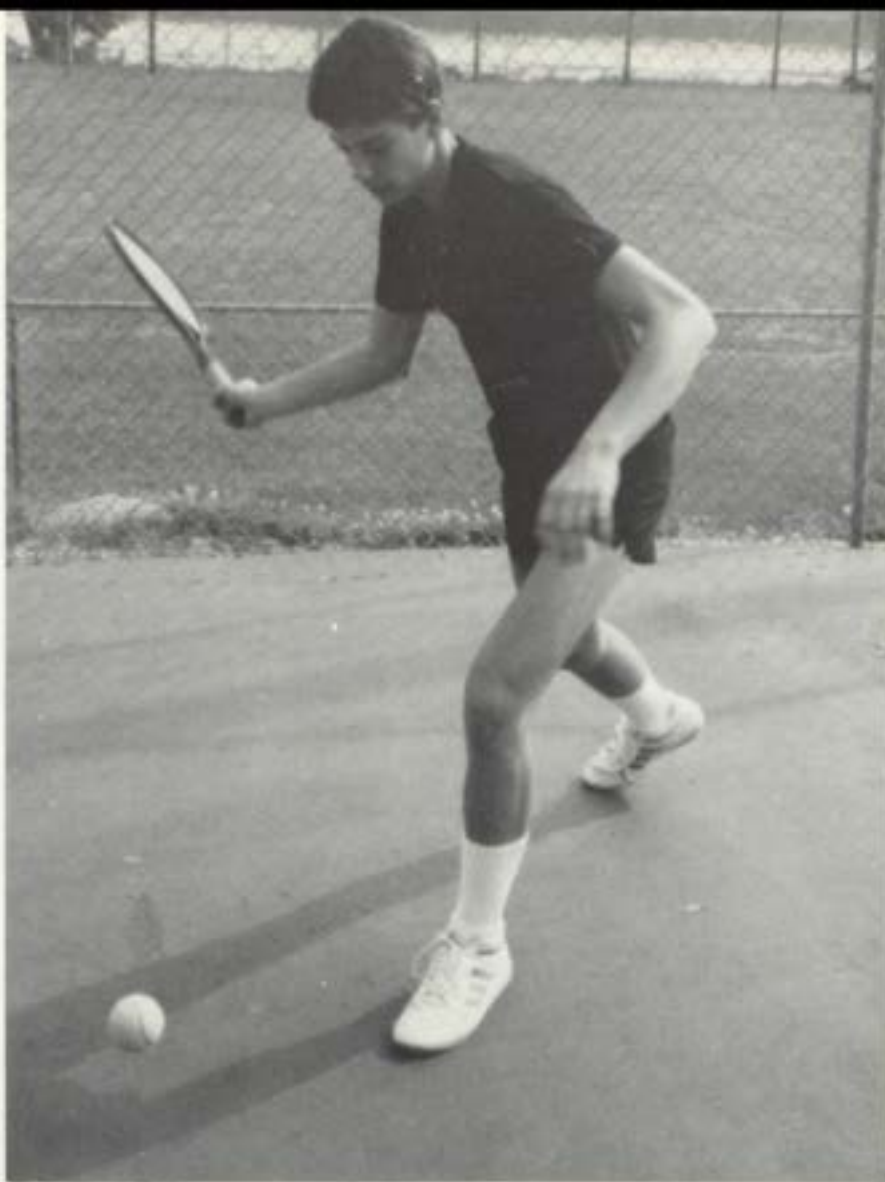
Chris L. Hill and Phil Kahn led the team in wins with four out of five singles matches. The leading doubles team was Joe Knoebel and Todd Murphy.

