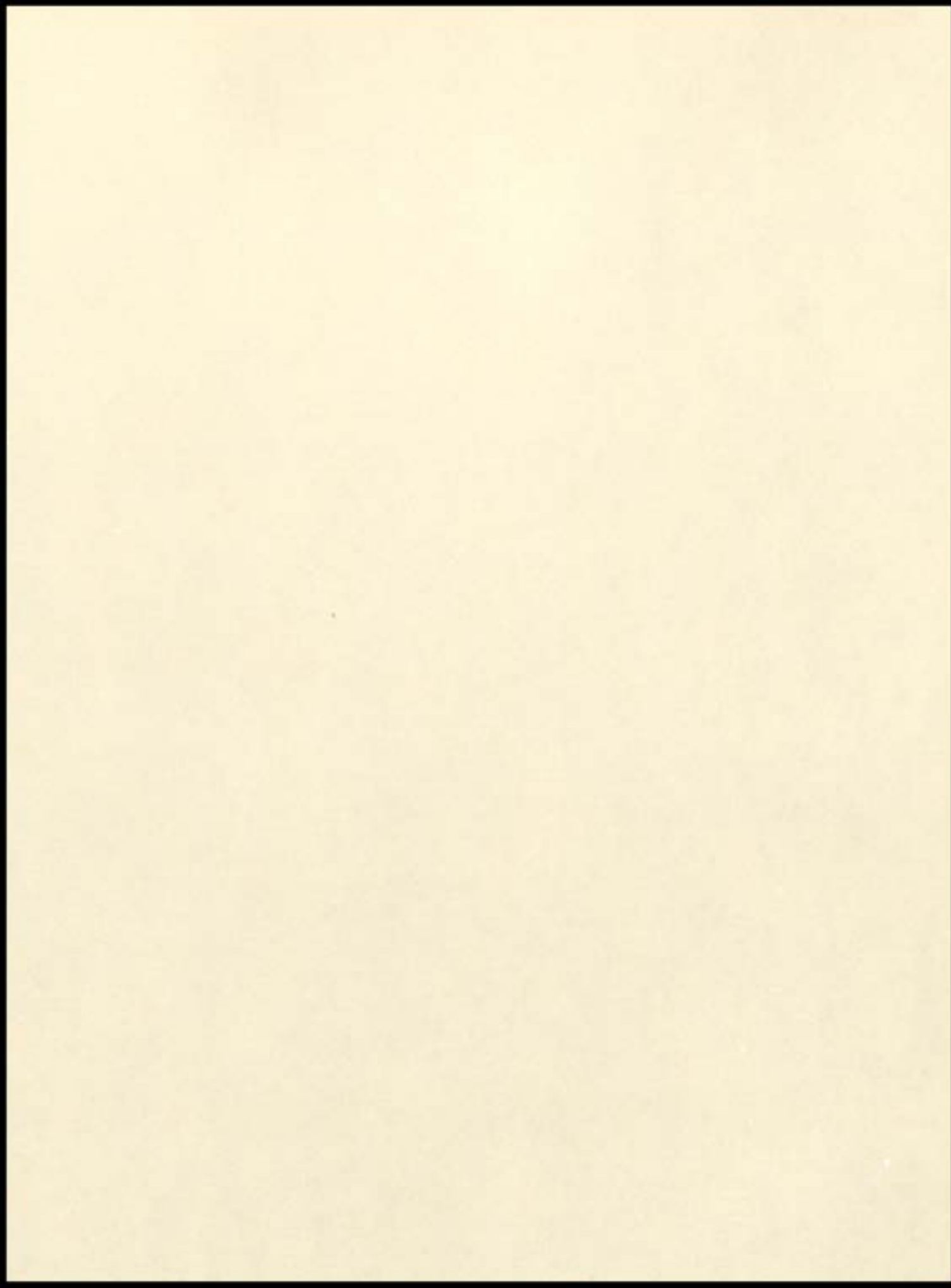

APRIL 3, 1974 3:55 P.M.





The tornado which ripped through Jefferson County on April 3 caused incredible destruction in Madison. Since it came as suddenly as it went, people had only a few minutes warning before the winds came, which left devastation wherever they touched. At left are some pictures of Pope John Elementary School which was severely damaged by the winds. A school bus, usually parked behind Shawe, is shown in the graveyard across the street where it landed. Shawe was turned into a disaster area for several days after the tornado, supplying food and shelter for the homeless. Becky Deveary and Beth Hill (above) help in cleaning Shawe, which was left untouched except for some broken windows and a great deal of dirt. Classrooms remained silent for nearly a week after the tornado, while the whole town concentrated on getting back on its feet.

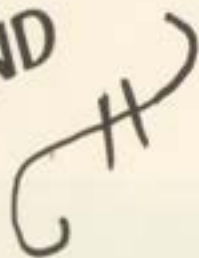
