- Many of the new classes were surprising well received. New approaches to teaching were used. Students did more in the classroom and






Alaska Airline Flight 261 crashed 11 miles off Point Mugu. California on January 31. All 88 people on board were killed.

▲ Over 17,000 people were killed and thousands more injured when a magnitude 7.4 earthquake hit tomit, Turkey on August 17.



A Suspected senal fuller Rafael Resendez-Ramirez sumendered to authorities after more than three weeks on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list. He was wanted in connection with eight murders along rairoad tracks in Illinois,

▲ Morocco's King Hassan, one of the Middle Easts' most devoted peacemakers, died after ruling for over 38 years.




