Sail our ships out on the open sea


Cast away our fears and all the years will come and go,



Catapsis made an appearance for the Halloween Dance, while Senior girls "hammed" it up at an assembly!




















It was Sunday, the sun was shining, the flowers were in bloom, and graduation had finally come.




### **FAREWELL**

1975 marked the last year that we would have both Father Lawler and Father John with us at Shawe. Their achievements will long be remembered. We wish them the best of luck always.














One of our guests during this season was a representative from Public Service Indiana who had a program on nuclear power plants.
