# Set It Up! Spike It In! That's The Only Way To Win!

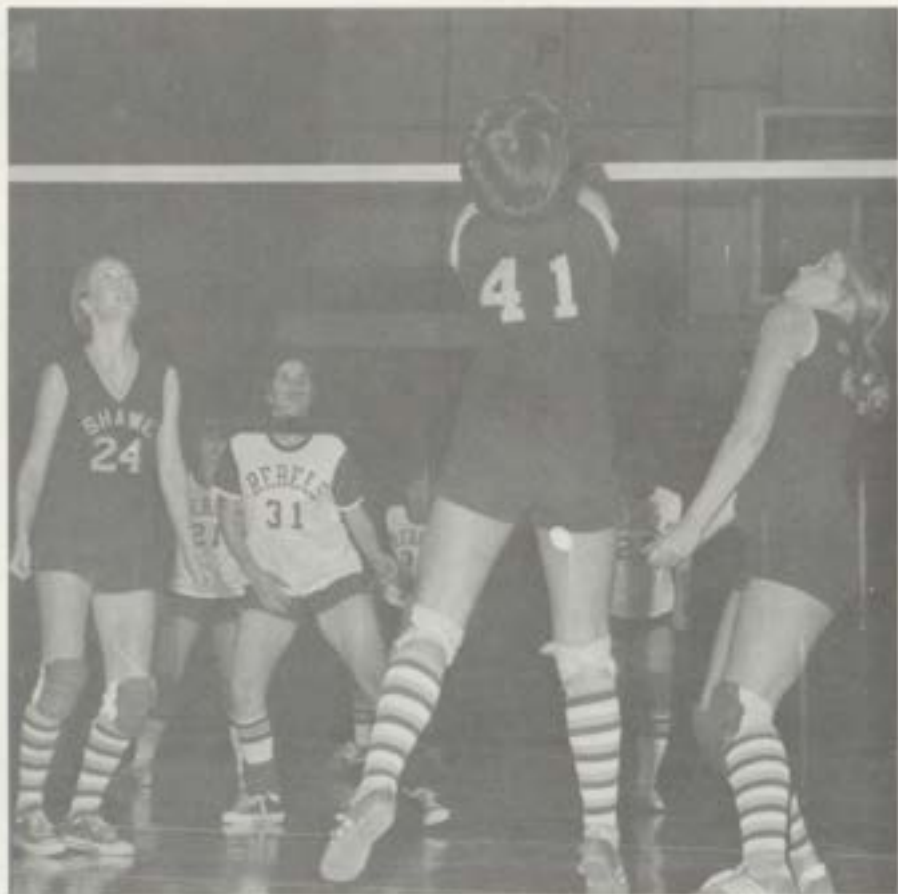

It just goes to show the Hilltoppers can play ball.

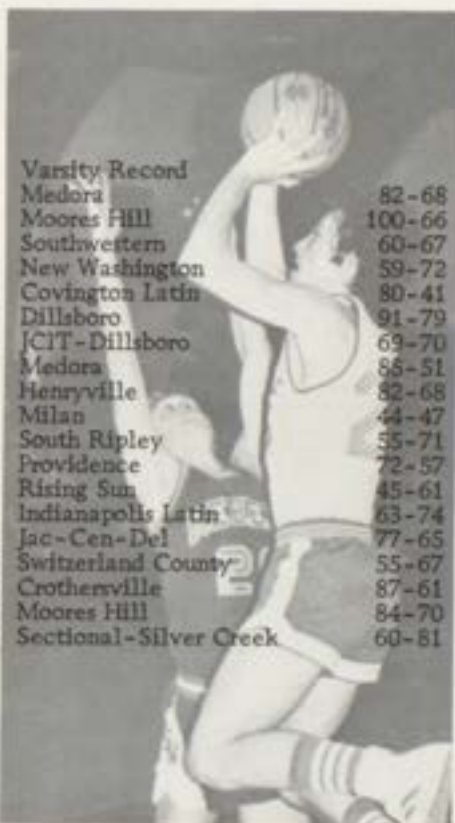

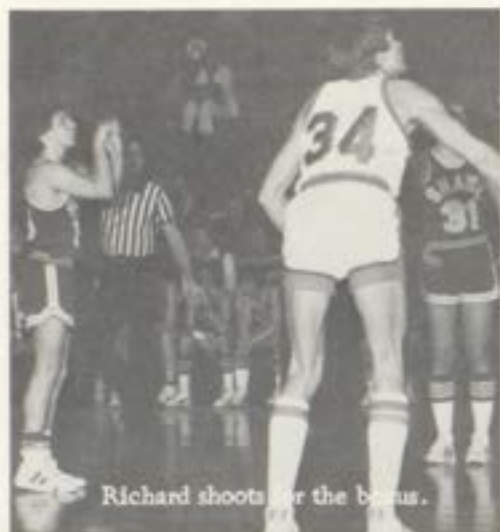
Although the Toppers had a splendid season there were factors working against them. For example; Goz was out of action a good part of the

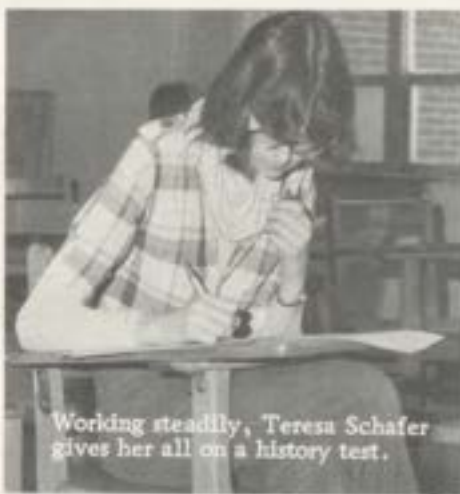
