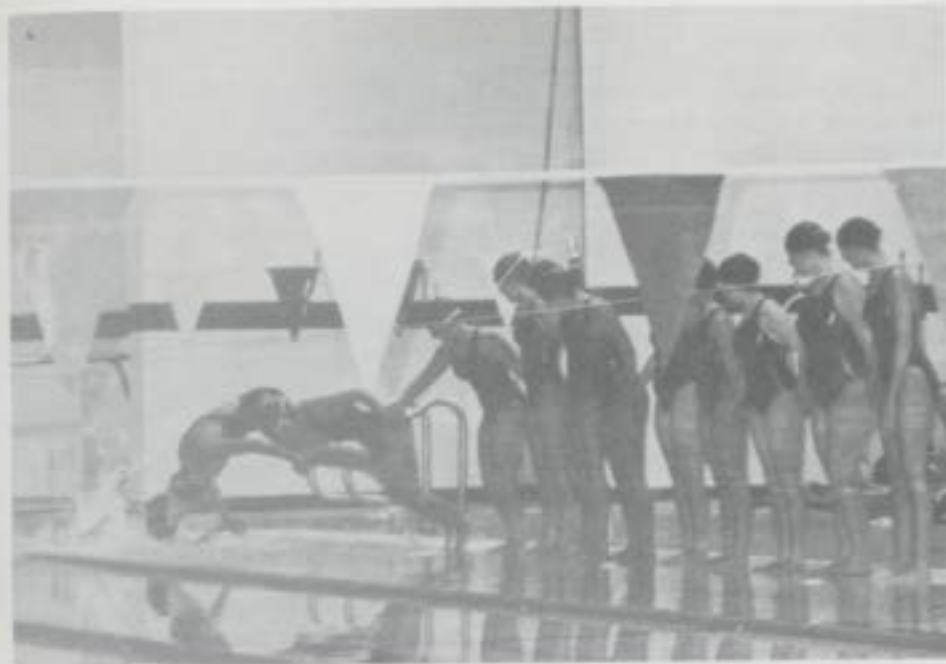

Both the girls' and boys' swim teams experienced trouble in their season this year.

The Southwestern girls' swim team learned this year that it is not whether you win or lose, but how you play the game. If you try your hardest, the