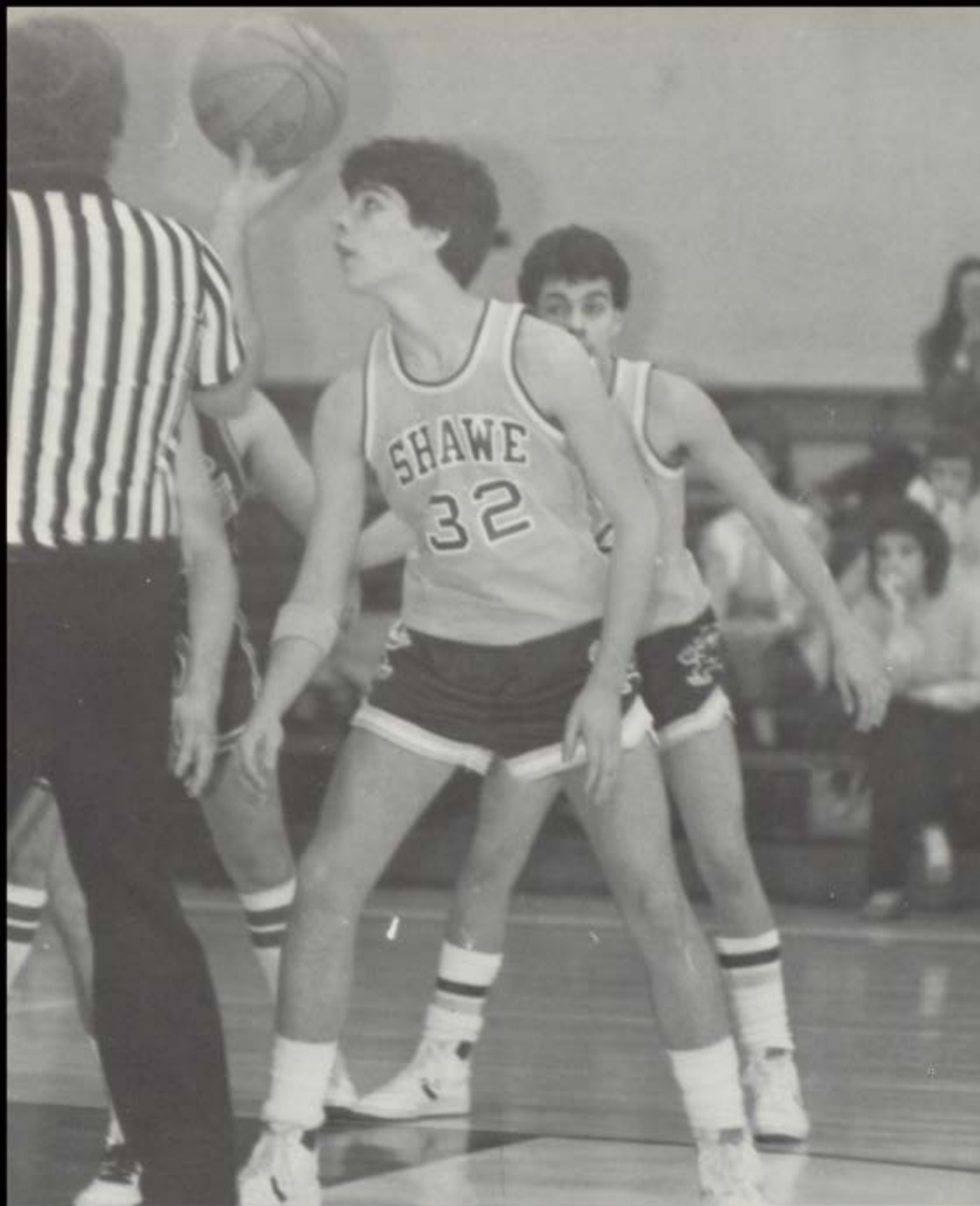

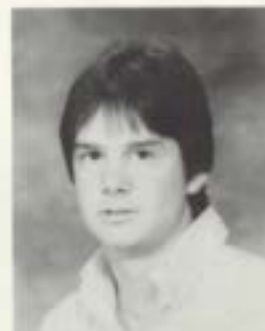