outcome will always be a success. Coach Shelly Anderson felt, "this year was one of our best over-all years." Injury and illness played a large role in the outcome of the season. It is difficult to improve because the whole team was unable to practice together. Never the less, the girls never gave up and swam until the end.

Aside from small numbers and the weather, the boys' season still had some positive outcomes. In January, during the thick of the season, school was canceled because of snow and over all bad weather. Therefore most of the meets were cancelled and never rescheduled. Throughout the season the team only had three meets and a sectional. 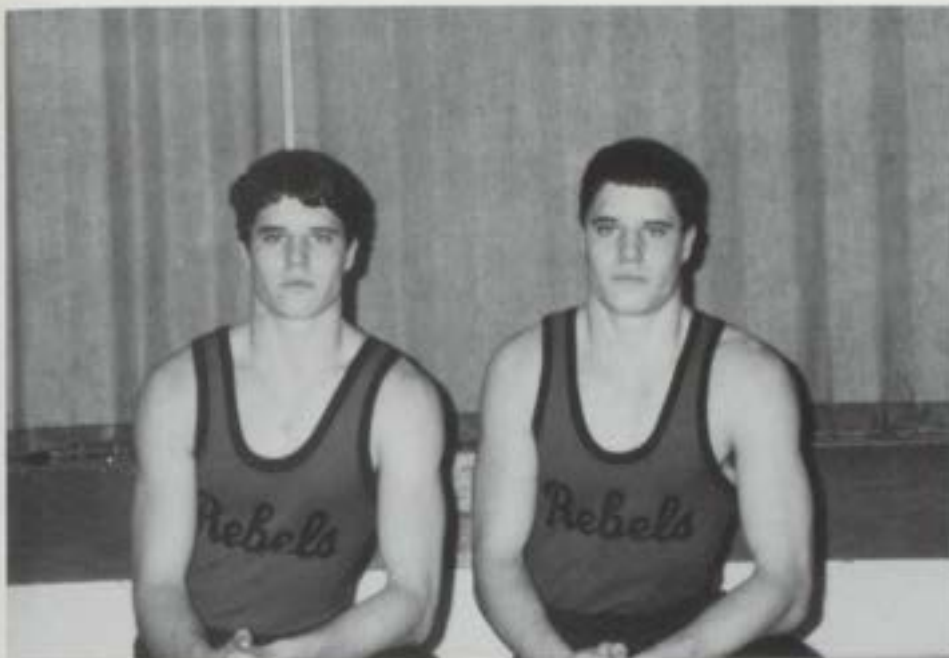

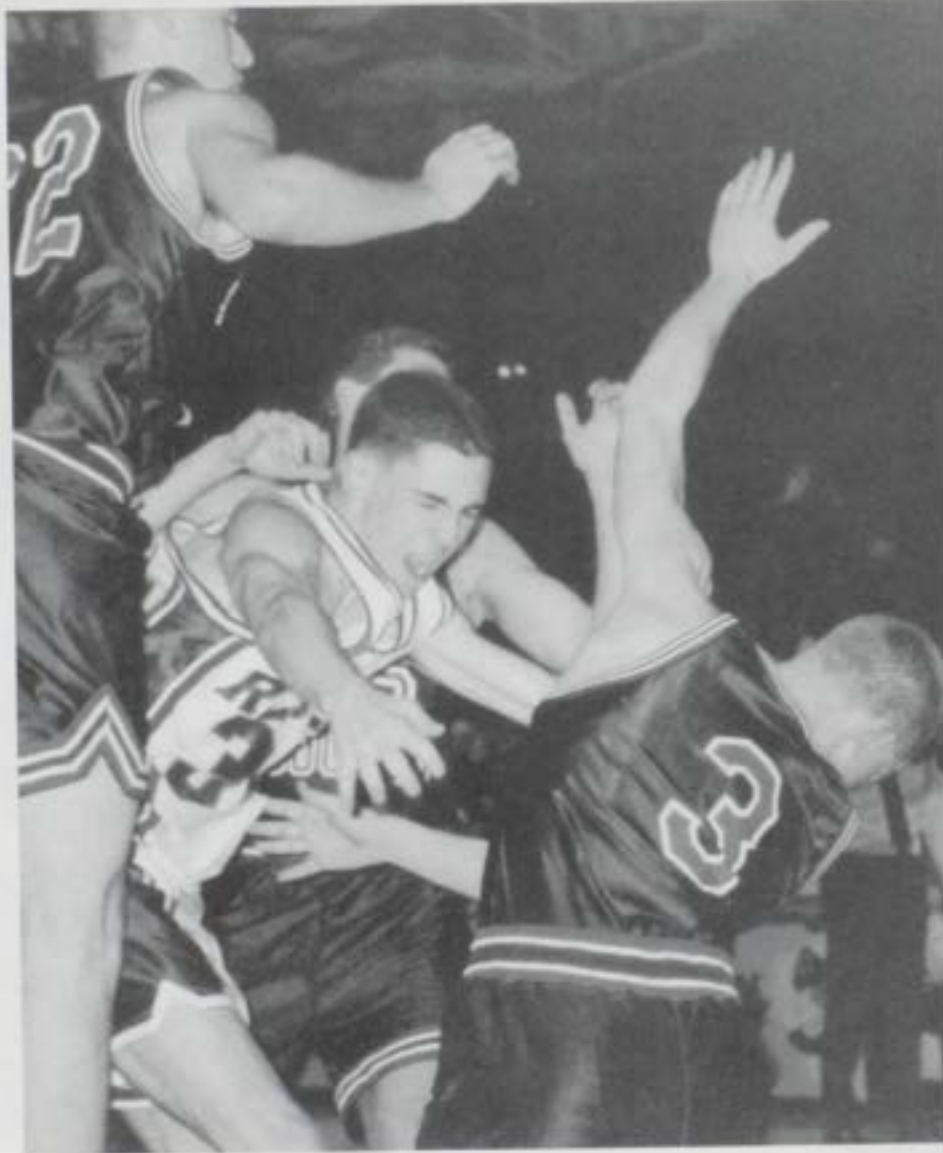

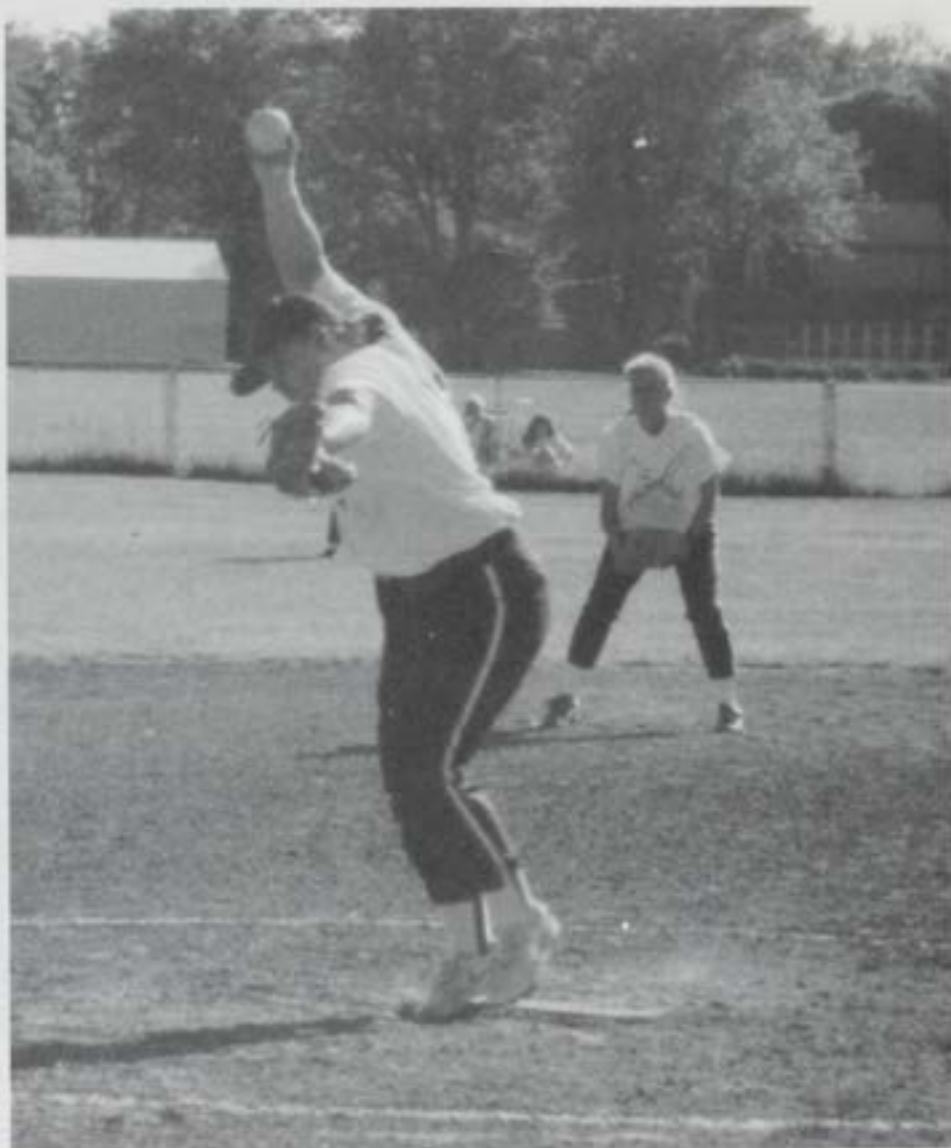

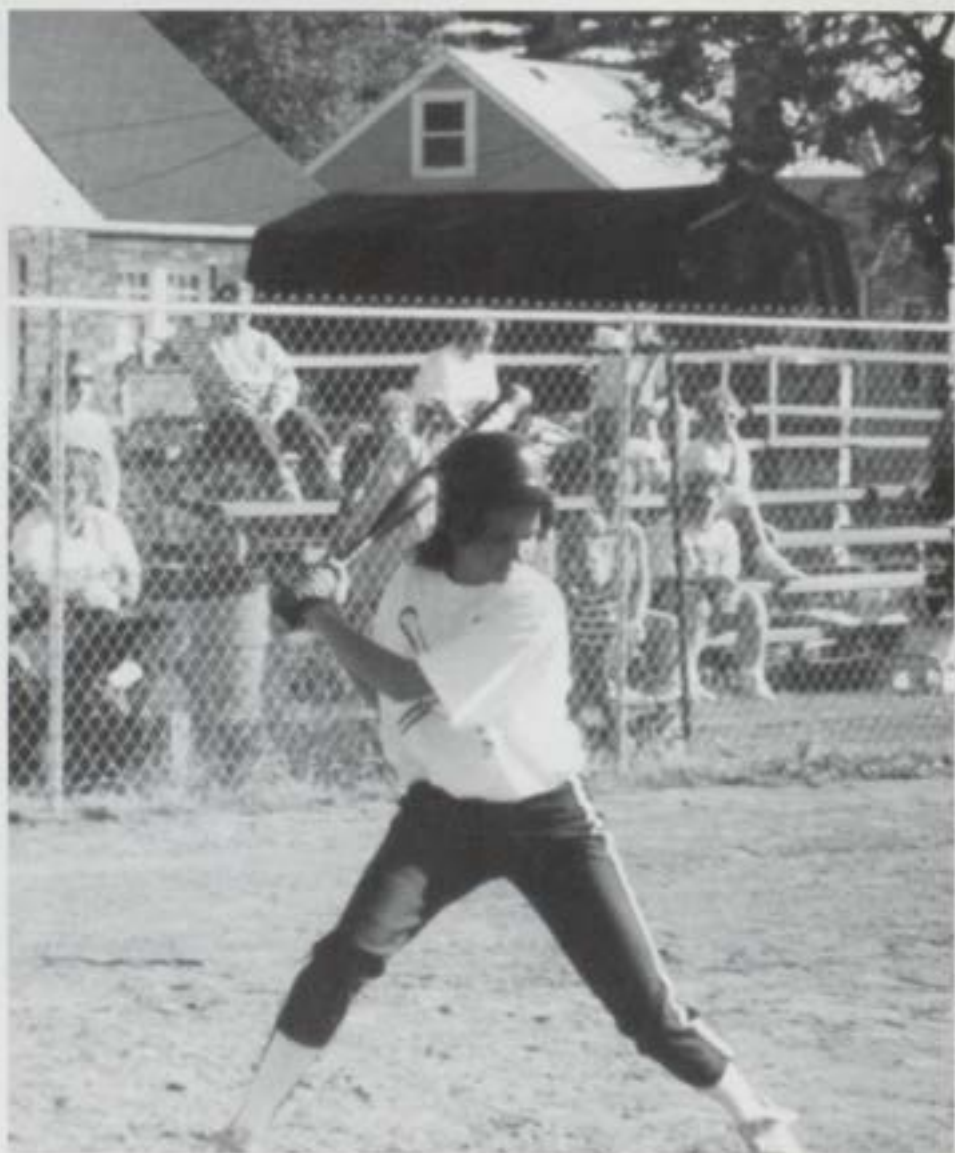
